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Madrid, March 7.

THE Messenger that was lately sent by the Ambassador of *Morocco*, to give his Master an account of the Treaty he had concluded for the Exchange of the Spanish Prisoners taken at *Larache*, is come back with his approbation of it; By this agreement 1000 Moors, who are Slaves in this Kingdom, are to be given for 100 Spanish Officers, but the private Soldiers of that Garrison are to be exchanged Man for Man. The Marquis de *Leganez* is on his departure for *Milan* to take possession of that Government, and he will carry with him Bills for a considerable Sum of Money for the Service of the War. Large Supplies of Money are likewise remitted to *Flanders*. And at the same time such care is taken to reinforce the Army in *Catalonia*, that we hope to give the Enemy a considerable diversion on that side. We hear from *Cadix*, that the Spanish Men of War designed for this Summer's Expedition are fitting out there with all imaginable diligence.

Warsaw, March 6. The King of *Poland* arrived here with the whole Court on the 25th of the last Month: Prince *James* sets out this day towards the Frontiers of *Silesia* to meet the Princess of *Neuburg*, who is expected here about the 18th instant. We have advice, that the Cham of the European Tartars died lately at *Butzick*, and that his Son *Sultan Galga* succeeds him.

Vienna, March 22. The Count de *Thun*, the Emperor's Ambassador to the Crown of *Poland*, parted from hence on Monday last, with Orders to wait upon that King during the Campagne, which, as all our advices from thence assure us, he will begin very early this year. Prince *Louis* of *Baden* is suddenly expected here from *Bohemia*, being designed to command the Imperial Army in *Hungary*. And General *Caprara* is to command the Emperor's Forces on the *Rhine* under the Elector of *Bavaria*. The Sieur *Keyserfeldt*, the Emperor's Principal Engineer, arrived the 11th instant at *Buda*, where they are not only repairing the old Fortifications, but likewise removing a little Hill near the Walls of the Town, which gave the Imperialists great advantage when they besieged it. At *Eseck* they work with the same diligence, and have already enlarged the Ditch, repaired the Counterscarp, and raised several Outworks, which will be of great security to the place. The Letters from *Croatia* give an account, of the Disgrace and Removal of the Bassa of *Bisnia*, and that his Successor was come to *Buzabucca*, where he had assembled a Body of Turks and Tartars, with design, as 'twas thought, to pass the River *Onna*; But that the Ban of *Croatia* was using all diligence to prevent it. Vidolomicke, the Vice-ban, was encamped with his Troops at *Zrim*, from whence he had made an Incursion into the Enemies Quarters, and taken several Prisoners, and among them one *Mehmed Arambysa*, who having about 10 years ago deserted from the Imperial Garrison of *Bress* and turned Turk, is ordered to be empaled. Great quantities of Arms, Ammunition, and Provisions, are daily conveyed from hence down the River into *Hungary*, and the Boats with Ovens to bake Bread for the Army are likewise putting in order.

Ratisbonne, March 22. Upon the Memorial lately presented by the Minister of *Savoy* to the States of the Empire here assembled, the *Brandenburg* Envoy has declared, That his Master will send his Royal Highness a Regiment of Foot, and maintain them at his own charge. Several other Princes have by their Ministers here likewise declared their readiness to assist him. And the Emperor will send his Royal Highness a farther Succor of his Troops now in the Empire, where they are not so very necessary, since the two Circles of *Suabia* and *Franconia* have augmented their Forces to 21000 Men, who, with a considerable Body of the Troops of *Saxe Gotha*, will joyn the Confederate Army on the *Rhine*.

Francfort, March 28. The Landgrave of *Hesse* is returned from the *Hague* to *Cassel*, the place of his usual Residence, and is preparing to take the Field with his Forces, which will make a Body of 8000 Men. Those of *Saxony* are on their march; And the rest of the Confederate Forces, that are to act on the *Rhine*, are in a readiness to open the Campaign so soon as there is Forage for the Horse. They write from *Strasbourg*, that the Marschal de *Lorge* is expected there the beginning of the next Month, being to command the French Army in *Germany*.

Hamburg, March 30. The Letters from the Court of *Brandenburg* advise us, of his Electoral Highness's arrival at *Postdam*, and that he intended to be the 28th at *Berlin*; from whence he would, after a few days, go and take a Review at *Crossen* of the 6000 men, which he sends to the Emperor's assistance in *Hungary*.

