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AT the Court at Windsor, the 8th day of March, 1895.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Local Government Act, 1888," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty the Queen, by Order in Council, from time to time to alter the instructions, precepts, notices, and forms under the Registration of Electors Acts, in such manner as appears to Her Majesty necessary for carrying into effect the said Act and the County Electors Act, 1888, and any other Act for the time being in force amending or affecting the Acts above mentioned.

And whereas it appears necessary to Her Majesty for the aforesaid purpose that the instructions, precepts, notices, and forms under the Registration of Electors Acts should be altered in manner provided by this Order.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said Local Government Act, 1888, and of all other powers enabling Her on that behalf, doth declare it, and it is hereby declared, to be necessary for carrying into effect the Local Government Act, 1888, and the County Electors Act, 1888, and the other Acts in force amending or affecting the said Acts, or the Registration of Electors Acts, that the instructions, precepts, notices, and forms under the said Registration of Electors Acts should be altered in manner appearing by the three schedules to this Order and so that the instructions, precepts, notices, and forms set forth in the three schedules to this Order should be the instructions, precepts, notices, and forms under the Registration of Electors Acts.

And it is hereby ordered that the former instructions, precepts, notices, and forms shall be altered accordingly, and that the instructions, precepts, notices, and forms in the schedules to this Order shall be observed and be valid in law.

This Order may be cited as "The Registration Order, 1895."

FIRST SCHEDULE. OWNERSHIP ELECTORS.

Instructions as to Ownership Electors.

1. The precept according to the form in this schedule will be sent to the overseers of every parish or township by the clerk of the county council on or within seven days before the fifteenth day of April.

2. If there is no corrupt and illegal practices list, the clerk of the county council will omit from the precept and forms all parts relating to it.

3. Where part of a parish or township is situate within and part without the boundary of a county or division of a county or of a parliamentary or municipal borough, each such part of a parish or township is deemed to be a separate parish or township for the purpose of this schedule.

4. Separate precepts must be sent to the overseers of such parish or township, as if that portion of the parish or township which is within the said boundary were a separate parish or township from the portion without the said boundary.

5. The clerk of the county council must add to the precept a note to the effect that any reference in it to the parish or township means only that portion of the parish or township which is situate inside or outside the said boundary, as the case may be, and that the lists for the portion to which the precept refers must be made out separately, as if the portion were a separate parish or township.

6. The clerk of the county council will send to the overseers of every parish or township such number of copies of the ownership portion of the register of parliamentary electors (including the ownership part of the parochial electors list) for the parish or township, as he considers sufficient, and a sufficient number of copies of the corrupt and illegal practices list, if any; and a copy of each of the forms following the precept in this schedule.

7.—(i.) The lists of ownership electors, when revised by the revising barrister, must be printed, and the names numbered and the lists made up in manner directed by the instructions in the second schedule, and, so far as regards parliamentary electors, as part of the lists of parliamentary electors there mentioned.

(ii.) The names of all ownership electors marked by the revising barrister as entitled to vote only as parochial electors must be taken out of the lists of parliamentary electors and printed in the parochial electors list, and the names so printed will form the ownership part of that list, and the list will be so designated.

8. Where there is a registration officer appointed under section four of the County Electors Act, 1888, for any parish or township, the precept will be sent to that officer instead of to the overseers.

9. If the clerk of the county council is in

doubt as to whether there is or is not a registration officer, he should inquire of the clerk of the guardians, and if he cannot obtain information from him, should send the precept to the overseers, and instruct them to transmit it to the registration officer (if any).

10.—(i.) In these instructions the expression “electors” includes voters, and other expressions have the same meaning as in the Registration Act, 1885.

(ii.) In these instructions the expression “clerk of the county council” does not include the town clerk of a county borough, and the county which is referred to, and which is to be mentioned at the head of the precept, is the county returning a member or members to serve in Parliament, and that county must be named at the head of the precept, notwithstanding that the parish or township to the overseers of which the precept is sent is situate in a county borough or in a different administrative county.

In pursuance of the provisions of the Acts of Parliament in that behalf, I require your attention to the following instructions respecting the registration of ownership electors.

* In the case of a parish or township for which a registration officer has been appointed in pursuance of section four of the County Electors Act, 1888, the precept will be addressed to him and not to the overseers.

Part I of this precept informs you generally of the persons entitled to be registered as ownership electors, and of the meaning of the expressions used in this precept, and also as to the mode in which you are to make out and publish the lists.

Part II gives you in order of time the several matters which you are required to do.

You will receive a separate precept from me [or the town clerk for] respecting the registration of occupation electors.

PART I.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS EXPLAINING THE MEANING OF THE EXPRESSIONS USED, AND THE MODE OF MAKING OUT AND PUBLISHING THE LISTS.

Definitions.

1. This precept relates to the registration of ownership electors for your county [or division of the county].

2. In this precept—

(a.) The expression “register of electors” means the parliamentary register of electors, the local government register of electors, and the parochial electors list.

(b.) The expression “ownership electors” means persons entitled to be registered as electors in respect of an ownership qualification; that is to say, of the ownership of property, whether of freehold, leasehold, or copyhold tenure.

(c.) The expression “ownership portion of the register” means the portion of the register of electors which contains the names of persons entitled to vote either as parliamentary or parochial electors in respect of an ownership qualification in your parish [or township].

(d.) The expression “list of ownership claimants” means the list to be made by you of persons who on or before the 20th day of July next shall have claimed to vote either as parliamentary or parochial electors in respect of an ownership qualification in your parish [or township].

3. A person entitled to be registered as an ownership elector must be a man of full age and not subject to any legal incapacity, and must not at any time during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next have received any parochial relief or other alms; but where a person has received for himself or for any member of his family any medical or surgical assistance, or any medicine, at the expense of any poor rate, he is not thereby deprived of his right to be registered, and medical or surgical assistance includes all medical and surgical attendance, and all matters and things supplied by or on the recommendation of the poor law medical officer at the expense of any poor rate.

Mode of making out Lists.

4.—(i.) Each list must be made out in alphabetical order.

(ii.) If your parish [or township] is so divided that you are required to make out the lists of the occupation voters in any part of your parish [or township] as if it were a separate parish [or township], you must make out the lists under this precept for that part of your parish [or township] as if it were a separate parish [or township].

5. In making out any list you are to state the surname and other name or names of each person at full length, the surname being placed first.

6. In making out the lists of ownership claimants and of ownership electors objected to, the surname and other names of every claimant or person objected to, together with the particulars respecting the place of his abode, the nature of his qualification, and the locality of the qualifying property, must be copied into the list from the notices of claim or objection, as the case may be.

7. Where claims in respect of several qualifications are made by the same person, the particulars respecting each qualification should be stated in the list.

8. The registrars of births and deaths are required to send to you periodically returns of the names and residences of all male persons of full age dying within your parish [or township], and you must examine those returns to see whether any person who appears in the ownership portion of the register, or the list of ownership claimants, is dead, and you are to pay the registrar, as part of your expenses connected with registration, a fee of twopence for each return, and a further fee of twopence for every death entered in such returns.

Publication and Inspection.

9. The manner in which you are required to publish the ownership portion of the register and the lists, notices, and documents, directed by this precept to be published is as follows; (that is to say,) you are to fix a copy thereof (each copy being first signed by you)—

(a.) on or near the outside of the outer door or of the outer wall near the door of every

church and public chapel in your parish [or township], including chapels which do not belong to the Established Church; or

(b.) if there is no such church or chapel, then in some public or conspicuous situation in your parish [or township]; and

(c.) if your parish [or township] is wholly or partly situate in a borough or other urban district and not in a parliamentary borough, then in or near every public or municipal or parochial office in your parish [or township], and (having first obtained the authority of the local postmaster, or if he refuses, of the Postmaster-General,) in some public and conspicuous position in or near every post office and telegraph office occupied by or on behalf of the Postmaster-General.

10. Everything so published must remain there during a period including two consecutive Sundays at least next after the first day of publication, and if you find any portion of a register, list, notice, or other document published by you in pursuance of this precept to be destroyed, mutilated, defaced, or removed, you are forthwith to place another to the same effect in its place.

11. Where this precept directs you during any period to allow any copy of a portion of a register, list, notice, or other document to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof, you will permit such copy, list, notice, or document to be perused by every person desirous of perusing it at any time between the hours of ten o'clock in the forenoon and four o'clock in the afternoon of any day, except Sunday, during the said period, without payment or demand of any fee; and you are also to deliver a written or printed copy of it, signed by you, to every person applying for the same during the said period, on payment of a price for such copy after the following rate:—

For any list or copy of a list containing any number of persons' names—

12. You must allow any person who is registered as a parliamentary elector for your division [or county] to inspect at all reasonable times, free of charge—

(a.) the books containing the poor rates made for your parish [or township] within the last two years, and to make a copy of or take an extract from such books; and

(b.) the returns of deaths sent to you by the registrars of births and deaths.

PART II.

THINGS TO BE DONE IN ORDER OF DATE.

13. On or before the twentieth day of June next you are to publish in manner directed by paragraph nine of this precept the ownership portion (but not any other portion) of the register for your parish [or township], a copy of which is sent herewith, together with a notice signed by you, according to the form marked No. 1, among the printed forms sent herewith, but such copy and notice are not to remain published after the twenty-fifth day of July next.

14. On or before the twenty-fifth day of July next you will remove the copy of the ownership portion of the register published as directed by paragraph thirteen of this precept.

15. On or before the last day of July next you are to ascertain from the relieving officer acting for your parish [or township] the names of all persons who are disqualified from being inserted in the lists of ownership electors for your parish [or township] by reason of having received parochial relief, and the relieving officer upon your application is bound to produce to you at such place in your parish [or township] and at such times as are required by you the books in his possession, containing the names of such persons.

Lists of Electors.

16. On or before the last day of July next you are to make out, in manner directed by paragraphs four to seven of this precept, the list of ownership claimants, that is to say, a list (in the Form No. 3 sent herewith) of all persons who, on or before the twentieth day of July next, have delivered or sent to you or any one of you their claim to be registered as ownership electors; but you must place in a separate part of the list the names of those who claim to have their names entered in the parochial electors' list in respect of an ownership qualification.

17. On or before the last day of July next you are to add on the margin of one copy of the ownership portion of the register for your parish [or township] sent herewith, and on the margin of the list of ownership claimants, the word "objected" before the name of every person therein whom you have reasonable cause to believe to be not entitled to be registered in the ownership portion of the new register about to be made, and the word "dead" before the name of every person therein whom you have reason from the returns sent by the registrars of births and deaths or from your own knowledge to believe to be dead.

18. On or before the first day of August next you are to sign one of the copies of the ownership portion of the register for your parish [or township] sent herewith, and the said list of ownership claimants, and to cause a sufficient number of copies of such list to be written or printed, and to publish the said portion of the register with your marginal additions and the said list signed by you in your parish [or township] in manner directed by paragraph nine of this precept.

19. You are also to keep a copy signed by you of the said list, and a copy of the ownership portion of the register, with your marginal additions thereon signed by you, and during the first fourteen days after you have published them are to allow them to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof in accordance with paragraph eleven of this precept.

20. † You are also to publish the corrupt and illegal practices list which is sent herewith, at the same time and in the same manner as you publish the list of ownership claimants.

21. † You are to keep a written or printed copy of the corrupt and illegal practices list, and during the first fourteen days after the publication thereof are to allow them to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof in accordance with paragraph eleven of this precept.

† If there is no corrupt and illegal practices list, the paragraphs relating to it must be omitted.

22. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are to make out (in accordance with paragraphs four to seven of this precept, and according to the Form No. 6 sent herewith) a list of ownership electors objected to, that is to say a list containing the name of every person whose name is entered in the ownership portion of the register or list of ownership claimants, against whom a notice of objection has been given to you or any one of

you, on or before the twentieth day of August next.

23. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are to sign and publish in the manner directed by paragraph nine of this precept a copy of the list made by you in pursuance of paragraph twenty-two of this precept.

24. You are to keep a copy of such list signed by you, and during the fourteen days next after the twenty-fifth day of August next are to allow the same, and also the original notices of claims and objections, to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof, in accordance with paragraph eleven of this precept.

25. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are to deliver to me —

- (a.) the list of ownership claimants signed by you ;
- (b.) the copy of the ownership portion of the register (sent herewith), with your marginal additions signed by you ; and
- (c.) a copy of the list of ownership electors objected to, signed by you.

Omit this paragraph if there is no corrupt or illegal practices list.

26. You are also to make lists of persons claiming to be omitted from the corrupt and illegal practices list (sent herewith), and of persons objected to on the ground that they are omitted

from the corrupt and illegal practices list, and you will deal with such lists, claims, and objections in the same manner, in all respects as is directed by paragraphs sixteen, seventeen, twenty-two, twenty-three, twenty-four, and twenty-five of this precept, respecting claims and objections in relation to an ownership qualification, but any list made under this paragraph must be kept separate from every other list.

Attendance upon Revising Barrister.

27.—(i.) You are to attend the court to be holden by the revising barrister for the revision of the lists of electors for your parish [or township] ; and notice will be sent you of the time and place of holding such court.

(ii) You are, at such court, to deliver to the revising barrister holding it the following documents:—

- (a.) all the original notices of claims and objections received by you ; and
- (b.) all notices of the withdrawal or revival of objections received by you.

If you fail to comply with this precept you will be liable to the penalties in that case provided.

INSTRUCTIONS AS TO PARISH NOT IN A PARLIAMETARY BOROUGH.

1. Where a parish or township is not within a parliamentary borough, the precept, according to the Form in this schedule, will be sent to the overseers of such parish or township by the clerk of the county council, or if the parish or township is situate in a municipal borough, by the town clerk of that borough, and will be so sent on or within seven days before the fifteenth day of April.
2. If there is no corrupt and illegal practices list the clerk of the county council or town clerk will omit from the precept and forms all parts relating to it.
3. Where part of a parish or township is situate within and part without the boundary of a county or division of a county or of a parliamentary or municipal borough each such part of the parish or township is deemed to be a separate parish or township for the purpose of this schedule, and this schedule applies only to that part which is outside the boundary of a parliamentary borough, whether it is within or without a municipal borough.
4. Separate precepts must be sent to the overseers of such parish or township, as if that portion which is within any such boundary as aforesaid were a separate parish or township from the portion without that boundary, and the provisions of the foregoing paragraph one with respect to the clerks who are to send the precept shall apply accordingly.
5. The clerk of the county council or town clerk sending any such precept must add to it a note to the effect that any reference in the precept to the parish or township means only that portion of the parish or township which is situate inside or outside the said boundary, as the case may be, and that the lists of all electors for the portion to which the precept refers must be made out separately, as if the portion were a separate parish or township.
6. The clerk of the county council or town clerk will send to the overseers of every parish or township for their information a copy of the register of electors for the parish or township, and a sufficient number of copies of the corrupt and illegal practices list, if any; and a copy of each of the forms following the form of precept in this schedule.
7. Where the parish or township is situate within a municipal borough, the town clerk must substitute in his precept the expression "municipal borough" for "administrative county," and must make such consequential substitutions as are necessary in the precept of "burgesses" for "county electors," "burgess roll" for "county register," "enrolled" for "registered," "municipal" for "local government," and "borough rate" for "county rate."
8. The clerk of the county council must, as soon as possible, proceed to cause copies of the lists of electors for each parish or township, when

transmitted to him by the revising barrister, to be printed, and shall cause the names to be numbered and the lists to be made up so as to form the register of electors.

9.—(i.) The clerk of the county council must make up the lists of parliamentary electors according to polling districts for parliamentary elections.

(ii.) For the purpose of making up the county register he must obtain from the town clerk of every municipal borough a sufficient number of the revised lists of the burgesses in such municipal borough, and the town clerk must deliver to the clerk of the county council such number of copies of those lists as the clerk of the county council may require, and the clerk of the county council must make up the lists of county electors and of burgesses according to electoral divisions and polling districts for county council elections.

10.—(i.) The lists of electors for each parish or township, or for each part of a parish or township being divided into or forming part of more than one voting area, separate lists are required to be made out, must, in making up the register, be kept separate, so that they may be obtained separately for use in every voting area.

