He fames, a thip of three hundred Tuns, helongin, to this Port, arriving lately from Rechelle, informs us, that the French Fleer were ordered to repair to Breft, as the place of their Rendezvous, and accordingly, 8 men of War were going thi-

ther from Rochelle, one of them carrying 82 Brais Guns, intended for the Duke de Beaufort, and to ferve as Admiral.

Vienna, May 26. The Imperial Court has not been a little displeased, that a Courrier dispatcht bence for Spain with Letters of Importance, carrying with him a Passe-Port from the French Ambassadour for the security of his passage, was notwithstanding seised on at Lyons, and his Letters taken from him.

The 22th inftant arrived here Prince Leopold Guillaume de Baden. The Count ds Maradas Mafter of the Horfe to the Empreis Eleanor, is by His Imperial Majefty taken into the number of his Privy Councellors, and his Charge conferred on Count Charles de Wallenstein

From Hungary we are told that the Leffer Affembly of States ftill continues at Cofforia, where they are confidering their Grievances, and preparing for a more General Diet; and that the States of the Lower Hungary are earneftly bent upon the Election of a Palatine, and have fome. inclinations to confer it upon General Gorgas. They have not had of late any diffutbance from the Turks; who keep quiet within their limits; but have lately drawn out of feveral of their Garri ons a body of 8 or 10000 men, which, as they give out, are intended to be fant into Dalmatis.

Venice, May 26. Our late advices from Candia inform us, that the City is in a good poflute of defence, and had lately made two fallies upon the Enemy, wherein they had giyen large teffimonies of their courage, by the flaughter made upon the Turks. That Seignior Claudio Arraffi, a Serjeant Major, and Seignior Mutto Mattei, Major General of the Ecclediattical forces, both which had fignalized their valours in the late fuccelsful engagement of the Beiler-Gallies, dyed fome days fince in that City of the wounds they received in that encounter. They tell us also, that the Viliers Army which was reduced to a fmall number, full continuéd the Siege, and endeavoured by their Mines to work themfelves under the Fort Panigra, and the Half Moon of Mocenigo, but the Defindants diligently employing themfelves in their Countermines, had frustrated and defeated them in the attempt.

That two of the Vifiers principal Engineets are lately dead, and this remaining forces much difcouraged by their general want; which couled them daily to defert their Colours; but they also inform us, that the Captain Baffa arrived lately'ar Ganea with 18 Gallies and 2 oo Foot for their affiftance, and was again put to fea with feven other Gallies which the found there i and that they in litt e time expected the Great Turkifh Fleet, which is faid to confil of 70 Gallies, whereon were to be embarked 7000 Janifaties from Confitantinople, and 5000 Spahies from Smirna, befides other forces i and that the Grand Seignior continuing his Refolution for the carrying on of the War, intended to encourage the work by his n arer approach, and that preparations were decordingly making at Athenes for his Receptions and that in Mores the people were but little inclinable to the War, but fo incepied sgainft the Turkifh Soldiery, that they took all "a wantages upon them, as the recould find them fitag ing in Ima'l parties. The Senate here is not a little pleafed at the happy News of the final conclusion of the Peace between France and spain, hoping by this means the Christian Princes may bare leifure and opportunity to unite themfelves against the Common Enemy, and put fome frop to his proceedings in the Mediterransan. By Letters from Paris they are also affured that His Most Christian Majesty had conferred that the Duke of Lorraine fhould fend $4 \cos 0$ Foot to the affistance of this Republick under the Command of his Son the Duke de Vaudemont, half of them to be entertained upon the expences of the laid Duke of Lorraine, the reft to end the inpay upon the account of the Venetians.

ter into pay upon the account of the Venerians. A fmall Vefiel lately arrived here meo the Convey fome time fince put to fea from hence, failing with a fair wind towards Zante; fo that we hope they may speedily arrive av Candia.

