Corfu, February 2.

THE Venetian Gallies and Men of War are refitting here with great diligence; and the Captain-General *Mocenigo* has, since his arrival, taken a review both of the Sea and Land Forces. He has, upon advice of the motions of the Turks about *Vallona*, sent thither three Men of War, and several Gallies, with some Troops to reinforce that Garison. We hear from the *Levant*, that the Turks are drawing some Forces together towards *Negrepont*, which they make their place of rendezvous.

Warsaw, February 25. The Emperor's Minister to the Czars of *Moscovy* is arrived here in his way towards that Court; whither, we hear, the Turks have likewise sent an Envoy (who lately passed through this Kingdom in the Disguise of an Armenian Merchant,) to treat a Peace; but by all the Accountſ we have from thence, he will not find the Czars in a Disposition to hearken to any Overtures of this kind. The last Letters from *Lemberg* say, that the Tartars are on their march in a considerable Body; that it's believed their design is first to conduct a Convoy of Provisions to *Gaminiec*, and after that to make their usual Incurſions into the Frontier Provinces of this Kingdom; upon which, Orders have been sent to the Troops quartered near the Borders, to post themselves ſo as may be moſt for the Security of the Country. Two days ago arrived here an Expreſs, with advice of the Princeſs of *Newburg's* being on her Journey hither, but that it will be the middle of the next month before ſhe can arrive here.

Vienna, March 4. Several Regiments of the new-raiſ'd Troops are already on Foot in *Bohemia*, and will very ſuddenly begin their march towards *Hungary*. The Emperor's chief Enginier is return'd to *Buda*, with Orders to fortifie that place, according to the Plan he had given in to the Council of War; and a vaſt quantity of Spades, Pickaxes, and other Inſtruments, have been lately ſent thither. Five Regiments are ordered to march immediately to *Eſſeck*, to cover and ſecure that place. The laſt Advices from *Transilvania* ſay, that *Teckeley* lies dangerously ill at *Brankovar* in *Valachia*, and that many of his Followers had deſerted him.

Dublin, March 15. By ſeveral Proteſtants, as well as Deſerters, lately come from *Limerick*, we are aſſured, that there are great Diſcontents and Diſtractions among the *Irish*, occaſioned by the ill condition of their Affairs, which they find every day growing upon them: That they have no Expectation of any Succors of Men from *France*; and make no preparation for taking the Field: That the ſmall Sum of Money *Tirconnel* brought over with him, is wholly employ'd on their Fortifications: That they have ſpent all their old Stores, and the Garison at *Limerick* lives now upon what has been laid up this Season: That *Tirconnel* and *Sarsfield* do very much diſagree; and that the latter was ſeveral times ſent for by *Tirconnel*, but would not come to him. Our Parties have of late cut off many of the Rapperies; towards *Longford* Lieutenant-Colonel *Toby Purcell* kill'd, this laſt week, 60, and took 20; and about *Kilkenny*, and the Barony of *Edaugh*, a greater number have had the ſame fate. Plymouth, March 17. We have this day a report from Falmouth, that the *Depford* Frigate has taken a French Privateer of 18 Guns, and two Merchant-men and carried them into Scilly. The *Spanish Alliance* Pacquet-Boat arrived yesterday at Falmouth in 4 days from the *Groyne*.

Deale, March 20. On the 18th instant passed on the back of the *Goodwin-Sand* above 100 Sail of Ships, being the Dutch *St. Ubes* Fleet homeward bound. The *James Galley* brought, last night, into the *Downes*, a Vessel that came from the Northward bound to France.

The late Act of Parliament, Entituled, An Act for Granting to Their Majesties several Additional Duties of Excise upon Beer, Ale, and other Liquors, for Four Years, from the time that an Act for Doubling the Duty of Excise upon Beer, Ale, and other Liquors, during the Space of One Year doth expire; Directing the Building and Equipping of Twenty Seven Ships of War for Their Majesties, Seventeen of the Third, and Ten of the Fourth Rate, and appropriating the Sum of Five Hundred and Seventy Thousand Pounds for that Use, out of the Moneys to be Collected, Levied, and Paid by virtue of the said Act; And in the Session of the Year for Felling of Timber drawing on, to the end all Persons concerned, as Owners of any Woods convertible to Straight, Compass or Knee Timber, or Plank fit for the Service of Their Majesties Navy, may have Opportunity of improving the same by their timely applying themselves to the Felling and Converting their said Woods, it is hereby notified, That the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Their Majesties Navy, sitting at the Office of the Navy in Crutched Friers, are and will upon Monday, Wednesday, and Friday in the morning in every Week, be ready to receive any Tenders in Writing that shall be made them of any of the said Provisions, and to Treat and Contract with the Tenderers thereof at reasonable Rates, upon Terms of Payment to be punctually made in Course out of the Moneys appropriated as aforesaid for that Service.

It is also hereby notified to all Persons, Owners or Traders for any Naval Commodities, whether of English or Foreign Growth, employ'd in the Building, Repairing, and Equipping of Ships of War, such as Pitch, Tar, Rozen, Hemp, Masts, Fir-Timber, Deals, Sail-Cloth, Oak-Timber, Plank, Iron-work, &c.
