

They write from *Trier* of the 25th, that a Courier arrived there the day before with Orders for all the French Troops, Horse and Foot, that were lodged there and in the Neighbourhood, to march forthwith towards the *Meuse*; that the Horse thereupon began their march the 28th, and that the Foot would follow the next day. At the same time we hear from *Hefel*, that 3000 men of the Duke of *Rell's* Troops were passed through that place, in order to join the Confederate Army in *Flanders*.

Dublin, March 25. By Letters of the 16th instant from *Roscreagh*, we have the following Particulars of Lieutenant-Colonel *Lillingston's* late Action at *Nenagh*. On the 14th, between 8 and 9 at night, he marched with a Detachment from *Roscreagh*, and being joyned by another from *Bir*, making together 300 Horse, Foot, and Dragoons, advanced towards *Nenagh*, but finding the way to be longer than he expected, and the day coming on, he detached 18 Horse, and as many Foot, and having mounted the latter on Garrans, made all the hast he could with them to secure the Bridge about half a mile from *Nenagh*; The whole Garrison came out to oppose him, but with this small number he maintained the Pass till his Foot came up, and then leaving them at the Bridge, he advanced with his Horse towards the Enemy, who made many shot at us; but so soon as we came near began to run, and we pursued them, killed about 20, among whom was a Lieutenant, and took a Cornet Prisoner. After this, he sent a Detachment to secure a Pass on the other side of *Nenagh* towards *Limerick*, while the rest of his Men entered the Town, (the Rebels flying into the Castle) and burnt all the Houses, with great store of Malt and Meal, and brought away 300 Head of Black Cattel, having lost but 2 men, and another wounded. Of the Rebels, there were in all killed between 40 and 50.

They write from *Cork*, that upon advice that a Party of the Rebels was come before *Ballinagooby*, one of our Frontier Garrisons in that County, a Detachment was sent from thence to its Relief, which the Enemy having notice of, they retired in disorder, and the Garrison sallied out, killed several, and took 7 Prisoners. We hear from *Belfast* of the arrival there of some Danish Recruits.

Falmouth, March 26. Yesterday put to Sea out of this Harbor the *Guinea* Frigate, Captain *Chanterell* Commander, from *Guinea*; The *Benjamin* of *London* from *Virginia*; And the *Richard* and *John* of *London* from *Jamaica*; All bound under the Convoy of the *Virgin's Grace* for the *Downes*.

Plymouth, March 29. On the 25th came in here one of Their Majesties Ships with several Merchant Men from *Falmouth*, which set sail again on the 27th for the *Downes*. The same day went to Sea the *Plymouth*, and the *Pembrook*. And in the Evening appeared off of this place about 30 Sail bound to the Westward, who were forced the next day by contrary Winds to put into this Port, being the Transport Ships with the *Earl of Marleborough's* Regiment of Fusiliers, and Colonel *Fitzpatrick's* Regiment, designed for *Flanders*, under the Convoy of the *Nonsuch*, and the *Milford*; They came last from *Milford Haven*, and have likewise on Board 6 or 700 Irish Prisoners. The Merchant Ships bound for the *Downes*, under the Convoy of the *Virgin's Grace*, were put back yesterday. Here are arrived the *Samuel* of *London* from the *West-Indies*; the *Three Brothers* of *London* from *Boston*; the *Elizabeth* of *London* from *Jamaica*; and the *Blossom* of *London* from *Antegoa*.