A Feluca artiving from Dalmatia, cells us that all things as yet continue quiet in those parts, only a Party of 200 Morlachs made two attempts upon the Enemies Quarters, but found them in 6 good a posture of defence, that they were both times obliged to return without any confiderable Booty.

Hambourgh, June z. The Swedes forces continue as formerly in their Quarters, and as you there is no farther discourse of their removal. Their General the Conftable Wrangel, is at present at his own Castle of Wrangelbourg in Pomerania, somewhat indisposed in his body, but more afflicted in mind for the loss of his Son, a whog lately died in England.

Prince George ; second Son to His Majely of Denmarks' intends to spend sometime in taking a view of forreign parts, and may in order thereunto depart from Gopenhagen in two or three dayes, in company with the Eldest Son of the Duke Erness Ganter, intending for Holland, and from thence to passe into France.

From Warfam we are informed that Dodes Aga is in lithe time expected there from the Cham of Tarsary, to fettle a good Correspondency with the Crown of Poland, end to define the renewing of the Pesce formerly made at Podhuys, bringing for a Prefent to His Majofiy 300 Christian Slaves; which the Cham has for at liberty.

They farther lay that His Majelty of Poland having defigned the Reformation of part of the Army in Lythuania, the Officets taking it ill, were entring into a League and Confederation; which the Chancellour taking notice of, put a flop to it, by his timely addreffes to them y affuring them of His Majelties defire to entertain them : and 'twas believed they might find an Employment in Ukrania, bur as yet the Robel Coffacks grown jealous of the Tartars, have not made any diffurbance upon the Frontlers of Poland.

The King is not yet strived, but daily expected at War, fam, and 'tis believed has a defign to make refignation of his Crown and Scepter, and retire himfelf to a private life, which if accepted, he may afterwards by a Declaration, di charge his Subjects f on their Oath of Obedience.

Tis likewife (sid, that the Chancellour of Polands having been fulpected to have held a private correspondency with the Mulcovites, in relation to the fucceflion, is fallen from the Kings favour, and retired to Vilna, the Vice-chancel lour fupplying his room.

Aix la Chapelle, June 4. On Friday last, was published ed here the Peace, concluded and ratified between the two Growns of *Trange and Ppain*, and the next day, Monfieur Colbers, Plenipotentiary from His Most Christian Majesty, went vent hence for Liege on his way homewards, the principal Burgomafters, and the Popes Nuncio conducting him about half a mile out of he Town, and leveral of the Great Guns faluting him at his departure : the greatest part of his Buggage is still behind, and may in little time be sent away towards Brabant.

The French continue still to quarter in the Dutchy of Limbourg, collecting their Contributions which they formerly required and charged upon that Countrey, as they have also done in Upper-Guelderland, resolving not to remove till the fumms to charged be paid in; but tome difficulty arifing in the Collection of the Moneys in Guelderland, the Spanish Governor not confenting thereunto, but father prohibiting the payment thereof ; thereupon, the French Army began yeiterday to remove their Quarters, and have defirein'd upon much Cattle, Horles, Sheep, and other Goods, and plundered leveral houles. In the mean time, the States of that Countrey have fent to the Marquis de Caffel Rodrigo, Governour of the Spanish Netherlands, to consult with him upon this point, whole tetu n is expected with much imparience by reason of the spoils which are during this time, made by the French upon them.

At the defire and folicitation of the Sieur d' Espense Lieutenant Ge eral of the French forces in those parts, the Magistrates ordered publick notice to be given here for all perions concerned to hasten in the moneys charged upon them as their parts of the Contribution required, and to pay it to the Receivers with 11 the speed they are able; that neither them eves nor their Neighbours may be farther endammaged in their Estates, by the continuance of those Forces amongs them.

Hague, June 7. His Highnels the Prince of Orarge having on Monday last been prefere at the Rendezvous of the Army near Berg-op-zoom, where they were drawn into Battalia and exercised by the Field Masshall Wartz, is again returned hither, and the Army ordered to their Quatters, till farther resolution be taken concerning them.