(ii.) The names of persons required to be printed in the parochial electors list must be printed in a separate list at the end of the other lists of electors for the parish, or township, or part of a parish or township, and the names so printed will form the occupation part of the parochial electors list, and the list will be so designated.

11. Each entry for voting on the parliamentary register and the county register and the parochial electors list is to be distinguished by a number in combination with such distinctive letter distinguishing the parliamentary polling district as the county council, or in default of any determination by them, the clerk of the county council may determine.

12. There should be a separate series of numbers for each parliamentary polling district, and number one should be prefixed to the first name in each polling district, and the names should be numbered consecutively down to the last name.

13. The names of the parliamentary electors and the names of the county electors and the names on the parochial electors list may be numbered consecutively, in the lists for each parliamentary polling district, and such portions of those lists, exclusive of the parochial electors list, as contain the names of parliamentary electors may be taken to form the register for parliamentary elections, and such portions of those lists, exclusive of the parochial electors list, as contain the names of county electors may be taken to form the county register, and the whole of the lists, so far as they relate to any parish, or township, or ward of a parish or township, may be taken to form the register of the parochial electors for that parish, or township, or ward.

14.—(i.) Where a person whose qualification for being registered is in a parish or township in one polling district has been registered by the re-

vising barrister as being entitled at parliamentary elections to vote at the polling place of another polling district—

(a.) the name of such person shall be retained in the list of electors in the parish in which his qualification is situate, and shall be numbered consecutively with the other names and an asterisk shall be placed against his name; and

(b) his name shall be entered in the supplemental list at the end of the parish or township lists in the polling district in which he is registered as entitled to vote, and his name shall be numbered consecutively after the rest of the names in that polling district.

(ii.) Where the revising barrister places a mark against any name signifying that the name is to be printed in division three of the occupiers list or in the parochial electors list, that name must accordingly be printed in the proper order, either alphabetically or according to the street order in division three or in the parochial electors list as the case may be, and where under subsection (seven) of section forty-four of the Local Government Act, 1894, the revising barrister places against any name any mark or note which renders it necessary to print an asterisk or other mark against any name so printed in division three of the list, that asterisk or other mark must be added.

15. The clerk of the county council will add at the end of the register of electors a summary of the number of parliamentary electors in each polling district, and a summary of the number of county electors in each electoral division, and a summary of the number of electors in each parish or township, distinguishing the number of the names in the parochial electors list, and he will also add the total number of parliamentary electors in all the polling districts and of county electors in all the electoral divisions.

16. In any case to which section ninety-two of the Local Government Act, 1888, applies, the clerk of the county council who receives from the revising barrister the lists of electors in any such place as therein mentioned, must supply to any other clerk of a county council such number of revised lists as he may require for the purpose of making up the county register, and the clerk of the council of an administrative county to which a portion of another county is added for the purpose of county council elections shall, for the purpose of making up the county register obtain the lists of county electors and burgesses having qualifying property in the said portion, and shall make them up with the other lists of electors into the county register.

17. If the parish or township is within a municipal borough the town clerk must make up the revised list of burgesses into the burgess roll and ward rolls (if any), and number the names of such burgesses in accordance with the Municipal Corporations Act, 1862, and any enactment amending the same.

18. Where there is a registration officer appointed under section four of the County Electors Act, 1888, for any parish or township, the precept will be sent to that officer instead of to the overseers.

19. If the clerk of the county council or town clerk is in doubt as to whether there is or is not a registration officer, he should inquire of the clerk of the guardians, and if he cannot obtain information from him, should send the precept to the overseers, and require them to transmit it to the registration officer (if any).

20. In these instructions—

"The expression "register of electors" means

the parliamentary register of electors, the local government register of electors, and the parochial electors list.

The expression "voting area" means any polling district, electoral division, borough, county district other than a borough, parish or township, or any ward of a borough, county district, parish, or township, or any other area for which is held a separate election at which the register of electors is used.

The expression "electors" includes voters and burgesses; and

Other expressions have the same meaning as in the Registration Act, 1885.

FORM OF PRECEPT TO THE OVERSEERS* OF A PARISH NOT IN A PARLIAMENTARY BOROUGH.

In pursuance of the provisions of the Acts of Parliament in that behalf, I require your attention to the following instructions respecting the registration of occupation electors.

Part I of this precept informs you generally of the persons entitled to be registered, and of the meaning of the expressions used in this precept, and also as to the mode in which you are to make out and publish the lists.

Part II gives you in order of time the several matters which you are required to do.

As respects the ownership electors, you will receive a separate precept from me [or the clerk of the county council].

* In the case of a parish for which a registration officer has been appointed in pursuance of section four of the County Electors Act, 1888, the precept will be addressed to him and not to the overseers.

PART I.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS EXPLAINING THE PERSONS ENTITLED TO BE REGISTERED, THE MEANING OF THE EXPRESSIONS USED, AND THE MODE OF MAKING OUT AND PUBLISHING THE LISTS.

Definitions.

1.—(i.) This precept relates to the registration of occupation electors.

(ii.) Occupation electors may be parliamentary occupation electors or county electors.

2. In this precept the expression "parliamentary occupation electors" means persons entitled to be registered as parliamentary electors in respect of—

(a.) a fifty pounds rental qualification as hereafter defined in paragraph six of this precept;

(b.) a ten pounds occupation qualification as hereafter defined in paragraph seven of this precept; or

(c.) a household qualification as hereafter defined in paragraph eight of this precept; or

(d.) a lodger qualification as hereafter defined in paragraph nine of this precept.

3. In this precept the expression "county electors" means persons entitled to be registered in respect of the old burgess qualification or of the ten pounds occupation burgess qualification.

4. In this precept "electors" includes "voters."

5. A person entitled to be registered as a parliamentary occupation elector must be a man, of full age, and not subject to any legal incapacity, and must in all other respects be duly qualified to be registered as a parliamentary elector, and must not at any time during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next have received any parochial relief or other alms; but where a person has received for himself or for any member of his family any medical or surgical assistance, or any medicine, at the expense of any poor rate, he is not thereby deprived of his right to be registered, and medical or surgical assistance includes all medical and surgical attendance, and all matters and things supplied by or on the recommendation of the poor law medical officer at the expense of any poor rate.

6.—(i.) A person entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a fifty pounds rental qualification—

(a.) must on the fifteenth day of July next be an occupier as tenant of some land or tenement in your parish [or township] for which he is *bonâ fide* liable to a yearly rent of not less than fifty pounds; and

(b.) must have occupied such land or tenement for the whole of the twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next; and

(c.) must have been registered as an elector in respect of the said occupation in the register of electors in force during the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

(ii.) If two or more persons jointly are such occupiers as above mentioned, and the rent is such as to give fifty pounds or more for each occupier, each such occupier, if he was registered in respect of the said occupation as aforesaid in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, is entitled to be registered as an elector.

7.—(i.) A person entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a ten pounds occupation qualification—

(a.) must on the fifteenth day of July next be, and during the whole twelve months immediately preceding that day have been, an occupier, as owner or tenant, of some land or tenement in your parish [or township] of the clear yearly value of not less than ten pounds; and

(b.) such person, or someone else, must during those twelve months have been rated to all poor rates made in respect of such land or tenement; and

(c.) all sums due in respect of the said land or tenement on account of any poor rate made and allowed during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifth day of January last must have been paid on or before the twentieth day of July next.

(ii.) If two or more persons, jointly, are such occupiers as above mentioned, and the clear yearly value of the land or tenement is such as to give ten pounds or more for each occupier, two of such occupiers are entitled to be registered as electors; but no more are so entitled (unless they derived the property by descent, succession, marriage, marriage settlement, or devise, or) unless they are *bonâ fide* engaged as partners carrying on trade or business thereon, in any of which cases all may be registered, if the clear yearly value is sufficient to give ten pounds for each occupier.

(iii.) If a person has occupied different lands or tenements in your division [or county] of the requisite value in immediate succession during the said twelve months he is entitled in respect of the occupation thereof to be registered as an elector in the parish [or township] in which the last occupied land or tenement is situate.

8.—(i.) A person entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a household qualification—

(a.) must on the fifteenth day of July next be, and for the whole twelve months immediately preceding that day (except the time (if any) not exceeding four months in the whole during which he has permitted the house to be occupied as a furnished house) have been an inhabitant occupier of some dwelling-house in your parish [or township], or of some part of a house separately occupied as a dwelling; and

(b.) such person or some one else must during those twelve months have been rated to all poor rates made in respect of the said dwelling-house; and

(c.) all sums due in respect of the said dwelling-house on account of any poor rate made and allowed during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifth day of January last must have been paid on or before the twentieth day of July next.

(ii.) If two or more persons are joint occupiers of a dwelling-house no one of them is entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a household qualification in respect thereof, though, if the value is sufficient, one or more of them may be entitled under paragraph seven above.

(iii.) If a person has occupied different dwelling-houses in your division [or county] in immediate succession during the said twelve months he is entitled in respect of the occupation thereof to be registered as a parliamentary elector in the parish [or township] in which the last occupied dwelling-house is situate.

(iv.) If a person inhabits a dwelling-house by virtue of any office, service, or employment, and the dwelling-house is not inhabited by any person under whom such man serves in such office, service, or employment, he is to be considered as an inhabitant occupier of that dwelling-house.

9.—(i.) A person entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a lodger qualification—

(a.) must have claimed to be registered; and

(b.) must have occupied separately as a lodger for the whole twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next lodgings, being part of one and the same dwelling-house in your parish [or township], and being of a clear yearly value, if let unfurnished, of ten pounds or upwards; and

(c.) must have resided in such lodgings during the said twelve months.

(ii.) If two or more persons are joint lodgers, and the value of the lodgings is such as to give ten pounds or more for each lodger, two of such persons but no more are entitled to be registered as parliamentary electors.

(iii.) If a person has occupied different lodgings of the requisite value in the same house in immediate succession, he is entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of the occupation thereof.

10. A person entitled to be registered as a county elector may be a man or a woman, but must be of full age and not subject to any legal incapacity, and must in all other respects be duly qualified to be registered as a county elector, and must not at any time during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next have received any union or parochial relief or other alms; but where a person has received for himself or herself or for any member of his or her family any medical or surgical assistance, or any medicine at the expense of any poor rate, he or she is not thereby deprived of his or her right to be registered, and medical or surgical assistance includes all medical and surgical attendance, and all matters and things supplied by or on the recommendation of the medical officer of the union or parish at the expense of any poor rate.

11.—(i.) A person entitled to be registered as a county elector in respect of the old burgess qualification—

- (a.) must on the fifteenth day of July next be, and during the whole of the twelve months immediately preceding that day have been, an occupier of a house, warehouse, counting-house, shop, or other building in your parish [or township]; and
- (b.) must have resided during those twelve months in the administrative county or within seven miles thereof; and
- (c.) such person or some one else must during the said twelve months have been rated to all poor rates made in respect of the qualifying property; and
- (d.) all sums due in respect of the qualifying property on account of any poor rate made and allowed, during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifth day of January last, must have been paid on or before the twentieth day of July next; and

Note.—If the county or borough rate is not levied with the poor rate, add, after the word "allowed," the words "or any county [or borough] rate made."

(ii.) A person is entitled to be registered under the old burgess qualification notwithstanding that he has permitted his dwelling-house to be occupied as a furnished house by some other person for a time not exceeding four months, and during that time has not resided as above mentioned.

(iii.) If two or more persons are joint occupiers of property qualifying for the old burgess qualification, each such occupier is entitled to be registered.

12.—(i.) A person entitled to be registered as a county elector in respect of the ten pounds occupation burgess qualification—

- (a.) must during the whole twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July have been an occupier as owner or tenant of some land or tenement in your parish [or township] of the clear yearly value of not less than ten pounds; and
- (b.) must have resided in or within seven miles of the administrative county during six months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next; and
- (c.) such person, or some one else, must during the said twelve months have been rated to all poor rates made in respect of such land or tenement; and
- (d.) all sums due in respect of the said land or tenement on account of any poor rate made

and allowed during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifth day of January last, or on account of any assessed taxes due before the said fifth day of January, must have been paid on or before the twentieth day of July next.

(ii.) If two or more persons jointly are such occupiers as above mentioned, and the value of the land or tenement is such as to give ten pounds or more for each occupier, each of such occupiers is entitled to be registered as an elector.

13.—(i.) Parochial electors consist of parliamentary electors and county electors, but for the purpose of elections under the Local Government Act, 1894, *i.e.*, elections of parish councils, guardians, and district councils not being borough councils, a woman is not disqualified by marriage for being on the register of electors but a husband and wife cannot be qualified in respect of the same property.

(ii.) If a person has occupied in immediate succession during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July different premises in the administrative county which would qualify him for registration as a county elector, he is entitled, in respect of the occupation thereof, to be registered as a county elector in the parish [or township] in which the last occupied premises are situate.

(iii.) A person is not disqualified from being registered in respect of a household qualification under paragraph (8), or of a lodger qualification under paragraph (9), or of an old burgess qualification under paragraph (11), or of a ten pounds occupation burgess qualification under paragraph (12), by reason only that during part of the twelve months ending on the fifteenth day of July not exceeding four months at any one time he has, in the performance of any duty arising from or incidental to any office, service, or employment held or undertaken by him, been absent from his dwelling-house or lodgings or not resided in or within the required distance from the county or borough.

14. A person who is entitled to be registered as a county elector in all respects except that of residence, and is resident beyond seven miles, but within fifteen miles, of the administrative county, is entitled to be on the non-resident list of persons entitled to be elected aldermen or councillors though not entitled to be on the county register.

Mode of making out Lists.

15.—(i.) Each list and, where the list is made out in divisions, each division of each list must be made out in alphabetical order.

(ii.) If your parish [or township] is divided into, or forms part of, more than one voting area, that is to say, any polling district, electoral division, borough, county district, ward, or other area for which is held a separate election at which the register of electors is used, you must make out lists for each part which is in a separate voting area as if it were a separate parish.

Note.—If in the case of a parish within an urban district (co-extensive with any electoral division or divisions of a parliamentary county) the county council has given directions for the lists to be made out according to the order in which the qualifying premises appear in the rate book the officer issuing this precept must modify paragraph fifteen (i.) accordingly.

16. In making out any list you are to state the surname and other name or names of each person at full length, the surname being placed first.

17. In making out the list of claimants or persons objected to the surname and other names of every claimant or person objected to, with the place of his abode, the nature of his qualification, and either the locality or other description of the qualifying property, or the name of the occupying tenant, must be copied into the list from the claim or objection.

18. In every other list the place of abode should be entered with the name (if any) of the street, lane, or other locality, and the number (if any) in such street, lane, or other locality, and such entry should be made in all cases in such a manner as will afford a full and sufficient address for a person entered, if a letter is addressed to him by post.

19.—(i.) In the case of occupation electors the nature of the qualification should be entered as nearly as possible in the words of the statute conferring the franchise, for instance:—

(a.) The nature of the fifty pounds rental qualification or ten pounds occupation qualification of a person should be stated thus, "tenement" or "land," or "land and tenement," or, in the case of a joint occupation, "tenement (joint)" or "land (joint)," or, in the case of successive occupation, "tenement (successive)" or "land (successive)":

(b.) The nature of a household qualification should be stated thus, "dwelling-house," or in the case of successive occupation, "dwelling-house (successive)":

(c.) The nature of the old burgess qualification should be stated thus, "house," "warehouse," "counting-house," "chambers," or as the case may be, with the addition of "joint" or "successive" if necessary.

(ii.) Where the same property constitutes both a ten pounds occupation qualification and also the old burgess qualification, the nature of the qualification should be stated by a description of the tenement thus, "house," "shop," "warehouse," or "building," or "chambers," or as the case may be, or in the case of a joint occupation "house (joint)," "shop (joint)," "warehouse (joint)," or as the case may be, or in the case of a successive occupation "shop (successive)," or as the case may be.

(iii.) Where the same property constitutes both a ten pounds occupation qualification, or the old burgess qualification, and also a household qualification, the nature of the qualification should be entered as "dwelling-house."

(iv.) If the description indicates the nature of the qualification, as, for instance, if a ten pounds occupation qualification consists of a house and is entered as a dwelling-house, such description will be sufficient.

