THE following further Addresses and Resolutions of Congratulation on the occasion of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York giving Birth to a Prince, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been laid before Her Majesty, who has been pleased to receive the same very graciously:—

To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

Madam,

WE, the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the Province of York in Convocation assembled, desire to approach Your Majesty with the expression of our loyal joy and devotion to Your Majesty, and of our gratitude to Almighty God that He has granted to Your Majesty to see a Prince in the fourth generation of the direct line born in Your Royal House.

Your Majesty's care for the happiness of all Your people causes Your subjects to feel as blessings to themselves every event which gives a domestic or personal gratification to Your Majesty.

In this instance, they have further cause for gratitude in this far-reaching promise of the stability of your Royal line on the Throne of Your Ancestors, while the loved and admired character of his illustrious Parents affords, by God's blessing, the best hope that the Infant Prince will be trained and live in all those principles and associations which Your Majesty's reign has best exemplified, and which are most dear to Your Majesty's subjects.