The Deputies of the Admirally are in daily Conference with the States Commiffioners about the Concernments of the Fleet; belides thole 18 Men of Wat which are theathing for a long Voyage, 18 more are to be fent away towards the Streights.

The States having been follicited by the Segnior Marquifini the Venetian Ambassadour for fuccours and affisance against their Common Enemy; have ordered feveral Commissioners to receive his Propositions; and make report to them of his demands.

Don Francisco de Melo Ambassadour from the Crown of Portugal, has lately given a Treat to the Spanish and French Ambassadours; he has lately adressed himself to the States, defiring the release of the Sieur MIOA Refident from that Crown, upon caution given to his Creditors for the fecutivy of fuch Debts as are owing by him; the Ambassadour himself intending this week to depart hence for England, on his way towards Lisbonne.

Bruffels, June 8. On Thursday morning last, Sir William Tample, Resident from His Majesly of Great Brittain, having taken his leave of his Excellency the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo, left this City with his whole Family and Equipage, and took his way towards Holland. Yesterday, the Marquis went to take a view of our for-

Yesterday, the Marquis went to take a view of our forces which were drawn up near the City, intending in few days to give order for the disbanding of a confiderable number of them.

The Peace was folemnly proclaimed here the 30th paft, and the next day at Antwerp. The French forces are fince retired, their Foot drawing off the first inflant, and were the next day followed by their Hore Since which, the Spanish 'H rie passing through this City's have taken up their Quarters for a time, but 'tis faid, a body of 6000 of them, are to be speedily sent to re-posses themselves of Franche Comte according to the Articles of Peace.

The French have lately disbanded fome Companies of Horfe and Foot b tween Aeth and Tournay, but we hear port of any pay given them at their departure. which occifions many violencies to be committed by them in the Countreys through which they pais, and put the Countrey people every where upon their Guards for the fecurity of their Goors; informuch as a kide kind of War has been made between them, and divers perfons are faid to have been kill'd in feveral places on both fides.

. Paris, June 9. The fixth inftant, all the Ambassadors and Ministers of foreign Princes, were solemnly introduced to an Audience from His Majesty at St. Germains-enlay, where they complemented him upon the happy success of the Treaty, and conclusion of the peace with Spain.

His Majesty has lately conferred the Abley of St. Germaines upon the Marquifs de Guissy, who upon His Majesties defire has refigued his Charge of Chief Master of the Wardrobe to the Sieur de Pocquelin. 'Tis faid that His Majesty hath dispatcht his Offlers se-

'Tis faid that His Majefty hath dispatcht his Offlers feveral wayes to find out Monsieur de Beaufort, fignifying his pleasure that he retire with his Fleet into Harbour, the better to prevent all inconveniences which might happen at Sea by the casual meeting of the Neighbouring Fleets which are putting out to Sea.

From Rochelle we are told that two of His Majesties Ships commanded by the Sicurs de Querjan and de Quervin, are lately returned thitlier from cluicing about the Cape Finisterre, in inquiry after forme other of the Fleet; which were leparated from their company: One of which commanded by the Sieur Languillet, is refited, and waits onely a favourable wind so reson the Fleet; and having received Orders to fail for the Mediterrancen, has taken aboard him Don Francisco Fereira Robellos; lately Envoyé from Portugat, whom he intends to land at Cafcais.

The Plague is of late forewhat encrealed about Soiffons, but care is taken to prevent its fatther foresding.

From Macfirichi we are told that the Rhirgrave the Governour of that place; has lately emploied about 6000 men at work there to repaire the Fortification of that place; intending to put it into the best polture he is able for its security.

Falmouth, May 17. The St. John of Oflend, which the 20th inftant put into this Port from Vigo in Gallicia, laderi with Soldiers, intended for Flanders, put to fea the 22 inflant with a fair wind. The 25th inftant came in here three fmall Brettons, laden with Coals from Wales, with fome difficulty having escaped the purful of an Oflend man of War, who feiled three others of their company with the fame lading.
