THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 8th February, 1895, from Her Majesty's Representative at Constantinople, enclosing Turkish quarantine notices to the following effect:—

(a.) Pilgrim ships leaving Constantinople for the Hedjar will be subject to ten days' quarantine at Clazomene, with thorough disinfection both of pilgrims' clothes, and the ship, &c.

(b.) Vessels from the coast between Cavak and Callicratia, and Cavak and Touzla, bound for a port of the Sea of Marmora, the Straits, and the European Coast up to Salonica (inclusive), are subjected to five days' quarantine with disinfection at Touzla. Those bound for Turkish ports of the Black Sea between Cavak and Sinope will undergo this quarantine at Cavak, for ports beyond Sinope at Sinope. Those bound for Turkish ports beyond Tchanak Kale will proceed to Clazomene, Beyrouth, or Tripoli in Africa to undergo the same quarantine.
