No. 447.—BAL TIC STATION.

BAL TIC—SOUTHERN APPROACH TO THE SOUND.

Faxö Bay—Intended Leading Lights.

THE Danish Government has given notice, that during the year 1894, the undermentioned leading lights will be exhibited in Faxö Bay:—

1. At the north end of Fedet Peninsula a rear light and two front lights will be shown:—

a. The rear light will be a fifth order, catoptric, fixed white light, visible from S. 72° W., through west, to N. 88° W., a distance of ten miles in clear weather; it will be elevated 31 feet above the sea, and shown from a post 24 feet in height.

Approximate position, lat. 55° 10' 20" N., long. 12° 6' 25" E.

b. The northern front light will be a fourth order, catoptric, fixed green light, visible from S. 74° W. to West, a distance of eight miles in clear weather; it will be elevated 17 feet above the sea, and shown from the gable of a brown, wooden building, 16 feet high, with a masonry
