*Frankfurt, April 17.* The Advices from Dresden do assure us, that the Elector of Saxony's Forces will be on the Rhine by the middle of the next month, and that his Electoral Highness intends to command them in Person if his health will permit. The Elector of Bavaria had, in his return from the Hague, a Conference with the Elector of Trier at Coblenz, and with the Great Master of the Teutonic Order, and General Thungen at Lesheym; He arrived on the 9th instant at Hydelberg, and 'twas said, that his Electoral Highness would go from thence directly to Munickern, to give orders for 4000 men of his Troops (which were before designed for Hungary) to march immediately to the assistance of the Duke of Savoy.

*Hamburgh, April 17.* The Letters from Dresden say, that the Forces of Saxony, to the number of 12 or 14000 men, are preparing for their march, to joyn the Confederate Army on the Upper Rhine. And from Berlin they write, that several Brandenburg Troops are ordered to march towards Cleves, to reinforce those that have had their Quarters this Winter near the Meuse. The Sieur de Haxbuisen, Envoy Extraordinary from Denmark, passed through this place on the 13th instant in his way to Berlin.

*Cologne, April 17.* The Forces of Hesse are now encamped on the River Abr, where it's believed they will be joyned by those of Munster and Neubourg. Commissions will be suddenly given out for the Raising the six new Regiments, which the States of this Diocese have resolved to maintain at their own Charge during the War. We hear from the Upper Rhine, that the Imperial and Confederate Troops have orders to be in a readiness to march into the Field by the middle of the next month.

*Edinburgh, April 11.* The last Letters from Inverness give an account, that things are very quiet there, and that they did not hear of any motion of the Highlanders. The Ships bound for Flanders, with Recruits for the Scotch Regiments, lie ready to Sail with the first fair Wind.

*Falmouth, April 13.* This Day arrived here the Spanish Alliance Pacquet-Boat in six Days from the Groyne; There came out with her a Spanish Ship richly laden, but they had not been 24 Hours at Sea when she sprung a Leak, and was obliged to put in again for the Shore. The Emanuel of Copenhagen is come into this Port bound for St. Sebastions.

*Plimouth, April 14.* Here are come in no Vessels since my last, except the Charity of Copenhagen, with another Foreign Vessel bound for Lisbon.