(v.) Any description of the nature of the qualification further than that above mentioned is superfluous and should not be given.

20. The description of any qualifying property should specify the name and situation of that property, and for that purpose should state either the name (if any) of the street, lane, or other locality, and the number (if any) in such street, lane, or other locality, or the name of the occupying tenant; and the description of the qualifying property should in all cases be such as will

afford full and sufficient means of identifying such property.

21.—(i.) Where several qualifications are possessed by the same person, the particulars respecting each qualification should be stated in the list.

(ii.) In the case of a list made out in divisions, where a person is entered in division one in respect of one qualification for parliamentary purposes, and in respect of another qualification for local government purposes, each such qualification should be distinguished in the list by a note to the effect that the qualification is for parliamentary purposes only, or for local government purposes only, as the case may be.

22. The occupiers list (mentioned hereafter in paragraph thirty-seven, sub-paragraph (a.)), is to be made out in three divisions:

Division one is to comprise the names of the persons entitled to be registered both as parliamentary electors (whether in respect of a fifty pounds rental, or ten pounds occupation, or household qualification) and as county electors.

Division two is to comprise the names of the persons entitled to be registered as parliamentary electors in respect of a fifty pounds rental, or ten pounds occupation, or household qualification, but not as county electors.

Division three is to comprise the names of the persons entitled to be registered as county electors, but not as parliamentary electors.

23. You should omit from the occupiers list mentioned in paragraph thirty-seven, sub-paragraph (a.), of this precept, and from the non-resident list mentioned in sub-paragraph (c.) of the same paragraph, the name of any person—

(a.) whom from the returns furnished by the registrar of births and deaths or from your own knowledge you know to be dead; or

(b.) who is not qualified by reason of the non-payment of rates; or

(c.) who is disqualified by reason of having received parochial relief; or

† (d.) whose name is entered in the corrupt and illegal practices list.†

† Omit (d.) where there is no corrupt and illegal practices list.

24. In making out the old lodgers list (mentioned in paragraph thirty-seven, sub-paragraph (b.), of this precept), if you have reason to believe that any person whose name is entered on that list is dead or is not entitled to be registered, you should make a note to that effect in the margin of the list.

25. The registrars of births and deaths are required to send to you periodically returns of the names and residences of all male persons of full age dying within your parish [or township], and also as and when required by you of the names and residences of all women of full age dying within your parish [or township], and you must examine those returns to see whether any person who otherwise would appear in the list of electors is dead, and you are to pay the registrar, as part of your expenses connected with registration, a fee of twopence for each return, and a further fee of twopence for every death entered in such returns.

Publication and Inspection.

26. The manner in which you are required to publish the lists, notices, and documents, directed by this precept to be published is as follows; (that is to say), you are to fix a copy thereof (each copy being first signed by you)—

- (a.) on or near the outside of the outer door or of the outer wall near the door of every church and public chapel in your parish [or township], including chapels which do not belong to the Established Church; or
- (b.) if there is no such church or chapel, then in some public or conspicuous situation in your parish [or township]; and
- (c.) if your parish [or township] is wholly or partially situate in a borough or other urban district, then in or near every public or municipal or parochial office in your parish [or township], and (having first obtained the authority of the local postmaster, or if he refuses, of the Postmaster-General), in some public and conspicuous position in or near every post office and telegraph office occupied by or on behalf of the Postmaster-General.

27. Everything so published must remain there during a period including two consecutive Sundays at least next after the first day of publication, and if you find any list, notice, or other document published by you in pursuance of this precept to be destroyed, mutilated, defaced, or removed, you are forthwith to place another to the same effect in its place.

28. Where this precept directs you during any period to allow any copy of a list, notice, or other document to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof, you will permit such copy, list, notice, or document to be perused by every person desirous of perusing it, at any time between the hours of ten o'clock in the forenoon and four o'clock in the afternoon of any day, except Sunday, during the said period, without payment or demand of any fee; and you are also to deliver a written or printed copy of it, signed by you, to every person applying for the same during the said period, on payment of a price for such copy after the following rate:—

For any list or copy of a list containing any number of persons names—

29. You must allow any person who is registered as a parliamentary elector for your division [or county], or as a county elector in any parish [or township] in your administrative county, or is enrolled as a burgess of any borough in your administrative county, to inspect at all reasonable times, free of charge,—

- (a.) the books containing the poor rates made for your parish [or township] within the last two years, and to make a copy of or take an extract from such books; and
- (b.) the returns of deaths sent to you by the registrars of births and deaths.

PART II.

THINGS TO BE DONE IN ORDER OF DATE.

Notices and Inquiries.

30.—(i.) In the months of April and May, or one of them, you are to inquire or ascertain with

respect to all property in your parish [or township] which comprises any dwelling-house (including under the term any part of a house separately occupied as a dwelling) whether any man, other than the owner or other person rated or liable to be rated in respect of such property, is entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a household qualification by reason of his being an inhabitant occupier of such dwelling-house, and you are to enter in the rate book in a separate column, added for the purpose, the name of every man so entitled and the situation or description of the dwelling-house in respect of which he is entitled.

(ii.) If any property, whether by reason of belonging to the Crown or otherwise, is not rated, you must act under this paragraph in the same manner as if it were rated.

31. For the purpose of your inquiry you are at liberty to serve on any person who is the occupier or rated or liable to be rated in respect of any property, or on some agent of such person concerned in the management of such property, a requisition according to the form marked A among the forms sent herewith. You may serve the requisition by giving it to the person by whom it is to be observed, or by leaving it at his last or usual place of abode or with some person on the property, and in case no such person can be found, then by fixing the requisition on some conspicuous part of the property; and where the property is occupied by a company or other body of persons you may serve the requisition on the secretary or agent of the company or body of persons; and if the property belongs to the Crown or is not rated, you may serve it on the chief local officer having the superintendence or control of the property. A person who fails to comply with the requisition is liable, on summary conviction, to a fine of forty shillings.

32. In making the inquiries directed by the last two paragraphs you will observe the following directions:—

(a.) If you know that any man who is not rated has occupied a dwelling-house since the fifteenth day of July last you should enter the name of that man in the rate book as mentioned in paragraph thirty of this precept, without serving any requisition on the occupier or other person rated;

(b.) you should not serve the requisition on the occupier or owner of any property unless you have reasonable ground to believe that there is some inhabitant occupier of such property, who is entitled to vote, besides the person on whom the requisition is served.

33. On or before the twentieth day of June next you are to publish, in manner directed by paragraph twenty-six of this precept, a notice signed by you according to the form marked B, among the forms sent herewith.

34.—(i.) Where any sum on account of a poor rate made and allowed, during the twelve months next before the fifth day of January last is on the first day of June next due in respect of any property in your parish [or township] capable of conferring the parliamentary franchise in respect of the ten pounds occupation or household qualification, or of conferring the local government franchise in respect of the old burgess qualification or ten pounds occupation burgess qualification, you are, on or before the twentieth day of June next, to give to every occupier of that property a notice (in the Form C (No. 1) sent herewith), by delivering it to such occupier, or leaving it at his last or usual place of abode, or with some person on the property in respect of which the rate is

payable, and in case no such person can be found, then by affixing the notice upon some conspicuous part of such property.

(ii.) You need not give this notice if the rate has been previously duly demanded of the occupier by a demand note served in the like manner as the last-mentioned notice, but you must serve the notice on every occupier of that property who will, if the rate is paid, be entitled to be registered as an elector in respect of the occupation thereof.

(iii.) Where any sum on account of county rate made during the twelve months next before the fifth day of January last is on the first day of June next due in respect of any property in your parish [or township] capable of conferring the local government franchise in respect of the old burgess qualification, the notice must further state that omission to pay the county rate will disqualify from registration as a county elector in respect of the old burgess qualification.

If the county rate, or where the parish or township is in a municipal borough, the borough rate is levied as part of the poor rate, the paragraph relating to the county rate or borough rate should be omitted.

35.—(i.) If the sum due on account of poor rate as above mentioned in respect of any property is not paid on or before the twentieth day of July next, all occupiers of that property are disqualified from being entered in the occupiers list of electors; and if any sum due on account of county rate as above mentioned in respect of any property is not paid on or before the twentieth day of July next, all occupiers of that property are disqualified from being entered in any list of county electors in respect of the old burgess qualification.

(ii.) On or before the twenty-second day of July next you are to make out (in the Form C (No. 2) sent herewith) a list containing the name of every person so disqualified; and you are to keep that list and, during the first fourteen days after the said twenty-second day of July, are to allow it to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof in accordance with paragraph twenty-eight of this precept.

If the county rate, or where the parish or township is in a municipal borough, the borough rate is levied as part of the poor rate, the portion of the paragraph relating to the county rate or borough rate should be omitted.

36. On or before the last day of July next you are to ascertain from the relieving officer acting for your parish [or township] the names of all persons who are disqualified from being inserted in the lists of occupation electors for your parish [or township], by reason of having received parochial relief, and the relieving officer upon your application is bound to produce to you at such place in your parish [or township] and at such times as are required by you the books in his possession, containing the names of such persons.

Lists of Electors.

37.—(i.) On or before the last day of July next you are to make out in manner directed by paragraphs fifteen to twenty-four of this precept the following lists of electors:—

(a.) The occupiers list, that is to say, a list (in the Form D No. 1 sent herewith) of all persons entitled by reason of the occupation of property situate wholly or partly within your parish [or township] to be registered as parliamentary electors in respect of a fifty pounds rental; a ten pounds occupation, or a household qualification as defined in paragraphs six, seven, and eight of this precept, or to be registered as county electors;

(b.) The old lodgers list, that is to say, a list (in the Form D (No. 2) sent herewith) of all

persons who, being on the register of electors now in force for your division [or county] in respect of residence in lodgings within your parish [or township] have, on or before the twenty-fifth day of July next, given or caused to be given to you, or any one of you, claims to have their names inserted in the lists of electors in respect of residence in the same lodgings; and

(c.) The non-resident list, that is to say, a list (in the Form G sent herewith) of all persons who are entitled, in respect of the occupation of property within your parish [or township], to be elected aldermen or councillors of your administrative county, but are not entitled to be on the county register thereof.

(ii.) You must not omit any person from the occupiers list on the ground that he is registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of the ownership of property, whether of freehold, leasehold, or copyhold tenure.

38. On or before the first day of August next you are to sign the lists mentioned in paragraph thirty-seven of this precept, and to cause a sufficient number of copies of such lists to be written or printed, and to publish the said lists signed by you in your parish [or township] in manner directed by paragraph twenty-six of this precept.

39. † You are also to publish the corrupt and illegal practices list which is sent herewith, at the same time and in the same manner as you publish the occupiers and old lodgers lists.

40.—(i.) You are to keep a written or printed copy of each of the lists mentioned in paragraph thirty-seven of this precept, signed by you, † and also of the corrupt and illegal practices list, † and during the first fourteen days after the publication thereof are to allow them to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof in accordance with paragraph twenty-eight of this precept.

(ii.) You are also to keep the list of defaulters in the payment of assessed taxes sent to you by the collector of taxes, and allow it during the first fourteen days after the first publication of the lists of voters to be open for public inspection in manner directed by paragraph twenty-eight of this precept.

† If there is no corrupt and illegal practices list, the paragraph and words relating to it must be omitted.

Objections and Claims.

41. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are also to make out (in accordance with paragraphs fifteen to twenty-four of this precept and according to the Form L sent herewith) occupiers and lodgers objection lists, that is to say, lists containing the name of every person against whom a notice of objection has been given to you, or any one of you, on or before the twentieth day of August next, as not being entitled to have his name retained in any of the lists mentioned in paragraph thirty-seven of this precept, giving in separate lists the objections made to—

(a.) any person on the occupiers list, both as a parliamentary and a county elector;

(b.) any person on the occupiers list as a parliamentary elector only;

(c.) any person on the old lodgers list;

(d.) any person on the occupiers list as a county elector only;

(e.) any person on the non-resident list.

42. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are to make out (in accordance with paragraphs fifteen to twenty-four of this precept and according to the Form K sent herewith) occupiers and lodgers claim lists, that is to say, lists containing the name of every person who has given or caused to be given to you, or any one of you, on

or before the twentieth day of August next, notice of his claim to be registered in any of the lists mentioned in paragraph thirty-seven of this precept for your parish [or township], or in the parochial electors list, making separate lists of—

- (a.) persons claiming insertion in the occupiers list both as parliamentary and as county electors ;
- (b.) persons claiming insertion in the occupiers list as parliamentary electors only ;
- (c.) persons claiming insertion in a list of parliamentary electors as lodgers, but not comprised in the old lodgers list ;
- (d.) persons claiming insertion in the occupiers list as county electors only ;
- (e.) persons claiming insertion in the parochial electors list in respect of an occupation qualification ;
- (f.) persons claiming insertion in the non-resident list.

43. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are to sign every list made by you in pursuance of paragraphs forty-one and forty-two of this precept and publish in the manner directed by paragraph twenty-six of this precept a copy of every list so signed.

44. You are to keep a copy of each such list signed by you, and during the fourteen days next after the twenty-fifth day of August next are to allow the same, and also the original notices of claims and objections, to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof, in accordance with paragraph twenty-eight of this precept.

45. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are to deliver to me—

- (a.) two copies of the occupiers and old lodger lists ;
- (b.) a copy of each of the occupiers and lodgers objection and claim lists, and the parochial electors claim lists so made out and signed by you as aforesaid ; and
- (c.) two copies of the non-resident list.

If the precept is sent by a town clerk, add after "deliver to me" the words "and to the clerk of the council of the county of _____."

46. You are also to make lists of persons claiming to be omitted from the corrupt and illegal practices list (sent herewith), and of persons objected to on the ground that they are omitted from the corrupt and illegal practices list, and you will deal with such lists, claims, and objections in the same manner in all respects as is directed by paragraphs forty-one to forty-five of this precept respecting claims and objections in relation to the lists therein mentioned, but any list made under this paragraph must be kept separate from any other list.

Omit this paragraph if there is no corrupt or illegal practices list.

Attendance upon Revising Barrister.

47.—(i.) You are to attend the court to be holden by the revising barrister for the revision of the lists of electors for your parish [or township] ; and notice will be sent you of the time and place of holding such court.

(ii.) You are, at such court, to deliver to the revising barrister holding it the following documents :—

- (a.) all the original notices of claims and objections received by you ;
- (b.) the occupiers and old lodgers lists, and the non-resident list ;
- (c.) the occupiers and lodgers objection and claim lists, and the parochial electors claim lists made out and signed by you ; and
- (d.) all notices of the withdrawal or revival of objections received by you,

and you are there to produce the rate books of your parish [or township] containing the poor rates made and allowed during the period between the fifth day of January in last year and the fifteenth day of July next.

OCCUPATION ELECTORS.

INSTRUCTIONS AS TO PARISH IN A PARLIAMEN- TARY BOROUGH.

1. Where a parish or township is in a parliam-entary borough, the precept according to the form in this Schedule will be sent to the overseers of such parish or township, if it is situate in a municipal borough by the town clerk of that borough, and if it is not situate in a municipal borough, then by the person acting under the Registration Acts as town clerk of the parliam-entary borough (who is hereinafter included in the expression "town clerk") and will be so sent on or within seven days before the fifteenth day of April.

2. Where part of a parish or township is situate within and part without the boundary of a county or division of a county or of a parliam-entary or municipal borough, each such part of a parish or township is deemed to be a separate parish or township for the purpose of this schedule, and this schedule applies only to that

part which is within the boundary of a parliam-entary borough whether it is within or without a municipal borough.

3. Separate precepts must be sent to the over-seeers of such parish or township as if that part thereof which is within any such boundary as aforesaid were a separate parish or township from the portion without that boundary.

4. In any such case the town clerk sending the precept in the schedule must add to it a note to the effect that any reference in the precept to the parish or township means only that portion of the parish or township which is situate inside the boundary of the parliamentary borough and inside or outside the municipal borough, as the case may be, and that the lists of all electors for the portion to which the precept refers must be made out separately, as if that portion were a separate parish or township.

