Rome, March 17.

ON Sunday last dyed here Cardinal Giulio Spinola, in the 79th year of his Age, and by his Death a second Place is become vacant in the College of Cardinals. The same day *Dejino*, *Ciceri*, *Durazzo*, and *Giudici*, entred into the Conclave, where are now 51 Cardinals. *Colonna* and *Rubini* are not yet gone in, by reason of their Indisposition. *Colonias* arrived here yesterday from *Vienna*; *Pignatelli*, *Caraffa*, and *Cantelmi*, are expected to morrow, and the French Cardinals (who are arrived at *Leghorne*) on Tuesday next. In the Conclave, the Party of the Zealots continue to have their Eye upon *Barberigo* Bishop of *Padua*, as the likeliest to pursue the measures of *Innocent XI.* though others speak in favour of *Marescotti*. The Prince *de Lichtenstein* has received Orders from the Emperor, to take upon him the Character of his Ambassador Extraordinary, and is accordingly preparing a very splendid Equipage to appear in that Quality.

Venice, March 23: The last advices from *Corfou* tell us, that the Turks continue to attack *Vallona*, and the Besieged to defend themselves with great Resolution; and confirm the unfortunate death of Major-Gen. *Spar*, who, in a Sally he made out of that place, was accidentally killed by a Cannon shot from the Town. By a Vessel arrived here in 29 days from *Constantinople* we hear, that the Grand Signior and the Visier were come thither, and that their Preparations for the next Campagne were carried on with extraordinary Application.

Vienna, March 29. An Express has been lately sent to Prince *Louis of Baden*, who is now in *Bohemia*, to hasten his coming hither, in order to take upon him the Command of the Imperial Army in *Hungary*. In the mean time the Forces are marching thither, and Orders are given for the forming a flying Camp near *Ejock* to cover that place, till such time as the main Army can be brought into the Field. A Courier, who arrived here two days ago from *Buda*, relates, that on the 23d a Fire broke out in the Castle, which, had it not been timely extinguished, would have seized the Magazine, and endangered the whole Town. And that the Turks at *Hocke* have laid a Bridge over the *Danube*, and to secure it have built a Fort on the other side of the River, which is defended by 2000 Janisaries. Letters of the 18th from *Croasia* say, that Signior *Mich. Viharich* (who commands at *Zrin*) had sent out several Parties, who brought back a great many Prisoners. Count *Waldstein* is returned from Investing

Prince *James of Poland* with the Order of the *Golden Fleece*, which Ceremony was performed at *Kempen* on the 16th instant, and the 25th was appointed for the Solemn Entrance of the Prince and Princess into *Warsaw*. We have advice, that a Turkish Envoy, and another from *France*, are arrived at the Court of *Moscow* with Overtures of Peace, but that the Czars show no inclination toarken to them.

Cologne, April 10. The Elector of *Bavaria* arrived here on the 5th instant from the *Hague*, and parted again the next morning, taking his Journey strait towards *Erfingen*, in order to draw together the Imperial and Confederate Forces on the *Upper Rhine*. The Troops of *Hesse* have moit of them passed the *Rhine* at *Coblentz*, with Orders, as we are told, to march towards the *Eyffel*, and to join with those of *Munster*. The Landgrave of *Hesse* passed on the 6th through this place in his way towards *Aix la Chapelle*.

Paris, April 7. The Letters from the Camp before *Mons* of the 4th instant tell us, that on the first the French Guards, with other Detachements, made a great attack upon a Hornwork near the Gate of *Barlemont*, which they took, but before they had half lodged themselves, the Besieged returned, and beat them out again, killing a great many of our Men, and taking 6 or 7 Officers Prisoners; The Marquis *de Boufflers*, Lieutenant-General, was wounded with a Musquet Shot in the Head; the Duke *de Mansfort*, eldest Son to the Duke *de Choiseul*, was likewise wounded; and several other Officers were killed and wounded. The next day Detachements of the Granadiers of the Guards, of the King's Musquetiers, and of the Swiss Guards, were ordered to make a second attack upon the Hornwork, which was for a long time defended by the Besieged, but we at last made our selves Masters of it; Since this Action, in which we lost a great many Men and Officers, and among others the Son of the Prince *de Courtenay*, we have advanced towards a Half-Moon, between the said Hornwork and the Counterscarp of the place, and on the 3d we raised a Battery against it; Our Bombs have occasioned several Fires in the Town, but they were soon quenched, and the Besieged give us much more work than we expected.

The *Sieur Catinat* has sent an Officer hither with the news of his having taken upon Articles *Villa Franca*, and the Forts of *St. Opreto* and *Montalban*; they are places of no strength, and consequently could make little resistance; the first had only a Garrison of 3 or 400 Men, who surrendered the 21st past, and were conducted with 2 Pieces of Cannon to *Ozeglia*; after this, the *Sieur Catinat* attack'd *Nizza*; The Town is weak, and cannot hold out, but the Castle is strong, and very well provided. The French Cardinals, *viz. d'Esiree*, *Bouillon*, and *Camus*, arrived at *Rome* the 24th of the last Month.

