REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE, BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF YORK, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY.

By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be *very distinctly written* on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

IT is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council that the Parliament be prorogued from Monday, the fifth day of March, to Monday, the twelfth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, to be then holden for the despatch of divers urgent and important affairs; and that the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain do cause a Commission to be prepared and issued in the usual manner for proroguing the Parliament accordingly.

THE following Statutes, made on the twenty-fourth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, by the Governing Body of the House of Christ Church, Oxford, at a meeting specially summoned for the purpose and passed by the votes of not less than two-thirds of those present and voting have been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

Certain Statutes as altered by the Governing Body on the twenty-fourth January one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, by the additions and alterations of the words in *italics*.

STATUTE X.

1. For payment of the Salaries of Tutors and Lecturers, and for the defraying of other expenses connected with the instruction of the Scholars and other Undergraduate Members of the House, there shall be a fund to be called "The Tuition Fund," into which shall be paid:

(a.) The Tuition Fees of the Undergraduate Members of the House.

(b.) A contribution from the general revenues of the House at the rate of not more than £5 per annum for each Undergraduate Member of the House receiving Tuition.

The Tuition Fund shall be apportioned between the Tutors and Lecturers, and applied to the payment of such other expenses as aforesaid, by and under the authority of a Board to be called the