5. In the parliamentary boroughs of Bristol, Exeter, Norwich, and Nottingham the following additions must be made to the precept, namely—

(i.) To paragraph three the following sub-paragraph :—

"or (d.) any *freehold or burgage tenant right reserved by section thirty-one of the Reform Act, 1832.

(ii.) To paragraph thirty-five, after sub-paragraph (a.)—

"(b.) The *freehold and burgage tenant list, that is to say, a list (in the Form (D.), No. 2, sent herewith) of all persons who are entitled within your parish [or township] to be registered as parliamentary electors in respect of any *freehold or burgage tenant right reserved by section thirty-one of the Reform Act, 1832."

* Alter, if necessary, to suit custom of borough.

(iii.) To paragraph forty-one, at the end of sub-paragraph (b.), the words "or is on the *freehold and burgage tenant list."

6. In any borough in which there continues to exist any right reserved by section thirty-three of the Reform Act, 1832, the following additions to the precept must be made:—

(i.) To paragraph three the following sub-paragraph:—

"or (d.) any right reserved by section thirty-three of the Reform Act, 1832."

(ii.) After paragraph seven the following paragraph:—

"A person entitled to be registered in respect of any right reserved by section thirty-three of the Reform Act, 1832, must be possessed of a right to vote possessed by him on the seventh day of June, 1832."

(iii.) To paragraph thirty-five after sub-paragraph (a.), the following sub-paragraph:—

"(b.) The reserved rights list, that is to say, a list (in the Form (D.), No. 2, sent herewith) of all persons who are entitled within your parish [or township] to be registered as parliamentary electors in respect of any right reserved by section thirty-three of the Reform Act, 1832."

(iv.) To paragraph forty-one, at the end of sub-section (b.), the words "or is on the reserved rights list."

7.—(i.) In every part of the administrative county of London, unless the local authority has otherwise directed, the following paragraph must be substituted for paragraph fourteen (i.) of the precept:—

"In each list, and where the list is made out in divisions, in each division the names of electors must be arranged in the same order in which the qualifying premises appear in the rate book for the parish or township in which the premises are situate, or as nearly as will cause the lists to record the qualifying premises in successive order in the street or other place in which they are situate."

(ii.) In every other case where the local authority has given any special directions as to making out the list according to streets, or the order in which the qualifying premises appear in the rate book, a similar substitution must be made.

8. In the case of a parish or township within the administrative county of London, all reference to the non-resident list of persons entitled to be elected aldermen or councillors must be omitted.

9. Where the parish or township is not situate within a municipal borough, the town clerk must substitute in his precept the expression "administrative county" for "municipal borough" and also for "borough" in cases where that word refers to a municipal borough, and must make in the precept such consequential substitution as may be necessary of "county elector" for "burgess," "county register" for "burgess roll,"

"registered" for "enrolled," "local government" for "municipal," and "county rate" for "borough rate."

10. If there is no corrupt and illegal practices list, the town clerk will omit from the precept and forms all parts relating to it.

11. The town clerk must send, with the precept, to the overseers a copy of each of the forms following the precept in this schedule.

Also, if there is any corrupt or illegal practices list, a copy of that list.

12. The town clerk must make up the lists of parliamentary electors according to polling districts for parliamentary elections, but he must add at the end of the lists for each such polling district a list of the freemen (if any) entitled to vote in such polling district.

13. The town clerk must make up the revised list of burgesses into the burgess roll and ward rolls (if any), and number the names of such burgesses in accordance with the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, and any Act amending the same.

14.—(i.) The lists of electors for each parish or township, or for each part of a parish or township for which, owing to the parish or township being divided into or forming part of more than one voting area, separate lists are required to be made out, must in making up the register be kept separate, so that they may be obtained separately for use in each voting area.

(ii.) The lists of electors for each parish, township, or part of a parish or township, may, in making up the register, be arranged in such order as the local authority under the Parliamentary and Municipal Registration Act, 1878, may from time to time direct.

(iii.) The names of the persons required to be printed in the parochial electors list must be printed in a separate list at the end of the other lists of electors for the parish, township, or part of a parish or township, and the names so printed will form the occupation part of the parochial electors list, and the list will be so designated.

15. Each entry for voting on the parliamentary register of every parliamentary borough, and on the burgess roll of every municipal borough and on the parochial electors list is to be distinguished by a number, either alone or in combination with such letter or distinguishing mark as the local authority under the Parliamentary and Municipal Registration Act, 1878, from time to time fixes.

16. There will be one series of numbers for the whole of each parliamentary borough, or if it is divided into divisions for each division of such borough, and for the whole of each municipal borough, or if it is divided into electoral divisions or wards, for each division or ward, save that if the local authority so direct there may be one series of numbers for the whole borough, whether parliamentary or municipal, or a separate series of numbers for each polling district, whether parliamentary or municipal.

17. Where the revising barrister places a mark against any name signifying that the name is to be printed in division three of the occupiers list or in the parochial electors list, that name must accordingly be printed in the proper order either alphabetically or according to the street order in division three or in the parochial electors list, as the case may be, and where, under subsection (7) of section forty-four of the Local Government Act, 1894, the revising barrister places against any name any mark or note which renders it necessary to print an asterisk or other mark against any name so printed in division three of the list, that asterisk or other mark must be added.

18.—(i.) In copying and printing the revised lists of any parish or township in a parliamentary and municipal borough including the parochial electors list—

(a.) Divisions one and two for the parliamentary register, and divisions one and three for the burgh roll and county register, may, and if and so far as the local authority under the Parliamentary and Municipal Registration Act, 1878, so direct, shall be combined or kept separate according to convenience for use; and any arrangement may, and if and so far as the said local authority so direct, shall, be adopted according to convenience, so that one print or edition of division one may be available for both sets; and

(b.) The revised lists will, subject to any direction given by the local authority, under the Parliamentary and Municipal Registration Act, 1878, be arranged according to convenience for use in parts for the various voting areas, so that the parts may be conveniently compiled or put together to serve as the register for the elections in each voting area.

(ii.) The whole of the lists, so far as they relate to any parish or township, or ward of a parish or township, may be taken to form the register of the parochial electors for that parish, township, or ward.

19. Outside of a municipal borough the names of the parliamentary electors and county electors in the lists in each polling district, including the names in the parochial electors list, may be numbered consecutively, and such portions of those lists as consist of the names of parliamentary electors, may be taken to form the register for parliamentary elections, and such portions of those lists as contain the names of county electors may be taken to form the register of county electors.

20. If the parish or township is within a municipal borough not being a county borough, the town clerk must deliver to the clerk of the county council, for the purpose of making up the county register, such number of copies of the revised lists of burghesses as the clerk of the county council may require.

21. If the parish or township is not within a municipal borough, the town clerk must cause to be printed such number of copies of the revised lists of county electors as the clerk of the county council may require, and must transmit the same to the clerk of the county council. The town clerk must cause such lists to be printed in accordance with such directions as the clerk of the county council may give respecting the numbering of the names and the printing thereof in parts in such manner that the parts may be conveniently compiled or put together to serve as lists for elections in each voting area, and the clerk of the county council will deal with the lists so received from the town clerk in manner directed by the Second Schedule to this Order with respect to lists of county electors.

22. The officer having under the Parliamentary Registration Acts the custody of any revised lists of electors in a parliamentary borough or municipal borough must permit access thereto for the purpose of the same being copied for any public purpose relating to the registration of parliamentary or county electors or the enrolment of burghesses.

23. Where there is a registration officer appointed under section four of the County Electors Act, 1888, for any parish or township, the precept will be sent to that officer instead of to the overseers.

24. If the town clerk is in doubt as to whether there is or is not a registration officer, he should inquire of the clerk of the guardians, and if he cannot obtain information from him, should send the precept to the overseers, and require them to transmit it to the registration officer (if any).

25. In these instructions—

The expression "register of electors" means the parliamentary register of electors, the local government register of electors, and the parochial electors list.

The expression "voting area" means any polling district, electoral division, borough, county district other than a borough, parish or township, or any ward of a borough, county district, parish, or township, or any other area for which is held a separate election at which the register of electors is used.

The expression "electors" includes voters and burghesses; and

Other expressions have the same meaning as in the Registration Act, 1885.

In pursuance of the provisions of the Acts of Parliament in that behalf I require your attention to the following:—

INSTRUCTIONS.

Part I of this precept informs you generally of the persons entitled to be registered, and of the meaning of the expressions used in this precept, and also as to the mode in which you are to make out and publish the lists.

Part II gives you, in order of time, the several matters which you are required to do.

You will receive a separate precept from the clerk of the county council with respect to the registration of ownership electors.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS, EXPLAINING THE PERSONS ENTITLED TO BE REGISTERED, THE MEANING OF THE EXPRESSIONS USED, AND THE MODE OF MAKING OUT AND PUBLISHING THE LISTS.

Definitions.

1.—(i.) This precept relates to the registration of occupation electors within the said parliamentary borough and municipal borough.

(ii.) Occupation electors may be parliamentary electors or burghesses.

2. In this precept the expression "electors" includes voters and burghesses, and the expression "registration" includes enrolment.

3. In this precept the expression "parliamentary electors" means persons entitled to be registered as electors at parliamentary elections for the said parliamentary borough or any division thereof in respect of—

(a.) a ten pounds occupation qualification as hereafter defined in paragraph five of this precept

(b.) a household qualification as hereafter defined in paragraph six of this precept; or

(c.) a lodger qualification as hereafter defined in paragraph seven of this precept.

4. A person entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector must be a man of full age, and not subject to any legal incapacity, and must in all other respects be duly qualified to be registered as a parliamentary elector, and must not at any time during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next have received any parochial relief or other alms; but where a person has received for himself or for any member of his family any medical or surgical assistance, or any medicine, at the expense of any poor rate, he is not thereby deprived of his right to be registered, and medical or surgical assistance includes all medical and surgical attendance, and all matters and things supplied by or on the recommendation of the poor law medical officer at the expense of any poor rate.

5. (i.)—A person entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a ten pounds occupation qualification—

(a.) must during the whole twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next have been an occupier as owner or tenant of some land or tenement in your parish [or township] of the clear yearly value of not less than ten pounds; and

(b.) must have resided in or within seven† miles of the said parliamentary borough during six months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next; and

† In the case of a parish in the city of London substitute twenty-five for seven miles.

(c.) such person, or some one else must during the said twelve months have been rated to all poor rates made in respect of such land or tenement; and

(d.) all sums due in respect of the said land or tenement on account of any poor rate made and allowed during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifth day of January last, or on account of any assessed taxes due before the fifth day of January last, must have been paid on or before the twentieth day of July next.

(ii.) If two or more persons jointly are such occupiers as above mentioned, and the value of the land or tenement is such as to give ten pounds or more for each occupier, each of such occupiers is entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector.

(iii.) If a person has occupied in the said parliamentary borough different lands or tenements of the requisite value in immediate succession during the said twelve months, he is entitled in respect of the occupation thereof to be registered as an elector in the parish [or township] in which the last occupied land or tenement is situate.

6.—(i.) A person entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a household qualification—

(a.) must on the fifteenth day of July next be and for the whole of the twelve months immediately preceding that day (except the time (if any) not exceeding four months in the whole during which he has permitted the house to be occupied as a furnished house) have been an inhabitant occupier of some dwelling-house in your parish [or township], or of some part of a house separately occupied as a dwelling; and

(b.) such person or some one else must during those twelve months have been rated to all poor rates made in respect of the said dwelling-house; and

(c.) all sums due in respect of the said dwelling-house on account of any poor rate made and allowed during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifth day of January last must have been paid on or before the twentieth day of July next.

(ii.) If two or more persons are joint occupiers of a dwelling-house, no one of them is entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a household qualification in respect thereof, though if the value is sufficient, one or more of them may be so entitled under paragraph five above.

(iii.) If a person has occupied different dwelling-houses in the said parliamentary borough in immediate succession during the said twelve months, he is entitled in respect of the occupation thereof to be registered as a parliamentary elector in the parish [or township] in which the last occupied dwelling-house is situate.

(iv.) If a person inhabits a dwelling-house by virtue of any office, service, or employment, and the dwelling-house is not inhabited by any person under whom such man serves in such office, service or employment, he is considered to be an inhabitant occupier of that dwelling-house.

7. (i.)—A person entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a lodger qualification—

(a.) must have claimed to be registered; and

(b.) must have occupied separately as a lodger for the whole twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next lodgings, being part of one and the same dwelling-house in your parish [or township], and being of a clear yearly value, if let unfurnished, of ten pounds or upwards; and

(c.) must have resided in such lodgings during the said twelve months.

(ii.) If two or more persons are joint lodgers, and the value of the lodgings is such as to give ten pounds or more for each lodger, two of such persons, but no more, are entitled to be registered as parliamentary electors.

(iii.) If a person has occupied different lodgings of a requisite value in the same house, in immediate succession, he is entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of the occupation thereof.

8. In this precept the expression “burgesses” means persons entitled to be enrolled as burgesses in respect of the old burgess qualification, or of the ten pounds occupation burgess qualification.

9. A person entitled to be enrolled as a burgess may be a man or woman, but must be of full age and not subject to any legal incapacity, and must in all other respects be duly qualified to be enrolled as a burgess, and must not at any time within the twelve months next before the fifteenth day of July next have received any union or parochial relief or other alms; but where a person has received for himself or herself, or for any member of his or her family, any medical or surgical assistance, or any medicine, at the expense of any poor rate, he or she is not thereby deprived of his or her right to be enrolled, and medical or surgical assistance includes all medical and surgical attendance, and all matters and things supplied by or on the re-

commendation of the medical officer of the union or parish at the expense of any poor rate.

10.—(i.) A person entitled to be enrolled as a burgess in respect of the old burgess qualification

(a.) must on the fifteenth day of July next be, and during the whole of the twelve months immediately preceding that day have been, an occupier of a house, warehouse, counting-house, shop, or other building in your parish [or township]; and

(b.) have resided during those twelve months in the said municipal borough or within seven miles thereof; and

† If the parish is in the administrative county of London, substitute fifteen for seven.

(c.) such person or some one else must during the said twelve months have been rated to all poor rates made in respect of the qualifying property; and

(d.) all sums due in respect of the qualifying property on account of any poor rate made and allowed during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifth day of January last, must have been paid on or before the twentieth day of July next.

If the borough or county rate is levied separately from the poor rate, insert after the word "allowed" the words "or any borough [or county] rate made."

(ii.) A person is entitled to be enrolled as a burgess under the old burgess qualification notwithstanding that he has permitted his dwelling-house to be occupied as a furnished house by some other person for a time not exceeding four months, and during that time has not resided as above mentioned.

(iii.) If two or more persons are joint occupiers, each such occupier is entitled to be enrolled as a burgess.

11.—(i.) A person entitled to be enrolled as a burgess in respect of the ten pounds occupation burgess qualification—

(a.) must during the whole twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July have been an occupier as owner or tenant of some land or tenement in your parish [or township] of the clear yearly value of not less than ten pounds; and

(b.) must have resided in or within seven miles of the said municipal borough during six months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July next; and

† If the parish is in the administrative county of London substitute fifteen for seven.

(c.) such person, or some one else, must during the said twelve months have been rated to all poor rates made in respect of such land or tenement; and

(d.) all sums due in respect of the said land or tenement on account of any poor rate made and allowed during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifth day of January last, or on account of any assessed taxes due before the fifth day of January last, must have been paid on or before the twentieth day of July next.

(ii.) If two or more persons jointly are such occupiers as above-mentioned, and the value of the land or tenement is such as to give ten pounds or more for each occupier, each of such occupiers is entitled to be enrolled as a burgess.

12.—(i.) Parochial electors consist of parliamentary electors and burgesses, but for the purpose of elections under the Local Government Act, 1894, *i.e.*, elections of* parish councils, guardians, and district councils not being borough councils, a woman is not disqualified by marriage for being on the register of electors, but a husband and wife cannot be qualified in respect of the same property.

* If the parish is in London omit "parish councils and district councils" and insert "vestries and parish auditors."

(ii.) If a person has occupied in immediate succession during the twelve months immediately preceding the fifteenth day of July different premises in the municipal borough which would qualify him for enrolment as a burgess, he is entitled, in respect of the occupation thereof, to be enrolled as a burgess in the parish [or township] in which the last occupied premises are situate.