Hall, April 12. On the 8th instant (as we told you in our last) the Town of *Mons* Capitulated, and in the afternoon the Articles were signed for the Surrender of the Place, according to which the Garrison marched on the Tuesday following; All the Accounts we have received do agree in this, That the Garrison could have held out 8 or 10 days longer; They had but about 500 Men killed and wounded during the Siege, and wanted neither Ammunition nor Provisions; The Enemy had only gained a Hornwork, and there still remained 2 Half-Moons for them to take before they could come to the Counterscarp of the place.

place, and in the attack they made upon one of these Half Moons, the 7th at night, they were repulsed with great loss; but the Burglers being terrified by the Enemies Bombs, which had burnt part of the Town, and their fears being improved by the influence of their Priests, the principal of them with two Abbots went to the Governor, and pressed him to Capitulate, which he refusing, they sent a Drum of their own upon the Walls of the Town and beat a Parley; The Governor was at last forced to consent to it, and the French readily granted them very honourable Conditions. But had they held out but 3 or 4 days longer, we had certainly come up to their Relief.

Yesterday His Majesty took a review of the Foot, and this day of the Horse and the Dragons; The whole Army is computed at 50000 men, but every body allows it to be 25000 effective.

The French King is returned to Paris, and we are told, that a Detachment of the French Army is gone towards the Rhine. There was a report, that some French Troops were moving towards Charleroy, but it proves a mistake; However two Battalions are sent to reinforce that Garison, and the Troops that were ordered from thence to joyn the Army are countermanded. The Garison of Mons passed this day through our Camp.

The King intends to return on Saturday next to the Hague, from whence it's believed His Majesty will go for England.

Hague, April 13. The Letters come in this morning from Flanders give an account, that the Garison of Mons, after a very vigorous defence, was compelled by the Burglers to Capitulate on Sunday last; That they had very honourable Conditions granted them, viz. To march out with their Arms and Baggage, Colours flying, Drums beating, 6 Pieces of Cannon, 2 Mortars, 30 covered Wagons, and 50 Persons in Masks, &c. That on Tuesday the 10th instant they marched out accordingly, and were conducted by 6 French Squadrons to Tulse. Of the Garison, there were only killed and wounded during the Siege between 3 and 400 men, and among the first, the Sieur de Ville Colonel of Dragons, the Major of the Spanish Regiment of Marino, and 6 Captains, with some other Officers. The Squadron of this State is fitting out with all possible diligence, and 30 Capital Ships will be ready to Sail in few days, under the command of Admiral Tromp. The Letters from Leghorn of the 26th past tell us, that the English and Dutch Convoy was arrived there with the Turkey and other Merchant Ships from Messina. The French King returned yesterday towards Versailles.

We have advice that Eight French Ships richly laden from Smirna have been lately taken by some English Privateers in the Archipelago, in one of which were found 38000 Pieces of Eight, and the Ratified Treaty between the Ottoman Port and the French King.

Dublin, April 1. This week was Published here a Proclamation, dated the 26th of the last Month; Which sets forth:

That notwithstanding the Great Clemency extended by Their Majesties to the Popish Irish Inhabitants of this Kingdom, whereby upon their Submission they have had equal Protection with their English and Protestant Subjects, yet such is the implacable and inveterate Malice of many of the said Popish Irish, that upon all occasions they not only relieve Their Majesties Enemies, but joyn with them in the committing and concealing many horrid Murders; One of which, of Eight Soldiers of Their Majesties Army inhumanly strangled at one time, and in one place, hath (by Gods Providence) been lately discovered near this City to have been committed by the Inhabitants of the place where the said Soldiers were quartered, for which some of the Criminals have received just and deserved Punishment. And the Lords Justices being fully satisfied, that such Offences cannot be committed in the open and well peopled Counties of this Kingdom, without the contrivance and help, or at least connivance, of the protected Inhabitants, and having received full Information, that there is a Confederacy among many of the said protected Irish, to give all Aid and Relief in their Power to their Majesties Enemies upon all occasions, and to take all opportunities to destroy the Officers and Soldiers of their Majesties Army, and other their good Subjects; Their Lordships being resolved to prevent, as much as in them lies, such their cruel and malicious Designs, and to Punish with all necessary Severity those who shall be Guilty, or justly suspected of the same, do publish and declare, That if any such Murder shall hereafter be committed in any place within Their Majesties Quarters, if the Popish Inhabitants of that Neighbourhood shall not use their utmost

diligence to apprehend the Malefactors, and immediately discover all they know of such Fact to some Magistrate living near the place where the said Offence shall be committed, so as that the said Offenders may be apprehended and brought to Punishment; That then the said Popish Irish Inhabitants of the Parish where the said Murder shall be committed, shall immediately be put out of Their Majesties Protection, and Orders shall thereupon be given, that they be proceeded against as Spies and Enemies according to the course of War.

Plymouth, Apr. 5. On the 2d instant sailed from hence the 2 Regiments designed for Flanders. Yesterday passed by this Port about 30 Sail of Merchant Ships, which we believe to be the Canary Fleet; and this day likewise passed by about 18 Sail from O Parte, one of their Company being put in here.

Deal, April 7. On the 4th instant came into the Downs the Transport Ships with the Earl of Marlborough's and Colonel Fitzpatrick's Regiment from Plymouth, and on the 5th they set sail again together with the Earl of Bath's Regiment for Ostend. This day arrived in the Downs the Canary Fleet with their Convoy.
