Falmouth, May 25.

No he 20th instant, came in here an Ostender from the Bay of Biseay, having been there impressed for the service of His Catholique Majesty, and was now passing for Flanders, having aboard her 300 Soldiers with their Officers: with them, as they report, came out Don Fuan with 28 sail of ships, intending for the Netherlands, but were by Tempest scattered, and this vessel for some time forced up into St. Georges Channel.

Rome, May 9. Yesterday in the Evening departed hence Bayly Vincenzo Rospiglioss in order to his Imbarcation, intending for Palo, a Fortress belonging to Cardinal Orsino, about 12 miles to the Bastward of Civita Vecchia, where he expects the arrival of his Gallies. 'Tis said the Gallies of Maltha are at sea ready to joyn with them, to which may be added a Squadron of the French, under the Popes Banner, and the Command of his General.

Father Octomano is also embarqued, to whom the Pope has given his Breif, dispensing with his change of habit, from a Dominican to the Turkish sashion, at his arrival at

Candia,

Genous, May 23. The French Fleet, confishing of 14 men of war, and 11 Gallies are riding at Alassia near Cape Melo, where they have continued about a week, pretending to expect farther Orders to be brought thither to them Their design is not yet known; only some dicou so, as if the the men of War were invended for Tripoly, and the Gallies under the Popes banner for Candia. However, this Republique have ordered some recruits to be sent for Savona, to reinforce that Garrison, and have employed an Bujecet thither from Milan, to take a view of the sortifications, and give order for what shall be necessary for the strengthning of that place.

From Milan we are told, that the new Governour having taken into his confideration the many burthens which have lain upon the people, and the too just complaints made to him of their fufferings. has for their eale began to reform some perions who received constant pay from the Publique, without doing the duty and service of Soldiers. He has also lessened the Companies of his Guards, reducing that of his Lancesto an hundred men only, that of 200 reformed Officers, and another of Harquebusses, to furscore men apiece, Intending likewise the same method in the rest of his Cavalry, and Insantry, and to take away all the lesser Officers, and what other places shall be thought to be unnecess.

From Turin we are told of the arrival there of several Deputies and Commissioners from the City of Geneva, who were disappointed of their expected Autience from the Duke, by reason of his absence, but had in the mean while made their applications to the French Ambassador, and to the Marquiss de St. Tomaso the Secretary of State, and 'twas hoped, such moderation would be used on both sites, in dispensing with some inconsiderable punctility's, that a right ton terstanding might in luttle time be settled between both parties.

Hambourg, May 28. Although we have now the cettain-

sy of the Peace, Concluded and Proclaimed between the two Crowns of Frante and Spain, as yet no step is put to the Leavies about these parts. Some time the next month is to be solemnized a Marriage between his Electoral Highness of Brandenbourg, and the Princess Dowager of Celles morder whereumo are made great preparations, and several Rarities procured from this place.

From Stockholm we are informed, that the Diet is to begin there the next M nth, at which, somewhat will be refolved as to the keeping up or disbanding their Army.

From Munster we are told, that the French and Lorain forces were conjoyn'd, not wishout a suspicion that they might find an employment under the Elector of Cologne, for the reduction of the City of that name to his Obedience, but as yet we hear not of any Action passed in order these-unto.

Letters from Warfam tell us, that the King is not yet arrived, but in short time expected at that Ciry, where the most principal Senators intended to meet about the 9th of the next Month, to appoint a day for the General Convention or

Diet.

They also advise us that the Polande's have in readiness a flour Arn y of 50000, men to act against the Cossacks and Tartars, should they endeavous to attempt upon any part of that Kingdom, or particularly upon Uktania; farthet telling us, that the Tunkish Sultan had deposed the new Cham of Tartary, and re establish the Old one in his p. scs, who seemed much inclined to hold a good correspondency with Poland; and had accordingly dispatche a considerable person of Quality, one of His Councel of State, who is on his way, and may be suddenly expected at Warsam; but the success of his Negotiation seems to be doubtful, since ('tis faid) he is instructed to insist upon the King of Polands Renunciation of his Alliance made with the Muscovice, to which that King is not at all inclined.

Liege, June 1. The French forces under the Command of the Duke of Luxembourg, having continued some time at Cornellis Munsier where they received great store of Provisions, and drew large Contributions both from Geldgrand and other parts within their power; on the 26th past,

retired again into the Dutchy of Limbourg.