(iii.) A person is not disqualified from being registered in respect of any qualification mentioned in this schedule by reason only that during part of the twelve months ending on the fifteenth day of July, not exceeding four months at any one time, he has, in the performance of any duty arising from or incidental to any office, service, or employment held or undertaken by him, been absent from his dwelling-house or lodgings, or not resided in or within the required distance from the borough.

13. A person who is entitled to be enrolled as a burgess in all respects except that of residence, and is resident beyond seven miles, but within fifteen miles, of the said municipal borough, is entitled to be on the non-resident list of persons entitled to be elected aldermen or councillors though not entitled to be on the burgess roll.

If the parish is within the administrative county of London, this paragraph should be omitted.

14.—(i.) Each list and, where the list is made out in divisions, each division of each list must be made out in alphabetical order.

(ii.) If your parish [or township] is divided into, or forms part of, more than one voting area, that is to say, any polling district, electoral division, borough, county district, ward, or other area for which is held a separate election at which the register of electors is used, you must make out a list for each part which is in a separate voting area, as if it were a separate parish.

Note.—If the local authority has given any special directions as to the mode of making out the list according to streets or otherwise, the town clerk, or other officer issuing the precept, must modify paragraph (14) accordingly.

15. In making out the lists you are to state the surname and other name or names of each person at full length, the surname being placed first.

16. The place of abode should be entered with the name, if any, of the street, lane, or other locality, and the number, if any, in such street, lane, or other locality, and such entry should be made in all cases in such a manner as will afford a full and sufficient address for a person entered if a letter is addressed to him by post.

17.—(i.) The nature of the qualification should be entered as nearly as possible in accordance

with the words of the statute conferring the franchise; for instance:—

- (a.) The nature of the ten pounds occupation qualification of a person should be stated thus:—"tenement" or "land," or "land and tenement," or in case of a joint occupation "tenement (joint)," or "land (joint)," or in the case of a successive occupation "tenement (successive)" or "land (successive)."
- (b.) The nature of a household qualification should be stated thus, "dwelling-house," or in the case of successive occupation, "dwelling-house (successive)."
- (c.) The nature of the old burgess qualification should be stated thus, "house," "warehouse," "counting-house," "chambers," or as the case may be, with the addition of "joint" or "successive" if necessary.
- (ii.) Where the same property constitutes both a ten pounds occupation qualification and also the old burgess qualification, the nature of the qualification should be stated by a description of the tenement thus, "house," "shop," "warehouse," or "building," or "chambers," or as the case may be, or in the case of a joint occupation, "house (joint)," "shop- (joint)," "warehouse (joint)," or as the case may be, or in the case of a successive occupation, "shop (successive)," or as the case may be.
- (iii.) Where the same property constitutes both a ten pounds occupation qualification, or the old burgess qualification, and also a household qualification, the nature of the qualification should be entered as "dwelling-house."
- (iv.) If the description indicates the nature of the qualification, as, for instance, if a ten pounds occupation qualification consists of a house and is entered as a dwelling-house, such description will be sufficient.
- (v.) Any description of the nature of the qualification further than that above mentioned is superfluous, and should not be given.

18. The description of any qualifying property should specify the name and situation of that property, and for that purpose should either state the name (if any) of the street, lane, or other locality, and the number (if any) in such street, lane, or other locality of such property, or the name of the occupying tenant, and the description of the qualifying property should in all cases be such as will afford full and sufficient means of identifying such property.

19. Where several qualifications are possessed by the same person, the particulars respecting each qualification should be stated in the list; and in the case of a list made out in divisions, where a person is entered in division one in respect of one qualification for parliamentary purposes and in respect of another qualification for municipal purposes, each such qualification should be distinguished in the list by a note to the effect that the qualification is for parliamentary purposes only, or for municipal purposes only, as the case may be.

20. The occupiers list (mentioned hereafter in paragraph thirty-five, sub-paragraph (a.)) is to be made in three divisions:

Division one is to comprise the names of the persons entitled both to be registered as parliamentary electors in respect of a ten pounds occupation or household qualification, and to be enrolled as burgesses.

Division two is to comprise the names of the persons entitled to be registered as parliamentary electors in respect of a ten pounds occupation or household qualification, but not to be enrolled as burgesses.

Division three is to comprise the names of the persons entitled to be enrolled as burgesses, but not to be registered as parliamentary electors in respect of a ten pounds occupation or household qualification.

21. You should omit from any list of parliamentary electors (other than the old lodgers list) and from any list of burgesses and from the non-resident list mentioned in sub-paragraph (c.) of paragraph thirty-five, the name of any person—

- (a.) whom from the returns furnished by the registrar of births and deaths, or from your own knowledge, you know to be dead; or
- (b.) who is not qualified by reason of the non-payment of rates; or
- (c.) who is disqualified by reason of having received parochial relief; or
- (d.) †whose name is entered in the corrupt and illegal practices list.†

Omit (d.) where there is no corrupt and illegal practices list.

22. In making out the old lodgers list mentioned hereafter in paragraph thirty-five, sub-paragraph (b.), if you have reason to believe that any person whose name is entered on that list is dead, or is not entitled to be registered, you should make a note to that effect in the margin of the list.

23. The registrars of births and deaths are required to send to you, periodically, returns of the names and residences of all male persons of full age dying within your parish [or township], and also as and when required by you of the names and residences of all women of full age dying within your parish [or township] and you must examine those returns to see whether any person who otherwise would appear in the list of electors is dead, and you are to pay the registrar, as part of your expenses connected with registration, a fee of twopence for each return, and a further fee of twopence for every death entered in such returns.

Publication and Inspection.

24.—(i.) The manner in which you are required to publish the notices, lists, and documents directed by this precept to be published is as follows; that is to say—

(ii.) You are to fix a copy of such notice, list, or document (each copy being first signed by you)—

- (a.) on or near the outside of the outer door or of the outer wall near the door of every church and public chapel in your parish [or township], including chapels which do not belong to the Established Church; and
- (b.) also, having first obtained the authority of the local postmaster, or if he refuses, of the Postmaster-General, in some public and conspicuous position in or near every post office and telegraph office occupied by or on behalf of the Postmaster-General; and
- (c.) also in or near every public or municipal or parochial office in your parish [or township]; or
- (d.) If there is no such church, chapel, or office, then in some public or conspicuous situation in your parish [or township].

25. Everything so published must remain there during a period including two consecutive Sundays at least next after the first day of publication, and if you find any notice, list, or other document published by you in pursuance of this precept to be destroyed, mutilated, defaced, or removed, you are forthwith to place another to the same effect in its place.

26. Where this precept directs you during any period to allow any list, notice, or other document to be open to public inspection and to deliver copies thereof, you will permit such list, notice, or document to be perused by every person desirous of perusing it, at any time between the hours of ten o'clock in the forenoon and four o'clock in the afternoon of any day, except Sunday, during the said period, without payment or demand of any fee; and you are also to deliver a written or printed copy of it, signed by you, to every person applying for the same during the said period, on payment of a price for such copy after the following rate:—

27. You must allow any person who is registered as a parliamentary elector in the said parliamentary borough, or enrolled as a burgess in the said municipal borough, to inspect at all reasonable times, free of charge,—

- (a.) the books containing the poor rates made for your parish [or township] within the last two years, and to make a copy of, or take an extract from, such books, and
- (b.) the returns of deaths sent to you by the registrars of births and deaths.

PART II.

THINGS TO BE DONE IN ORDER OF DATE.

Notices and Inquiries.

28.—(i.) In the months of April and May, or one of them, you are to inquire or ascertain with respect to all property in your parish [or township] which comprises any dwelling-house (including under the term any part of a house separately occupied as a dwelling), whether any man, other than the owner or other person rated or liable to be rated in respect of such property, is entitled to be registered as a parliamentary elector in respect of a household qualification by reason of his being an inhabitant occupier of such dwelling-house, and you are to enter in the rate book, in a separate column added for the purpose, the name of every man so entitled and the situation or description of the dwelling-house in respect of which he is entitled.

(ii.) If any property, whether by reason of belonging to the Crown or otherwise, is not rated, you must act under this paragraph in the same manner as if it were rated.

29. For the purpose of your inquiry you are at liberty to serve on any person who is the occupier or rated or liable to be rated in respect of any property, or on some agent of such person concerned in the management of such property, a requisition according to the Form A among the forms sent herewith. You may serve the requisition by giving it to the person by whom it is to be observed, or by leaving it at his last or usual

place of abode, or with some person on the property, and in case no such person can be found, then by fixing the requisition on some conspicuous part of the property; and where the property is occupied by a company or other body of persons, you may serve the requisition on the secretary or agent of the company or body of persons, and if the property belongs to the Crown or is not rated, you may serve it on the chief local officer having the superintendence or control of the property. A person who fails to comply with the requisition is liable on summary conviction to a penalty of forty shillings.

30. In making the inquiries directed by the two last paragraphs you will observe the following directions:—

(a.) if you know that any man who is not rated has inhabited a dwelling-house since the fifteenth day of July last you should enter the name of that man in the rate book as mentioned in paragraph twenty-eight of this precept, without serving any requisition on the occupier or other person rated;

(b.) you should not serve the requisition on the occupier or owner of any property, unless you have reasonable ground to believe that there is some inhabitant occupier of such property, who is entitled to be registered as an elector, besides the person on whom the requisition is served.

31. On or before the twentieth day of June next you are to publish in manner directed by paragraph twenty-four of this precept a notice signed by you according to the Form B, among the printed forms sent herewith.

32.—(i.) Where any sum on account of a poor rate made and allowed during the twelve months next before the fifth day of January last is on the first day of June next due in respect of any property in your parish [or township] capable of conferring the parliamentary or municipal franchise in respect of the occupation of said property otherwise than as a lodger, you are on or before the twentieth day of June next to give to every occupier of that property a notice (in the form C (No. 1) sent herewith), by delivering it to such occupier, or leaving it at his last or usual place of abode, or with some person on the property in respect of which the rate is payable, and in case no such person can be found, then by affixing the notice upon some conspicuous part of such property.

(ii.) You need not give this notice if the rate has been previously duly demanded of such occupier by a demand note served in the like manner as the last-mentioned notice, but you must serve the notice on every occupier of that property who will, if the rate is paid, be entitled to be registered as an elector in respect of the occupation thereof.

(iii.) Where any sum on account of borough rate made during the twelve months next before the fifth day of January last is on the first day of June next due in respect of any property in your parish [or township] capable of conferring the municipal franchise in respect of the old burgess qualification, the notice must further state that omission to pay the borough rate will disqualify from enrolment as a burgess in respect of the old burgess qualification.

If the borough [or county] rate is levied as a part of the poor rate, the paragraph relating to the borough [or county] rate should be omitted.

33.—(i.) If the sum due on account of poor rate as above mentioned in respect of any property is not paid on or before the twentieth day of July next, all occupiers of that property are disqualified

from being entered in the occupiers list of electors ; and if any sum due on account of borough rate as above mentioned in respect of any property is not paid on or before the twentieth day of July next, all occupiers of that property are disqualified from being entered in any list of burgesses in respect of the old burghess qualification.

If the borough [or county] rate is levied as a part of the poor rate, the part of the paragraph relating to the borough [or county] rate should be omitted.

(ii.) On or before the twenty-second day of July next you are to make out (in the Form C (No. 2) sent herewith) a list containing the name of every person so disqualified ; and you are to keep that list, and during the first fourteen days after the said twenty-second day of July are to allow it to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof in accordance with paragraph twenty-six of this precept.

34. On or before the last day of July next you are to ascertain from the relieving officer acting for your parish [or township] the names of all persons who are disqualified from being inserted in the lists of occupation electors for your parish [or township] by reason of having received parochial relief, and the relieving officer upon your application is bound to produce to you at such place in your parish [or township] and at such times as are required by you the books in his possession containing the names of such persons.

Lists of Electors.

35. On or before the last day of July next you are to make out in manner directed by paragraphs fourteen to twenty-two of this precept the following lists of electors :—

(a.) The occupiers list, that is to say, a list (in the Form D (No. 1) sent herewith) of all persons who by reason of the occupation of property situate wholly or partly within your parish [or township] are entitled to be registered as parliamentary electors in respect of a ten pounds occupation or a household qualification as defined in paragraphs five and six of this precept, or to be enrolled as burgesses of the said municipal borough ;

(b.) The old lodgers list, that is to say, a list (in the Form (D), No. 3, sent herewith) of all persons who, being on the register of electors now in force for the said parliamentary borough in respect of residence in lodgings within your parish [or township] have, on or before the twenty-fifth day of July next, given or caused to be given to you or any one of you claims to have their names inserted in the lists of parliamentary electors in respect of residence in the same lodgings ;

(c.) The non-resident list, that is to say, a list (in the Form G sent herewith) of all persons who are entitled in respect of the occupation of property within your parish [or township], to be elected aldermen or councillors of the said municipal borough, but are not entitled to be on the burghess roll thereof.

36. On or before the first day of August next you are to sign the above-mentioned lists, and to cause a sufficient number of copies of such lists to be written or printed, and to publish the lists signed by you in your parish [or township] in manner directed by paragraph twenty-four of this precept.

37. *You are also to publish at the same time and in the same manner the corrupt and illegal practices list which is sent herewith.

* If there is no corrupt and illegal practices list, the paragraph relating to it must be omitted

38. You are also to cause a sufficient number of the above lists to be written or printed and to keep a written or printed copy of each of the above lists, and during the first fourteen days after the publication of them are to allow them to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof in accordance with paragraph twenty-six of this precept.

39. You are also to keep the list of defaulters in the payment of assessed taxes sent to you by the collector of taxes, and allow it during the first fourteen days after the first publication of the lists of voters to be open for public inspection in manner directed by paragraph twenty-six of this precept.

Claims and Objections.

40. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are to make out (in accordance with paragraphs fourteen to twenty-two of this precept, and according to the Form K sent herewith) claim lists, that is to say, lists containing the name of every person who has given or caused to be given to you, or any one of you, on or before the twentieth day of August next, notice of his claim to have his name inserted in any list of electors for your parish [or township], making separate lists of—

(a.) persons claiming insertion both among the parliamentary electors for the said parliamentary borough and the burgesses for the said municipal borough ;

(b.) persons claiming insertion in a list of parliamentary electors only, but otherwise than as freemen or lodgers ;

(c.) persons claiming insertion in a list of parliamentary electors as lodgers, but not comprised in the old lodgers list ;

(d.) persons claiming insertion in the list of burgesses only ;

(e.) persons claiming insertion in the parochial electors list ;

(f.) persons claiming insertion in the non-resident list ;† and

(g.) persons claiming to have their names omitted from the corrupt and illegal practices list.†

† Omit (g.) if there is no corrupt and illegal practices list.

41. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are also to make out (in accordance with paragraphs fourteen to twenty-two of this precept, and according to the Form L sent herewith) objection lists, that is to say, lists containing the name of every person against whom a notice of objection has been given to you, or any of you, on or before the twentieth day of August next, as not being entitled to have his name retained in a list of electors for your parish [or township], giving in separate lists the objections made to—

(a.) any person on the occupiers list both as a parliamentary elector and a burghess ;

(b.) any person on the occupiers list as a parliamentary elector only ;

(c.) any person on the old lodgers list ;

(d.) any person on any list as a burghess only ;

(e.) any person on the non-resident list ;† and

(f.) any person on the ground that he is omitted from the corrupt and illegal practices list.†

† Omit (f.) if there is no corrupt and illegal practices list.

42. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are to sign each of the claim and objection lists, and to publish it in the manner directed by paragraph twenty-four of the precept.

43. You are to cause a sufficient number of the claim and objection lists signed by you to be written or printed, and are to keep a copy of each

of such lists, and during the fourteen days next after the twenty-fifth day of August are to allow such copies and also the original notices of claims and objections to be open to public inspection, and to deliver copies thereof in accordance with paragraph twenty-six of this precept.

44. On or before the twenty-fifth day of August next you are to deliver to me—

- (a.) two copies of the lists made out under paragraph thirty-five of this precept; and
- (b.) a copy of each of the claim and objection lists made out and signed by you under paragraphs forty to forty-two of this precept.

