My Lord,

I have the honour to inform your Lordshipthat the report circulated that cases of Asiatic cholera have appeared in this city is entirely without foundation. The public health of Antwerp and neighbourhood is excellent, and the death rate is said to be far below the average of other vears at this season.

A few cases of cholera or cholerine appeared. in the district of Liège some weeks back; but I learn that the disease, whatever it may have been, was stamped out through the energetic measures taken by the Belgian authorities.

If the contents of this letter could be made public I feel sure that the Antwerp authorities and Exhibition Committee would be very grateful to your Lordship.
