of the Garifon, and dimounced all their Cannon; and of the befiegers above 40 were killed or wounded by the peices of Timber, Stones, Or. that fell into the Trenches. This Misfortune obliged the Governor to Capitulate, and on the 2d the Articles were Signed, by which it was agreed, that one of the Gates of the Cattle should be delivered up on the 4th, and that the Garifon should march out on the 1th, with Arms and Baggage, Colours siying, 4 peices of Cannon, and be condusted to Oseglia, which was accordingly performed.