Cologne, March 30. The *Brandenburg* Troops, that marched from hence on Friday last, are entered into *Aix la Chapelle*, in the place of those that are gone from thence toward *Brabant*. The Master Forces lye at present near *Ganmenich*, *Liebmich*, and *Balhausen*, but so as that upon occasion they can quickly draw together. The Baron de *Barfus* is returned to *Nim* from his late Journey to *Berlin*, with orders to command the *Brandenburg* Forces quartered in this Diocess, and to put 3 or 4000 men more into *Cologne*, if he finds it necessary. The Electoral Palace here is furnishing for the Reception of the Elector of *Bavaria*, who will pass 3 or 4 days in this City in his return from the *Hague*.

They write from *Trier* of the 25th, that a Courier arrived there the day before with Orders for all the French Troops, Horse and Foot, that were lodged there and in the Neighbourhood, to march forthwith towards the *Meuse*; that the Horse thereupon began their march the 28th, and that the Foot would follow the next day. At the same time we hear from *Hefel*, that 3000 men of the Duke of *Rell's* Troops were passed through that place, in order to join the Confederate Army in *Flanders*.

Dublin, March 25. By Letters of the 16th instant from *Roscreagh*, we have the following Particulars of Lieutenant-Colonel *Lillingston's* late Action at *Nenagh*. On the 14th, between 8 and 9 at night, he marched with a Detachment from *Roscreagh*, and being joyned by another from *Bir*, making together 300 Horse, Foot, and Dragoons, advanced towards *Nenagh*, but finding the way to be longer than he expected, and the day coming on, he detached 18 Horse, and as many Foot, and having mounted the latter on Garrans, made all the hast he could with them to secure the Bridge about half a mile from *Nenagh*; The whole Garrison came out to oppose him, but with this small number he maintained the Pass till his Foot came up, and then leaving them at the Bridge, he advanced with his Horse towards the Enemy, who made many shot at us; but so soon as we came near began to run, and we pursued them, killed about 20, among whom was a Lieutenant, and took a Cornet Prisoner. After this, he sent a Detachment to secure a Pass on the other side of *Nenagh* towards *Limerick*, while the rest of his Men entered the Town, (the Rebels flying into the Castle) and burnt all the Houses, with great store of Malt and Meal, and brought away 300 Head of Black Cattel, having lost but 2 men, and another wounded. Of the Rebels, there were in all killed between 40 and 50.

They write from *Cork*, that upon advice that a Party of the Rebels was come before *Ballinagooby*, one of our Frontier Garrisons in that County, a Detachment was sent from thence to its Relief, which the Enemy having notice of, they retired in disorder, and the Garrison sallied out, killed several, and took 7 Prisoners. We hear from *Belfast* of the arrival there of some Danish Recruits.

Falmouth, March 26. Yesterday put to Sea out of this Harbor the *Guinea* Frigate, Captain *Chanterell* Commander, from *Guinea*; The *Benjamin* of *London* from *Virginia*; And the *Richard* and *John* of *London* from *Jamaica*; All bound under the Convoy of the *Virgin's Grace* for the *Downes*.

Plymouth, March 29. On the 25th came in here one of Their Majesties Ships with several Merchant Men from *Falmouth*, which set sail again on the 27th for the *Downes*. The same day went to Sea the *Plymouth*, and the *Pembrook*. And in the Evening appeared off of this place about 30 Sail bound to the Westward, who were forced the next day by contrary Winds to put into this Port, being the Transport Ships with the Earl of *Marleborough's* Regiment of Fusiliers, and Colonel *Fitzpatrick's* Regiment, designed for *Flanders*, under the Convoy of the *Nonsuch*, and the *Milford*; They came last from *Milford Haven*, and have likewise on Board 6 or 700 Irish Prisoners. The Merchant Ships bound for the *Downes*, under the Convoy of the *Virgin's Grace*, were put back yesterday. Here are arrived the *Samuel* of *London* from the *West-Indies*; the *Three Brothers* of *London* from *Boston*; the *Elizabeth* of *London* from *Jamaica*; and the *Blossom* of *London* from *Antegoa*.

Westminster, March 31. The Parliament met this day according to their late Adjournment, and