The City of Cologne feems to be now fatisfied by the French Envoyê, that the forces now in Limbourg are now differences between the Elector, and that City, may in little time admir of a Reconciliation, by reason of the powerful Mediations which are used in Order thereunto. The point of Jurisdiction, being the principle business under dispute, in which 'tis believe', both parties seem inclinable to a Moderation; and as to the other business concerning several Members of the City, whom the Elector has required may be given up to him, that Justice may be done on them for some severe Language used against him: the Cuy seems resolved not to concurr for their delivery, but are contented that the business be reserved to the arbitration of persons industreen, to who e sentence they will refer them.

However, the City stands still upon its Guarda but has,

not taken in above 2 o Soldiers to their affistance.

Paris, June 2. On Wednessay last, His Majesty, wish the principal persons of the Court, was peens at the Church, de Nostro Dame, where To Denn was solemnly sung for the happy conclusion of the peace between the two Crowns. No certain resolution is yet taken about the resormation of the Army; only the Regiment of Swiffes is to be self-ined, and their pay reduced to five Crowns a Month, and the German forces which were raised by the Privees of Fur-

frembourg for His Majesties service to be dismist.

The Prince de Sultzbach has in his addiesses to His Majesty, returned his thanks for the forces which he was permitted to Leavy and Command in His Majesties service, and has sentone of his Gentleme to Treat with the Venetian Ambassador, to be received with them into the ter-

vice of that Re-publick.

His Majesty is now publishing an Ordinance containing Articles, in which, amongst other things, he paties an Act of Oblivion and pardon to all such as ill this present time have deserted the Army, but declaring for the su ure, that of every three Soldiers which shall be found to quit the fervice without leave, one of them shall be shot to death, and the other two condemned f r ever to the Gallies, according as their Lot falls That no Soldier, though after four years service, shall quit the service without leave given him in writing, according to form. That every Horseman is to have it from his Captain, and every other Common fol, dier from his Camp Master; and that Officers be obliged to keep an exact List of all Soldiers which defert the lervice, which they are to communicate to the Commisfaries of War, and these to the Intendents of Justice in each Province, who are to employ their several Provosts to make diligent learch after such persons.

Paris, June 6. Notwithstanding the conclusion and proclamation of peac., there has been lately given out from the Chancellour fixey new Commissions for horse and foor;

but for what employment is not yet known.

The Prince of Conde's Army continues still about Air, la Chapelle, and the Orders which were issuing out to disband them, are again revoked, till the difference between the Elector and City of Cologne be stated to the satisfaction of that Prince.

From Marseilles we are told that the Artillery confishing of 120 Great Guns taken out of Franche Comte, are there arrived, and will be employed aboard the new ships which

are in readinels to put to lea.

From Franche Comte wo are informed, that a Captain of that County had put himself into one of the Castles of that Province, with some Soldiers, pretending to defend it for the Spaniard, of which the Sieur de Gadagne having in telligence, sent him a Summons, commanding his obedience, to which the Captain returned, that the whole Province being by the Articles of Peace to be restored to Spain, he was not obliged to own his power; which the

Sieur de Gadzgne ill restituing, mare' ed towards the place with a considerable state to reduc it; but the Captain finding himfels unside to make resi ance, quinted the Cestle, and sted for safety into Swizzerland.

Hague, June 3. The Field Marshal Wurth is gone stom hence as he intended for Bergen op Joom, to take a view of the forces forme by d signed for a styling Army, and to see them Exercise, which ended, they are to be ordered into the Quarte s allotted for them.

The Commissioners of the Admirally have been three or four days consulting with several of the States Deputies about their Maritime affairs; the States having sent several of their Members to the lexel, to take a view of the quadron which is riding there, to see them so with a line. cossiliaries, and to order them to set fail with all to veriant speed so the Downs. The 18 men of War which we ordered to be new seatled for a long voying, are failining out with all dillegence.

On Finday last, Prince Maissive of Nassaw took his leave of he States, and is tree departed hence, intending for cleves, where he may reduce for some conderable time. Iruges, Jine 6. From Zealand we are told, that the Knights of Malibal having folicited the States for the Restitution of the r Lands formerly seized on in the times of Reformation, with the Aircrass due fince their expulsion, have upon resulal, given

out Letters of Reprizal upon their thips.

Portsmouth, May 28. Several of our men of War are, still at Spitthead, detained by unfavourable winds, ele Drazon only, with one Merchant Ship from Barbades are gone out as far as St. Fellens.

On Tu slay night, arrived at Spitthead, the Roe Buck from the Ille of Jersey 3 and yeste day morning, the Eagle Fregat from Guernsey, giving us only this advice, that the French were pressing all the seamen they could meet with at St. Maloes to send aboard their Fleet.
