Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Room are requested to bring with them to the Drawing Room two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or Daughters-in-law

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be very distinctly written on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in [order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

NIGHT WORK. MALE YOUNG PERSONS ABOVE 16.

Order of Secretary of State extending Special

Exception.

WHEREAS the Factory and Workshop Act, 1878, section 58, contains a special exception to the effect that nothing in the Act shall prevent the employment, in factories to which the exception applies, of male young persons during the night, if they are employed in accordance with the following conditions:

(1.) The period of employment shall not exceed 12 consecutive hours, and shall begin and end at the hours specified in the notice in the Act mentioned; and

(2.) The provisions of Part One of the Act with respect to the allowance of times for meals to young persons during the period of employment shall be observed, with the necessary modifications as to the hour at which the times allowed for meals are fixed; and

(3.) A male young person employed during any part of the night shall not be employed during any part of the 12 hours preceding or succeeding the period of employment; and

(4.) A male young person shall not be employed on more than 6 nights, or in the case of blast furnaces or paper mills 7 nights, in any two weeks:

And the said Act declares that the provisions of the Act with respect to the period of employment on Saturday, and with respect to the allow-

ance to young persons of 8 half holidays in every year or of whole holidays in lieu of them, shall not apply to a male young person employed in day and night turns in pursuance of this exception:

And whereas this special exception is by the Act applied to the factories specified in Part Six of the Third Schedule thereto, but power is given to a Secretary of State to extend such exception to other classes of non-textile factories and workshops:

And whereas it has been proved to my satisfaction that in non-textile factories of the class mentioned in the schedule hereunder it is necessary, by reason of the nature of the business requiring the process to be carried on throughout the night, to employ male young persons of sixteen or upwards at night, and that such employment will not injure the health of the male young persons employed:

Now I, the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by this Order, made under section 58 of the said Act, extend the said exception to factories of such class so far as regards male young persons of sixteen or upwards.

This Order shall come into effect on the 21st May, 1894, and shall continue in force until revoked.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1893, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered,

1. Notwithstanding anything in the Foreign Animals Order of 1893, dated the twenty-seventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, sheep landed at the landing-place for foreign animals at Thames Haven in the port of London, may, with the permission in writing of an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture, be reshipped for conveyance to the Foreign Animals Wharf, known as the Foreign Cattle Market at Deptford, subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel (in this Order called the reshipment-vessel) into which the sheep are reshipped be provided by the Local Authority for the City of London, and be specially fitted and appropriated for the purpose of

conveying such sheep.
Second. That the Local Authority for the City of London have received the special permission of the Commissioners of Customs so to employ the reshipment-vessel under this Order.

- 2. Those sheep shall be reshipped in the presence and under the supervision and control of an Officer of Customs, and an Officer of Customs shall remain in charge of the sheep on board the reshipment-vessel until its arrival at the Foreign Animals Wharf.
- 3. The reshipment-vessel shall proceed direct to that Wharf, and the sheep shall be landed there in the presence and under the supervision and control of an Officer of Customs.
- -(1.) The reshipment-vessel shall immediately after each occasion of use and before being again used, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:
 - (i.) All parts of the reshipment-vessel with which the sheep or their droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept: then
 - (ii.) The same parts of the reshipment-vessel shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water: then
 - (iii.) The same parts of the reshipment-vessel shall have applied to them a coating of limewash: except that
 - :(iv.) The application of lime-wash shall not be compulsory as regards such parts of the reshipment-vessel as are used for passengers or crew.
- (2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the reshipment-vessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.
- 5. The sheep so reshipped shall continue to be deemed foreign animals.
- 6. If anything is done or omitted to be done in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, the owner or consignee of the sheep, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the reshipment-vessel, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.
- 7. Terms in this Order have the same meaning as in the Foreign Animals Order of 1893.
