Schedule to the foregoing Proclamation.
Regulations.

1. The importation of dogs referred to in the Proclamation aforesaid shall be permitted, subject to a quarantine for a period of not less than three months at the Government Quarantine Station on Robben Island.

2. Before any dogs are removed from the ship or vessel in which they may arrive at Cape Town, they shall be handed over to such person as may be appointed for the purpose of removal, and by him they shall be conveyed to the place of quarantine, and the cost of such removal, together with the expenses of quarantining and of attendance upon and food required for the dogs quarantined, shall be borne by the owner or owners thereof.

3. The dog or dogs undergoing quarantine shall be separately tied up or otherwise securely kept free and entirely isolated one from another.

4. Reasonable care and attention will be given to all animals so quarantined, but the Government will not be responsible for the loss of, or injury to, any animal during its period of detention as aforesaid.

5. If at the expiration of the quarantine period the dog or dogs shall be declared by some responsible person authorized by the Government in that behalf to be free from the disease known as rabies, and if it shall also be certified that the usual symptoms preceding or indicating that disease are not visible, then and in such case the dog or dogs shall (subject to the provision in clause 6) be released and given up to the owner or owners thereof.

6. No dog shall be released from quarantine until all charges due are defrayed by the owner or his agent.

7. If at any time during the period of quarantine it shall appear that any animal so detained exhibits symptoms indicative of rabies, the Government may by its duly authorized officers forthwith destroy such animal and no compensation shall be paid to the owner or owners thereof.

8. Any person contravening the provisions of the above Proclamation or of these Regulations, or wilfully obstructing any person in the due execution of any of the said provisions, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £50, or in default of payment to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding three months, unless such fine be sooner paid.

9. Dogs unclaimed at the expiration of their period of quarantine will be advertised in three consecutive issues of the Government Gazette, and if then unclaimed within fourteen days they will be destroyed or sold as may be deemed advisable.

THE Board of Trade have received from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Christiania information to the effect that the following places have been included amongst those considered cholera infected, viz.:—Stettin and Swinemunde, with other harbours on the Oder and on the Larger and Small Haff, the whole of Holland, together with Bilbao, in the Province of Biscay in Spain, Naples, and the district of the same name are, on the other hand, omitted from the list.

THE Board of Trade have received from Her Majesty's Representative at Madrid, the following Telegram, dated October 17, viz.:—"Arrivals from Messina (Sicily) which left after 12th instant, foul; those within 165 kilometres foul from 13th."

The Board have also received from the same source the following information as to quarantine, viz.:—

Arrivals from Ancona will be despatched to a foul lazaretto whatever their date of departure and whatever their bill of health, and ports within 165 miles radius of Ancona will be considered dangerously affected, irrespective of date.

Arrivals from within 165 kilometres of Cuneo subjected to three days' quarantine as a minimum if they arrive either with clean bills of health or with notification of suspicious cases of cholera in whatever form expressed.

If any case of cholera is notified the ship must be sent to a foul lazaretto.

Arrivals from Scutari (Turkey in Asia) will be sent to a foul lazaretto whatever their date of departure or bill of health, and ports within 165 kilometres will be considered dangerously affected.

THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs the following Memorandum from Her Majesty's Embassy at Madrid, respecting the practice observed in Spain with regard to removal of quarantine restrictions:—

1. Quarantine can only be taken off from foul ports on the receipt by Government of an official notification from the Spanish Consul that twenty days have elapsed since the last case of cholera or yellow fever.

2. Arrivals from a foul port with clean bill of health and certificate from the Spanish Consul that twenty days have elapsed since the last case of cholera or yellow fever are admitted to free pratique.