If the parish is not in a municipal borough insert after the words "deliver to me" the words "and to the clerk of the county council of your administrative county."

45. You are to attend the court to be holden by the revising barrister for the revision of the lists of electors for your parish [or township]; and notice will be sent you of the time and place of holding such court.

46. You are at such court to deliver to the barrister holding it the following documents:—

- (a.) the several lists made out and signed by you; and
- (b.) The original notices of claims and of objections given to you; and you are there to produce the rate books of your parish [or township] containing the poor rates made and allowed during the period between the fifth day of January in last year and the fifteenth day of July next.

If the officer issuing the precept is not the town clerk of a municipal borough, he should append to his signature his proper official description.

If you fail to comply with this precept you will be liable to the penalties in that case provided.

(c.) The temporary absence of the occupier in the performance of any duty does not disqualify him for being registered.

Instructions in the case of a house let in separate tenements.

(11.) The dwelling-house in the second column may be any room or rooms in the house which are separately occupied as a dwelling.

(12.) Insert in the second column the position of the room or rooms occupied—for example, "first floor, front room."

(13.) In the third column insert, opposite to the description of the room or rooms in the second column, the name of the man who now inhabits it or them, and has so inhabited since the fifteenth day of July last.

(14.) If any room or rooms have not been so inhabited, state so, or omit the room or rooms from the second column.

(15.) In filling up the return, it must be recollected that, under the Representation of the People Acts,—

(a.) A man who occupies separately any room or rooms in a house must be entered, although he is entitled to the joint use of some other part of the house; for example, a man occupying separately the first floor front rooms, and having joint use of a wash-house, must be entered:

(b.) The head of the family alone is considered to be the occupier.

(c.) The temporary absence of the occupier in the performance of any duty does not disqualify him for being registered.

(16.) If the landlord of a house let out in separate tenements lives in the house, he must not return the names of the occupiers of tenements in that house.

THE Earl of Kimberley, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received Despatches from Her Majesty's Consul-General at New York, calling attention to the provisions of the new Income Tax Law in the United States. Extracts of these Despatches are appended:—

British Consulate-General, New York,
February, 1895.

I HAVE the honour to inclose a copy of a letter which I have received from the Collector of the Internal Revenue, calling my attention to the provision of the United States Income Tax Law, and stating that, in view of the many persons in Great-Britain who derive income from the United States, it may be deemed proper to give the widest publicity to the said law.

*Internal Revenue Service, Third District
of New York, Collector's Office,
February, 1895.*

I BEG to call your attention to the provision of the United States Income Tax Law requiring that a tax of two per centum shall be levied, collected and paid annually upon the gains, profits, and income from all property owned, and of every business, trade or profession carried on in the United States, and that a penalty of 50 per centum is to be added to the tax upon failure to make a return on or before the first Monday of March next.

In view of the many persons residing in Great Britain who derive income from the United States, you may perhaps deem it proper to give to our said law the widest publicity in the country you represent, that the respective parties subject to the tax may avoid penalty. Upon failure to make the return the Collector is required to assess the tax and penalty against the delinquent.

North-Western Counties Audit District.

WHEREAS by section 4 of the District Auditors Act, 1879, it is enacted that the Local Government Board may from time to time assign to District Auditors their duties, and the districts in which such auditors respectively are to act, and may from time to time change wholly or in part such duties or districts ;

And whereas by an Order dated the thirtieth day of September, 1892, We, the Local Government Board, certified the appointment of the said John Dolby as a District Auditor, and directed that the district in which the said John Dolby should act as auditor, and which should be termed the "North-Western Counties Audit District," should, for the performance of the duties assigned to him by Article 2 of the said Order, comprise the area for the time being included in the several Unions named in Schedule B to the Order, and in the several highway districts named in Schedule C, and the districts or areas subject to the jurisdiction of any such authority as is mentioned in paragraph (5) of the said Article ;

And whereas it is prescribed by the said Article II that it shall be the duty of the said District Auditor to audit the accounts of the authorities and of their officers mentioned or referred to in Nos. (1), (2), (3), and (4) of that Article, as well as the accounts of such other authorities whose accounts are, or may be, by law subject to be so audited, and whose districts or the areas of whose jurisdiction are for the time being partly situated within one or more of the unions named in the Schedule B to that Order, as We may by Order under Our Seal hereafter prescribe ;

And whereas by an Order of the County Council of Chester, which was confirmed by Us by the County of Chester (Birkenhead and Wirral) Confirmation Order, 1894, the townships of Bidston-cum-Ford and Noctorum were united to the Rural District of Wirral, and the said Rural District of Wirral is partly situated within one of the unions named in the said Schedule B, to wit, the Wirral Union, such Union being comprised in the said Audit District ;

And whereas the said Wirral Rural District Council is an authority whose accounts are subject to be audited by a District Auditor :

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, We hereby order and prescribe that it shall, until We otherwise prescribe, be the duty of the said John Dolby to audit the accounts of the said Wirral Rural District Council, in conformity with the

provisions contained in the said Order dated the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two; and that, for the purpose of such audit, the district of the said Rural District Council shall be deemed to be within the said North-Western Counties Audit District.

THE ANIMALS (TRANSIT AND GENERAL) ORDER OF 1895.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

PART I.

TRANSIT—PROTECTION OF ANIMALS.

CHAPTER 1.—ON VESSELS.

Provisions as to Vessels carrying Animals.

1. Except as otherwise expressed, the provisions of this Article shall apply to all vessels in or on which animals are carried to or from any port or place in Great Britain: Provided that the provisions of this Article shall not apply to foreign animals, or to vessels on which foreign animals are carried, provision as to which is made by a separate Order of the Board.

(Parts of Vessel to be used.)

(i.) Animals shall not be carried on any hatch above a compartment where other animals are carried.

(ii.) Animals shall not be carried in any part of the vessel, where, in ordinary course of navigation, they would interfere with the proper management or ventilation of the vessel, or with the efficient working of the boats.

(Pens and Fittings of Vessels.)

(iii.) The animals shall be carried in pens.

(iv.) No pen shall exceed ten feet in length and nine feet in breadth, and the stanchions of each pen shall be securely fastened to the deck by means of iron sockets or otherwise, and the materials used in the construction of the pens shall be of a substantial character, and of sufficient strength to withstand the action of the weather, and to resist the weight of the animals thrown against them. This provision (iv.) shall not until otherwise ordered by the Board apply to vessels which at the date of this Order are regularly employed in conveying animals other than foreign animals.

(v.) Ship's fittings likely to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to animals shall be properly and securely fenced off.

(vi.) The floor of each pen shall, in order to prevent slipping, be fitted with suitable battens or other proper footholds which shall be securely

fastened to the deck by angle iron plates or otherwise and shall be strewn with a proper quantity of sand or other suitable substance.

(vii.) Animals while on board a vessel shall be protected against injury or unnecessary suffering from undue exposure to the weather.

(Passage-Ways.)

(viii.) In all inclosed portions of the vessel in which animals are carried there shall be a passage-way of a minimum width of one foot six inches from the hatchway to the most distant pen, which passage-way shall be kept free of obstruction. This provision (viii.) shall not until otherwise ordered by the Board apply to vessels which at the date of this Order are regularly employed in conveying animals other than foreign animals.

(ix.) Where sheep are carried on deck, proper gangways or passage-ways shall be provided either between or above the pens in which they are carried.

(Ventilation.)

(x.) All parts of the vessel on which animals are carried shall be sufficiently and suitably ventilated. All such parts if below deck shall, in addition to any ventilation obtained by means of the hatchways, be provided with sufficient and suitable ventilators for the removal of foul air and for the admission of a proper supply of fresh air to all the animals carried.

(Light.)

(xi.) All parts of the vessel over which the animals pass or in which they are penned shall be properly lighted, and arrangements shall be made for the provision at all times of adequate light for the proper tending of the animals.

(Overcrowding.)

(xii.) The vessel shall not be overcrowded in any part or pen so as to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to the animals therein.

(Food and Water.)

(xiii.) When animals are carried on a vessel for a voyage which on an average takes more than eighteen hours, they shall be provided while on board with a sufficient amount of food and water, and proper accommodation shall be provided on board for the storage of food so that the same shall not be unduly exposed to the weather at sea.

(Securing of Cattle.)

(xiv.) All fat cattle while being carried on a vessel shall be securely tied by the head.

(Approaches, Gangways, and other Apparatus.)

(xv.) Approaches, gangways, passage-ways, cages, and other apparatus used for the loading or unloading of animals on or from a vessel, shall be so constructed that injury or unnecessary suffering shall not be caused to the animals.

(Attendance.)

(xvi.) A vessel on which animals are carried shall, in addition to the ordinary crew, carry a sufficient number of qualified attendants to properly tend the animals.

(Injured Animals.)

(xvii.) If any animal has a limb broken or is otherwise seriously injured during the voyage, the master of the vessel shall forthwith cause that animal to be slaughtered unless he is satisfied that it can be kept alive and led away without cruelty.

(Returns as to Casualties.)

(xviii.) The owner or charterer of any vessel on which animals are carried, shall keep a record

of all animals which have died or have been killed or seriously injured while on such vessel, and shall at the end of every month send a copy of such record to the Board.

(Shorn Sheep.)

(xix.) Between each first day of November and the next following thirtieth day of April (both days inclusive), shorn sheep shall not be carried on deck, except where they were last shorn more than sixty days before being so carried.

(Saving for Ferry Boats &c.)

(xx.) The foregoing provisions of this Article, except as regards overcrowding, shall not extend to any ferry boat or to any vessel used for carrying animals across an arm of the sea or on a river, canal, or other inland water, but the fittings of every such boat or vessel shall be such as to protect, so far as practicable, the animals so carried from injury and unnecessary suffering.

Detention.

2. Animals landed from a vessel shall, on a certificate of an Inspector of the Board, certifying to the effect that the provisions of this Chapter, or any of them, have not been observed in the vessel, be detained, at the place of landing, or in lairs adjacent thereto, until the Board otherwise direct.

CHAPTER 2.—FOOD AND WATER.

Food and Water during Detention.

3. An Inspector, officer, or constable detaining an animal, horse, ass, or mule under the Act of 1894 or any Order of the Board shall cause it to be supplied with requisite food and water during its detention; and the expenses incurred by him in respect thereof may be recovered summarily from the person having charge of the animal, horse, ass, or mule, or from its owner.

Water at Shipping and Unshipping Places.

4. At every place where animals are put on board of or landed from vessels, provision shall be made, to the satisfaction of the Board, for a supply of water for animals; and water shall be supplied there, gratuitously, on request of any person having charge of any animal.

Food at Unshipping Places.

5. At every place where animals are landed from vessels, provision shall be made, to the satisfaction of the Board, for the speedy and convenient landing of animals, and for a supply of food for them; and food shall be supplied there, on request of any person having charge of any animal, at such price as the Board approve.

This Chapter not applicable to Foreign Animals &c.

6. The provisions of this Chapter shall not apply to foreign animals, or to vessels on which foreign animals are carried, provision as to which is made by a separate Order of the Board.

CHAPTER 3.—ON RAILWAYS.

Trucks, Horse-Boxes &c.

7. Every railway truck, horse-box, or other railway vehicle, used for carrying animals, horses, asses, or mules on a railway, shall be provided at each end with two spring buffers, and the floor thereof shall, in order to prevent slipping, be strewn with a proper quantity of litter or sand or other proper substance, or be fitted with battens or other proper foot-holds.

Overcrowding.

8. A railway company shall not allow any railway truck, horse-box, or other vehicle used for carrying animals, horses, asses, or mules on the railway to be overcrowded so as to cause unnecessary suffering to the animals, horses, asses, or mules therein.

Shorn Sheep.

9. Between each first day of November and the next following thirtieth day of April (both days inclusive) every railway truck or other railway vehicle in which sheep shorn and unclotted are being carried shall be covered and inclosed so as to protect the sheep from the weather, without obstruction to ventilation; but this Article shall not apply to sheep last shorn more than sixty days before being so carried.

CHAPTER 4.—OFFENCES.

10. If anything is done or omitted to be done in contravention of any of the provisions of this Part of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place where animals are put on board of or landed from vessels at which,—and the railway company carrying animals on or owning or working the railway on which,—and also, in case of the overcrowding of a vessel in any part or pen, or of a railway truck, horse-box, or other vehicle on a railway, or of the carrying on a railway of sheep shorn and unclotted, the consignor of the animals in respect of which;—(as the case may be,) the same is done or omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his or their own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

PART II.

TRANSIT—DISINFECTION.

CHAPTER 5.—WATER TRAFFIC.

Vessels.

11.—(1.) A vessel used for carrying animals by sea, or on a canal, river, or inland navigation, shall, after the landing of animals therefrom, and before the taking on board of any other animal or other cargo, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

- (i.) All parts of the vessel with which any animal or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept: then
- (ii.) The same parts of the vessel shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water: then
- (iii.) The same parts of the vessel shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash: except that
- (iv.) The application of lime-wash shall not be compulsory as regards such parts of the vessel as are used for passengers or the crew.
- (v.) All fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about animals shall if not removed from the vessel be scraped, and then shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and then shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the vessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

(3.) In the case of a ferry-boat or other vessel which makes short and frequent passages across a river or an arm of the sea or other water it shall be sufficient if the ferry-boat or vessel be cleansed and disinfected once in every period of twelve hours within which it is so used.

Fodder and Litter.

12. All partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to, and all litter that has been used for or about, animals carried by sea, or on a canal, river, or inland navigation, shall, when landed from the vessel, be forthwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Moveable Gangways and other Apparatus.

13.—(1.) A moveable gangway, passage-way, cage, or other apparatus used or intended for the loading or unloading of animals on or from a vessel, or otherwise used in connexion with the transit of animals by sea, or on a canal, river, or inland navigation, shall, so soon as practicable after being so used, be cleansed as follows :

- (i.) The apparatus shall be scraped and swept, and all dung, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom : then
 - (ii.) The apparatus shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water.
- (2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the apparatus, and all dung, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

This Chapter not applicable to Foreign Animals &c.

14. The provisions of this Chapter shall not apply to foreign animals, or to vessels or things used for or about foreign animals, provision as to which is made by a separate Order of the Board.

CHAPTER 6.—RAILWAY TRAFFIC.

Horse-Boxes.

15.—(1.) A horse-box used for horses, asses, or mules on a railway shall, on every occasion after a horse, ass, or mule is taken out of it, and before any other horse, ass, or mule, or any animal is placed therein, be cleansed as follows :

- (i.) The floor of the horse-box, and all other parts thereof with which the droppings of any horse, ass, or mule have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, fodder, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom : and
 - (ii.) The sides of the horse-box, and all other parts thereof with which the head or any discharge from the mouth or nostrils of any horse, ass, or mule has come in contact shall be thoroughly washed with water by means of a sponge, brush, or other instrument.
- (2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the horse-box, and all dung, sawdust, fodder, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime.

Horse-Boxes, Guards' Vans &c.

16.—(1.) A horse-box or a guard's van or other railway vehicle (not being a railway truck) if used for animals on a railway shall, on every occasion after an animal is taken out of it, and before any other animal, or any horse, ass, or mule is placed in it, be cleansed and disinfected as follows :

- (i.) If the animal so taken out was accompanied by a declaration in writing of the owner or consignee or his agent to the effect that it is intended for exhibition or other special purpose therein stated, and has not, to the best of his knowledge and belief, been exposed to the infection of disease, the vehicle shall be cleansed as follows :

(a.) The floor of the vehicle, and all other parts thereof with which the droppings of the animal have come in contact, shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, fodder, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom : and

(b.) The sides of the vehicle, and all other parts thereof with which the head or any discharge from the mouth or nostrils of the animal has come in contact shall be thoroughly washed with water by means of a sponge, brush, or other instrument : but

(ii.) If the animal so taken out was not accompanied by such a declaration, the vehicle shall be cleansed and disinfected as follows :

(c.) The floor of the vehicle, and all other parts thereof with which the droppings of the animal have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, fodder, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed from the vehicle : then

(d.) The same parts of the vehicle shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water : then

(e.) The same parts of the vehicle shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) In all cases the scrapings and sweepings of the vehicle, and all dung, sawdust, fodder, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Trucks.

17.—(1.) A railway truck, if used for animals on a railway, shall, on every occasion after an animal is taken out of it, and before any other animal, or any horse, ass, or mule, or any fodder or litter, or anything intended to be used for or about animals, is placed in it, be cleansed and disinfected as follows :

(i.) The floor of the truck, and all other parts thereof with which any animal or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom : then

(ii.) The same parts of the truck shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water : then

(iii.) The same parts of the truck shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the truck, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Vans.

18.—(1.) A van used for containing animals, horses, asses, or mules while carried on a railway, shall, on every occasion after a diseased or suspected animal, horse, ass, or mule is taken out of it, and so soon as practicable, and before any other animal, horse, ass, or mule is placed in it, be cleansed and disinfected as follows :

(i.) The floor of the van, and all other parts thereof with which any animal, horse, ass, or mule, or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom : then

(ii.) The same parts of the van shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water : then

(iii.) The same parts of the van shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the van, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Moveable Gangways and other Apparatus.

19.—(1.) A moveable gangway, passage-way, cage, or other apparatus used or intended for the loading or unloading of animals on or from a railway truck, or other railway vehicle, or otherwise used in connexion with the transit of animals on a railway, shall, so soon as practicable after being so used, be cleansed as follows:

(i.) The apparatus shall be scraped and swept, and all dung, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom: then

(ii.) The apparatus shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the apparatus, and all dung, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Pens.

20.—(1.) Every pen or other place being in, about, near, or on a station, building, or land of a railway company, and used or intended to be used by or by permission of a railway company, or otherwise, for the reception or keeping of animals before, after, or in course of their transit by railway, shall be cleansed and disinfected, either on each day on which it is used and after it has been used, or at some time not later than twelve o'clock at noon of the next following day and before it is used on such next following day: Provided that, where such user is on a Saturday, the Monday following shall be considered to be the next following day for such purpose.

(2.) Every such pen or other place shall be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

(i.) All parts of the pen or other place with which any animal or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom: then

(ii.) The same parts of the pen or other place shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water: then

(iii.) The same parts of the pen or other place shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(3.) The scrapings and sweepings of the pen or other place, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

CHAPTER 7.—ROAD TRAFFIC.

Vans.

21.—(1.) A van used for moving animals, horses, asses, or mules by road, shall, on every occasion after a diseased or suspected animal, horse, ass, or mule is taken out of it, and so soon as practicable, and before any other animal, horse, ass, or mule is placed in it, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

(i.) The floor of the van, and all other parts thereof with which any animal, horse, ass, or mule, or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung,

sawdust, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom: then

(ii.) The same parts of the van shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water: then

(iii.) The same parts of the van shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the van, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

CHAPTER 8.—LANDING-PLACES.

22.—(1.) When an animal at a place of landing or place adjacent thereto is affected with disease, that place and every other place where the animal is or since landing has been shall not be used for any animals other than animals brought thereto with that animal (in the same vessel or otherwise) unless and until the place has been, so far as practicable, cleansed and disinfected.

(2.) Nothing in this Chapter shall apply to a Foreign Animals Wharf or to a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or to a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals.

CHAPTER 9.—OFFENCES.

23. If anything is done or omitted to be done in contravention of any of the provisions of this Part of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in or in respect of which,—and the owner of the gangway or passage-way, cage, or other apparatus in respect of which,—and the railway company carrying animals, horses, asses, or mules on or owning or working the railway on which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the pen or other place in which,—and the person using the van in which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing or place adjacent thereto or other place in which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any other place or thing in respect of which,—(as the case may be,) the same is done or omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his or their own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

PART III.

GENERAL.

CHAPTER 10.—MARKETS, FAIRS &c.

Regulations of Local Authority as to Cleansing and Disinfection of Markets &c.

24.—(1.) A Local Authority may make such Regulations as they think fit for the following purposes, or any of them:

For requiring the owners, lessees, or occupiers of markets, fairs, sale-yards, places of exhibition, lairs, or other places used for animals to cleanse those places, from time to time, at their own expense:

For requiring the owners, lessees, or occupiers of those places to disinfect the same, or any specified part thereof, from time to time, at their own expense, where, in the judgment of the Local Authority, the circumstances are such as to allow of such disinfection being reasonably required:

For prescribing the mode in which such cleansing and such disinfection are to be effected.

(2.) If the owner, lessee, or occupier of any such place does any act in contravention of any such Regulations, or fails in any respect to observe the same, then, without prejudice to any other liability consequent thereon, it shall not be lawful for him or any other person at any time there-

after, without permission in writing of the Local Authority, to hold a market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals in that place, or to use that lair or place for animals; and the holding therein of any market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals, or the use of that lair or place for animals, shall be and the same is hereby prohibited accordingly.

CHAPTER 11.—INSPECTORS.

Exceptional Qualification of Veterinary Inspector.

25. The following is hereby approved as the qualification of a veterinary practitioner (not being a member of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, or, in Scotland, not holding the Veterinary Certificate of the Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland,) to be a Veterinary Inspector of a Local Authority in Great Britain, namely,— that he is registered as an Existing Practitioner under section fifteen of the Veterinary Surgeons Act, 1881, or that previous to the tenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, he was employed by that Local Authority as an Inspector or Veterinary Adviser under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869.

Notice to Board as to Inspectors.

26. Whenever a Veterinary Inspector or an Inspector is appointed under section thirty-five of the Act of 1894, or there is any change in the name or address or District of a Veterinary Inspector or Inspector, the Local Authority shall forthwith report the same to the Board.

CHAPTER 12.—MISCELLANEOUS.

Publication of Orders of the Board by Local Authority.

27. When an Order of the Board is sent, under sub-section four of section forty-nine of the Act of 1894, by the Board to a Local Authority for publication, the Order shall be published by that Local Authority, either by advertisement or by notice in a newspaper circulating in the District of that Local Authority, or by means of handbills containing a copy of or an abstract from such Order of the Board either distributed to persons affected by the Order or affixed to places where Local Notices are usually exhibited in the District of that Local Authority, or in such other manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to insure publicity for the same.

Orders and Regulations of Local Authority.

28.—(1.) Every order or regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board shall be published by advertisement in a newspaper circulating in the District of the Local Authority, or in such other manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to insure publicity for the same.

(2.) A Local Authority may by any order or regulation revoke or alter any former order or regulation made by them.

(3.) A Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board a copy of every order or regulation made by them.

(4.) If the Board are satisfied on inquiry, with respect to any order or regulation made by a Local Authority, that the same is for any reason objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Printed Documents and Forms.

29. Except where it is otherwise provided for in any Order of the Board, a Local Authority shall provide and supply, without charge, printed copies of documents or forms requisite under the Act of 1894 or any Order of the Board.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

30. The provisions of this Order, except where

it is otherwise provided, shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Interpretation.

31. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires,—

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture:
“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894:

“Cattle” means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves:

“Animals” means cattle, sheep, and goats, and all other ruminating animals, and swine:

“Foreign,” applied to animals and things, means brought to the United Kingdom from any country out of the United Kingdom:

“Disease” includes, with the diseases specified in the Act of 1894 (that is cattle-plague, contagious pleuro-pneumonia of cattle, foot-and-mouth disease, sheep-pox, sheep-scab, and swine - fever), glanders (including farcy), rabies, and anthrax:

“Diseased” or “suspected” means affected with disease or suspected of being diseased:

“Fodder” means hay or other substance commonly used for food of animals:

“Litter” means straw or other substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals:

“Master” includes a person having the charge or command of a vessel:

“Van” means a vehicle constructed for moving animals by road:

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Revocation of Orders.

32. The Orders described in the Schedule to this Order, to the extent described in that Schedule, are hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the parts of the Orders hereby revoked, or affect any licence or authority granted, or any right, title, obligation, or liability accrued thereunder before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the parts of the Orders hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

Existing Regulations of Local Authority.

33. All Regulations made by a Local Authority as to the cleansing and disinfection of markets, fairs, sale-yards, places of exhibition, lairs, or other places used for animals under any Order by this Order revoked, and in force immediately before the commencement of this Order, shall be deemed to have been made under this Order, and shall continue in force until altered or revoked by the Local Authority or by the Board.

Commencement.

34. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

Short Title.

35. This Order may be cited as THE ANIMALS (TRANSIT AND GENERAL) ORDER OF 1895.

**THE WATER SUPPLY ON RAILWAYS
ORDER OF 1895.**

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Water Supply on Railways.

1. The railway companies working the railways named in the First Schedule to this Order shall make a provision of water, to the satisfaction of the Board of Agriculture, at each of the stations therein named, for animals carried or about to be carried or having been carried on those railways.

Revocation of Order.

2. The Order described in the Second Schedule to this Order, to the extent described in that Schedule, is hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked : Provided that such revocation shall not interfere with the

institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the part of the Order hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

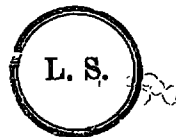
Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

THE FOREIGN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1895.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

CHAPTER 1.—PROHIBITION.

Prohibited Countries.

1. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from any of the countries or parts of countries mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order shall not be landed.

CHAPTER 2.—FOREIGN ANIMALS SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER.

Conditions of Landing.

2.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Foreign Animals Wharf under the provisions of section twenty-four of the Act of 1894 and Part I of the Third Schedule to that Act and of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions :

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any of the following countries, namely—

Austria Hungary (including Bosnia and Herzegovina),
Belgium,
Denmark (excluding Iceland),
France,
Germany,
Gibraltar,
Greece,
Italy,
Malta,
Montenegro,
Morocco,
Natal,
Netherlands,
Norway, Province of Finmark in,
Ottoman Dominions,
Portugal,
Portuguese State of East Africa,
Roumania,
Russia,
Servia,
Spain,
Sweden,
Zululand,

or from any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

Second. That the vessel has not within twenty-one days before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported, entered or been in any

port or place in any of the countries or parts of countries mentioned above in the first condition of this Article, or any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

Third. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any of the countries or parts of countries mentioned above in the first condition of this Article, or from any port or place from which the landing of animals is for the time being prohibited.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf unless and until the master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein delivered to the Commissioners of Customs or their proper officer, a declaration made and signed that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Regulations applying to Landing-Stage.

3.—(1.) No person, except the officers of Customs and lairage-men and the Superintendent of the Foreign Animals Wharf and an Inspector of the Board, and such other persons as may be specially authorized by the Inspector of the Board, shall during the time of the landing of the animals be admitted to the landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf at which the animals are landed, nor until such landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Wharf has since the animals were landed been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Inspector of the Board.

(2.) All persons before leaving such landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Wharf shall take such means for preventing the spreading of disease, by washing and disinfecting themselves, and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Board may direct or require.

Charge of Animals on Landing.

4.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, when landed, be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Board; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

(2.) It shall not be lawful for any person to move any animals so long as they remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs or of an Inspector of the Board except with the permission of the Commissioners or of the Inspector, as the case may be.

Disposal of Animals on Landing.

5. Animals when landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be driven by lairage-men to the nearest available reception-lair or lairs within the limits of the Wharf, there to await the exami-

nation of an Inspector of the Board, and, until so examined, shall not be allowed to come in contact with any animals other than those forming part of the same cargo.

Regulations applying to Reception-Lair.

6.—(1.) No person, except the officers of Customs and lairage-men and the Superintendent of the Foreign Animals Wharf and an Inspector of the Board, and such other persons as may be specially authorized by the Inspector of the Board, shall be admitted to the reception-lair.

(2.) All persons before leaving the reception-lair shall take such means for preventing the spreading of disease, by washing and disinfecting themselves, and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Board may direct or require.

(3.) The animals shall be examined in the reception-lair by an Inspector of the Board during daylight.

(4.) If on such examination all the animals are found free from disease, the Inspector of the Board may permit the animals to be moved out of the reception-lair and into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of the Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Board direct or permit.

(5.) If on such examination any one or more of the animals is or are found to be affected with disease, all the diseased animals being affected with one and the same disease, then the Rules set forth in Part I of the Third Schedule to this Order shall have effect in relation to the reception-lair and to the animals to which those Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(6.) If on such examination any two or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) cattle-plague, (b) pleuro-pneumonia, (c) foot-and-mouth disease, (d) sheep-pox, (e) sheep-scab, and (f) swine-fever are found to exist, then the Rules set forth in Part II of the Third Schedule to this Order shall have effect in relation to the reception-lair and to the animals to which those Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(7.) The slaughter of such animals under the Rules set forth in the Third Schedule to this Order shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as an Inspector of the Board in any case directs, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Regulations applying to all Parts of Foreign Animals Wharf (other than Reception-Lair) on Detection of Disease.

7.—(1.) If it appears to an Inspector of the Board that disease exists or has lately existed in any one or more animals in any particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf (other than a reception-lair), all the diseased or suspected animals being affected with or suspected of one and the same disease, then the Rules set forth in Part I of the Third Schedule to this Order shall have effect in relation to that particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf and to any other part or parts of the Wharf in which, in the opinion of the Inspector of the Board, there is or has been a diseased or suspected animal, and to the animals to which those Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(2.) If it appears to the Inspector of the Board that any two or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) cattle-plague, (b) pleuro-pneumonia, (c) foot-and-mouth disease, (d) sheep-pox, (e) sheep-scab, and (f) swine-fever exist or have lately existed in any particular building,

lair, slaughter-house or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf (other than a reception-lair), then the Rules set forth in Part II of the Third Schedule to this Order shall have effect in relation to that particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf and to any other part or parts of the Wharf in which, in the opinion of the Inspector of the Board, there are or have been any diseased or suspected animals, and to the animals to which those Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(3.) The slaughter of such animals under the Rules set forth in the Third Schedule to this Order shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Board in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Food and Water.

8.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, until they are taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the occupiers of the Wharf or the person in charge thereof with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water, and the expenses incurred by them in respect thereof shall be defrayed by the owners or consignees of the animals, and may be recovered by such occupiers or person from the owners or consignees in any court of competent jurisdiction.

(2.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, after they have been taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the owners or consignees with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water.

(3.) The food supplied to sucking-calves in accordance with this Article shall be gruel or milk or other proper food.

(4.) If an animal remains without a proper and sufficient supply of food or water in contravention of the provisions of this Article, the occupiers of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and the owner and the consignee and the person in charge of the animal, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894; and it shall lie on the person liable to supply food and water to the animal when charged to prove the proper and sufficient supply of food or water or both and the time when the same was so supplied.

Time for Slaughter.

9.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be slaughtered within ten days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing.

(2.) The slaughter of the animals may be commenced at any time after the landing thereof with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(3.) The slaughter of the animals shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Board in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Movement of Carcases, Manure &c.

10.—(1.) No carcase, offal, fodder, litter or dung or manure shall be removed from a Foreign Animals Wharf, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) All offal (except such parts as are intended for human food) before being so removed from the Wharf, shall be treated as follows:

- (i.) Either such offal shall be boiled or scalded:
- (ii.) Or such offal may, with a Licence from the Board, but not otherwise, be washed in the following solution, namely:—Carbolic acid or chloride of lime one part; and water forty parts:

and in either case such treatment shall be to the satisfaction of the Inspector of the Board.

(3.) All dung and manure shall, before being so removed from a Foreign Animals Wharf, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

(4.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such carcase or thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Board.

Disinfection of Foreign Animals Wharf.

11. If an animal in a Foreign Animals Wharf is affected with disease, the portion of the Wharf where the diseased animal is or has been, shall not be used for animals unless and until that portion has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Board.

Restriction on Use of Foreign Animals Wharf.

12.—(1.) No animals other than foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter, or animals moved into a Foreign Animals Wharf under the provisions of this Order, shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Foreign Animals Wharf.

(2.) Any animal being in a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the provisions of this Order relating to the Wharf shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Foreign Animals Wharf shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Act of 1894 or any Order of the Board under the said Act in relation thereto.

CHAPTER 3.—QUARANTINE.

Quarantine Stations.

13. Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station must be intended for reshipment to a foreign country, or for purposes of exhibition, or for other exceptional purposes, the proposed landing to be in each case approved by the Board on special application through the Commissioners of Customs.

Animals intended for Reshipment to a Foreign Country.

14.—(1.) Reshipment Station in this Article means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Board as a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station for the landing and quarantining of foreign animals intended for reshipment to a foreign country.

(2.) The landing of foreign animals intended for reshipment to a foreign country is subject to the following conditions:

First. The animals must be landed at a Reshipment Station.

Second. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee of the animals or his agent declaring that each animal is intended for reshipment to a foreign country.

Third. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee or his agent declaring that to the best of his knowledge and belief each animal is not affected with contagious or infectious disease.

Fourth. The animals shall not be moved alive out of the Reshipment Station except into a vessel for exportation to a foreign country, and until reshipped shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Animals intended for Purposes of Exhibition, or for other Exceptional Purposes (other than Reshipment).

15.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals intended for purposes of exhibition, or for other exceptional purposes (other than reshipment) at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is subject to the following conditions:

First. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee of the animals or his agent, declaring the purposes for which each animal is intended.

Second. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee or his agent, declaring that to the best of his knowledge and belief each animal is not affected with disease.

Third. The animals when landed shall be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Board; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Fourth. The animals when landed shall be detained in the Station for such period as the Board in each case according to the circumstances direct.

Fifth. When moved thereout the animals shall be accompanied by—

(a.) a Certificate of an Inspector of the Board certifying that they are free from disease; and

(b.) a Licence of an Inspector of the Board specifying the place to which and the person to whom they are to be taken.

Sixth. The Inspector of the Board giving the Licence shall send a copy of the Licence to the Local Authority for the district in which the place to which the animals are to be taken is situate.

(2.) It shall not be lawful for any person to take the animals to any other place or person.

Movement of Carcases.

16.—(1.) No carcase shall be removed from a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such carcase as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Board.

Disinfection of Dung and Manure.

17. Dung and manure shall, before being removed from a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Board.

Disinfection of Quarantine Station.

18. Where an animal in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is affected with disease, the portion of the Station where the diseased animal is or has been, shall not be used for animals unless and until that portion has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Board.

Restriction on Use of Quarantine Station.

19.—(1.) No animals other than foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter, shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station.

(2.) Any animal being in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the provisions of this Order relating to the Station shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Foreign Animals Quarantine Station shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Act of 1894 or any Order of the Board under the said Act in relation thereto.

CHAPTER 4.—FOREIGN ANIMALS NOT SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE.

Free Countries.

20.—(1.) Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from any of the countries or parts of countries mentioned in Part I of the Second Schedule to this Order are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Third Schedule to the Act of 1894, or under this Order, to slaughter or quarantine.

(2.) Unless and until the Board otherwise order, sheep brought from the country mentioned in Part II of the Second Schedule to this Order are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Third Schedule of the Act of 1894, or under this Order, to slaughter or quarantine.

(3.) Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals other than cattle brought from the country mentioned in Part III of the Second Schedule to this Order are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Third Schedule to the Act of 1894, or under this Order, to slaughter or quarantine.

Landing-Places for Foreign Animals.

21.—(1.) Foreign animals subject to the provisions of this Chapter shall not (except as specially provided by this Order) be landed at any place other than a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals.

(2.) Those foreign animals shall be landed in such manner, at such times, subject to such supervision and control, and under such Regulations, as the Commissioners of Customs direct.

(3.) When landed they shall be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Board; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Conditions of Landing.

22.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-eight days before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America (provision as to which country is made by the second condition of this Article), or Iceland, or New Zealand; or Norway (excluding the Province of Finmark), or the Channel Islands, or the United States of America (provision as to which last-mentioned country is made by the third condition of this Article), or the Isle of Man.

Second. That, in the case of the landing of cattle, the vessel in which they are imported has not within twenty-eight days before taking them on board had on board any cattle exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America.

Third. That, in the case of the landing of cattle or swine, the vessel in which they are imported has not, within twenty-one days before taking them on board had on board any cattle or swine exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in the United States of America.

Fourth. That the vessel in which they are

imported has not, within twenty-one days before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported, entered or been in any port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or Iceland, or New Zealand, or Norway (excluding the Province of Finmark), or the Channel Islands, or the United States of America, or the Isle of Man.

Fifth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any country other than Her Majesty's Possessions in North America (provision as to which country is made by the sixth condition of this Article), or Iceland, or New Zealand; or Norway (excluding the Province of Finmark), or the Channel Islands, or the United States of America (provision as to which last-mentioned country is made by the seventh condition of this Article), or the Isle of Man.

Sixth. That none of the cattle imported have while on board the vessel been in contact with any cattle exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America.

Seventh. That none of the cattle or swine imported have while on board the vessel been in contact with any cattle or swine exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in the United States of America.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals unless and until—

(a.) the owner or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in England or Wales or Scotland, has entered into a bond to Her Majesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing conditions; and

(b.) the master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein satisfied the Commissioners of Customs, or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Twelve Hours Detention

23. Foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter shall be detained in the Landing-Place for Foreign Animals for at least twelve hours reckoned from the time of the landing of the last animal of the cargo, whether the whole cargo is landed continuously without intermission at one place or part thereof is landed at one place and part at another place, or parts thereof are landed at different times at the same place.

Examination and Consequences.

24.—(1.) Foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter shall not be moved from the Landing-Place for Foreign Animals, or be allowed to come in contact with any other animals, until they have been examined by an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) The animals shall be examined by the Inspector of the Board during daylight, and such examination shall take place after the expiration of the twelve hours detention mentioned in the last preceding Article.

(3.) If on such examination all the animals

landed from the same vessel are found free from disease, they may be moved from the Landing-Place for Foreign Animals and shall thereupon cease to be deemed foreign animals (except for the purpose of sub-section seven of section twenty of the Act of 1894): Provided that nothing in this paragraph applying to animals shall be deemed to extend or apply to the dung of such animals, nor to any fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils brought in the same vessel with such animals.

(4.) If on such examination any one or more of the animals landed from a vessel is or are found affected with cattle-plague or foot-and-mouth disease, the Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals that are within the Landing-Place for Foreign Animals and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph to the Board. The Inspector of the Board shall cause all the animals within the Landing-Place for Foreign Animals so detained to be slaughtered.

(5.) If on such examination any one or more of the animals landed from a vessel is or are found affected with pleuro-pneumonia or sheep-pox or sheep-scab or swine-fever, the Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals of the same kind as the diseased animals which were brought in the same vessel with the diseased animal or animals (that is, all the cattle or all the sheep or all the goats or all the swine) amongst which the disease is found and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Board. The Inspector of the Board shall cause all the animals of the particular kind so detained to be slaughtered.

(6.) The slaughter of the animals under paragraphs (4) and (5) of this Article shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Board in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Continuance of One Cargo.

25.—(1.) For the purposes of this Chapter all animals brought at the same time in the same vessel shall be deemed to continue and be one cargo during the time of the twelve hours or other period of detention, whether they are all landed continuously without intermission at one place, or some of them are landed at one place and some at another place, or some of them are landed at one time and some at another time at the same place.

(2.) Where an animal forming part of one cargo of foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter has not been kept separate from an animal forming part of another cargo of foreign animals, all the animals forming those two cargoes shall be dealt with as if they formed one cargo.

Detention of Suspected Animals.

26. An Inspector of the Board may detain, for any period that he thinks necessary or proper, any foreign animal under this Chapter which he has reason to suspect is diseased or may introduce disease.

Food and Water.

27.—(1.) Animals landed at a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals shall, until they are taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the occupiers of the Landing-Place or the person in charge thereof with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water, and the expenses incurred by them in respect thereof shall be defrayed by the owners or consignees of the animals, and may be recovered by such occupiers or person from the owners or consignees in any court of competent jurisdiction.

(2.) Animals landed at a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals shall, after they have been taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the owners or consignees with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water.

(3.) The food supplied to sucking-calves in accordance with this Article shall be gruel or milk or other proper food.

(4.) If an animal remains without a proper and sufficient supply of food or water in contravention of the provisions of this Article, the occupiers of the Landing-Place for Foreign Animals, and the owner and the consignee and the person in charge of the animal, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894; and it shall lie on the person liable to supply food and water to the animal when charged to prove the proper and sufficient supply of food or water or both and the time when the same was so supplied.

Movement of Animals, Carcasses, Manure &c.

28.—(1.) No animal, carcass, fodder, litter, or dung or manure shall be moved from a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals, or from any lair or other place therein, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such animal or thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be slaughtered, destroyed, or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions given by the Board.

Disinfection of Landing-Place for Foreign Animals.

29. Where an animal in a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals is affected with disease, the portion of the Landing-Place where the diseased animal is or has been, shall not be used for animals unless and until that portion has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Board.

Restriction on Use of Landing-Place for Foreign Animals.

30.—(1.) No animals other than foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals.

(2.) Any animal being in a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the provisions of this Order relating to the Landing-Place shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Landing-Place for Foreign Animals shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Act of 1894 or any Order of the Board under the said Act in relation thereto.

Landing of other Foreign Animals.

31. Nothing in this Chapter shall prevent the landing of any foreign animal at a Foreign Animals Wharf if the owner of the animal or his agent in Great Britain, or the consignee thereof, so desires.

CHAPTER 5.—CHANNEL ISLANDS.

32. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from the Channel Islands are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Act of 1894, or under this Order, to slaughter or to quarantine, but such animals shall be subject to the provisions of Chapter 4 of this Order (FOREIGN ANIMALS NOT SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE).

CHAPTER 6.—ISLE OF MAN.

33. Unless and until the Board otherwise order, animals brought from the Isle of Man are

allowed to be landed without being subject under the Act of 1894, or under this Order, to slaughter or to quarantine, or without being subject to the provisions of Chapter 4 of this Order (FOREIGN ANIMALS NOT SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE).

CHAPTER 7.—LANDING AND DISPOSAL OF DUNG, FODDER, LITTER, FITTINGS, AND OTHER THINGS.

Landing subject to Customs Regulations.

34. All dung of foreign animals, and all fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about foreign animals, and all other dung, fodder, or litter brought in the same vessel with foreign animals, shall, if landed, be landed in such manner, at such times, at such places, and subject to such supervision and control, as the Commissioners of Customs direct.

Treatment of Dung, Fodder &c. of Animals which are not intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

35.—(1.) All dung of foreign animals that have not been or are not intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf, and all partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to, and all litter that has been used for or about, such animals, shall, when landed, be forthwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

(2.) Nothing in this Article shall apply to any such dung, fodder, or litter landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf or at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or at a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals.

Landing and Treatment of Dung, Fodder &c. of Animals which have been or are intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

36.—(1.) Dung of foreign animals that have been or are intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf, and partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to such animals, and litter that has been used for or about such animals, shall not be landed at any place without the previous consent in writing of the Local Authority of the District in which the place is situate.

(2.) All such dung and all such partly consumed or broken fodder and all such litter shall, when so landed, be forthwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

(3.) All other fodder and litter brought in the same vessel with such animals may be landed without the previous consent of the Local Authority, but shall, when landed, remain under the charge of an Officer of Customs, and such fodder and litter shall not be removed from the place where landed except with the permission in writing of an Officer of Customs.

(4.) Fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about such animals shall not be landed at any place without the consent in writing of the Local Authority of the District in which the place is situate unless they have been cleansed and disinfected in manner provided by paragraph (v.) of Article 38 of this Order previous to the landing thereof. If landed with such consent without having been so previously cleansed and disinfected they shall be forthwith cleansed and disinfected in the manner aforesaid by and at the expense of the owner, and shall not be removed or permitted to come in contact with any animals until so cleansed and disinfected.

(5.) Nothing in this Article shall apply to the landing of any dung of such animals, nor

to the landing of any fodder or litter, or any fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils at a Foreign Animals Wharf or at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or at a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals, nor to the treatment or disposal of the same when landed thereat.

Removal of Fittings &c. from Foreign Animals Wharf or Station or Landing-Place.

37.—(1.) Fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils that have been used for or about animals and have been landed from a vessel at a Foreign Animals Wharf or at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or at a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals shall not be removed from the Wharf or Station or Landing-Place until they have been cleansed and disinfected in manner provided by paragraph (v.) of Article 38 of this Order, and except with the permission of an Inspector of the Board.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Board is of opinion that any such thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions from time to time given by the Board.

CHAPTER 8.—DISINFECTION.

Vessels.

38.—(1.) A vessel used for carrying foreign animals shall, after the landing of animals therefrom, and before the taking on board of any other animal or other cargo, be cleansed and disinfected as follows :

(i.) All parts of the vessel with which any animal or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept : then

(ii.) The same parts of the vessel shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water : then

(iii.) The same parts of the vessel shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash : except that

(iv.) The application of lime-wash shall not be compulsory as regards such parts of the vessel as are used for passengers or the crew.

(v.) All fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about animals shall if not removed from the vessel be scraped, and then shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and then shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the vessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

(3.) The provisions of this Article shall be enforced by the Local Authority.

Moveable Gangways and other Apparatus.

39.—(1.) A moveable gangway, passage-way, cage, or other apparatus, used or intended for the loading or unloading of foreign animals on or from a vessel, or otherwise used in connexion with the transit of foreign animals, shall, so soon as practicable after being so used, be cleansed as follows :

(i.) The apparatus shall be scraped and swept, and all dung, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom : then

(ii.) The apparatus shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the apparatus, and all dung, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

CHAPTER 9.—PROTECTION OF ANIMALS.

Provisions as to Vessels carrying Foreign Animals.

40. The provisions of this Article shall apply to all vessels in or on which foreign animals are carried to any port or place in Great Britain.

(Parts of Vessel to be used.)

(i.) Animals shall not be carried on more than three decks.

(ii.) Animals shall not be carried on any hatch above a compartment where other animals are carried.

(iii.) Animals shall not be carried in any part of the vessel, where, in ordinary course of navigation, they would interfere with the proper management or ventilation of the vessel, or with the efficient working of the boats.

(Pens and Fittings of Vessels.)

(iv.) The animals shall be carried in pens.

(v.) No pen shall exceed ten feet in length and nine feet in breadth, and the stanchions of each pen shall be securely fastened to the deck by means of iron sockets or otherwise, and the materials used in the construction of the pens shall be of a substantial character, and of sufficient strength to withstand the action of the weather, and to resist the weight of the animals thrown against them.

(vi.) Ship's fittings likely to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to animals shall be properly and securely fenced off.

(vii.) The floor of each pen shall, in order to prevent slipping, be fitted with suitable battens or other proper footholds which shall be securely fastened to the deck by angle iron plates or otherwise, and shall be strewn with a proper quantity of sand or other suitable substance.

(viii.) Animals while on board a vessel shall be protected against injury or unnecessary suffering from undue exposure to the weather.

(Space for Cattle.)

(ix.) Not more than four cattle shall be carried in one pen, except where small store cattle are carried, in which case not more than five cattle shall be carried in one pen. Sufficient space shall be allotted in every pen to enable the cattle to properly feed and rest during the voyage.

(Passage-Ways.)

(x.) Between every two rows of animals, and in front of every single row of animals, there shall be a passage-way, the minimum width of which in any part of the vessel shall not be less than one foot and six inches free of obstruction.

(Ventilation.)

(xi.) All parts of the vessel on which animals are carried shall be sufficiently and suitably ventilated. All such parts if below deck, shall, in addition to any ventilation obtained by means of the hatchways, be provided with sufficient and suitable ventilators for the removal of foul air and for the admission of a proper supply of fresh air to all the animals carried.

(Light.)

(xii.) Arrangements shall be made for the provision at all times of adequate light for the proper tending of the animals.

(Overcrowding.)

(xiii.) A vessel shall not be overcrowded in any part or pen so as to cause injury or unnecessary suffering to the animals therein.

(Food and Water.)

(xiv.) When animals are carried on a vessel for a voyage which on an average takes more than eighteen hours, they shall be provided while on board with a sufficient amount of food and

water, and proper accommodation shall be provided on board for the stowage of food so that the same shall not be unduly exposed to the weather at sea.

(Securing of Cattle.)

(xv.) All cattle while being carried on a vessel shall be securely tied by the head and so as to stand athwartships.

(Approaches, Gangways, and other Apparatus.)

(xvi.) Approaches, gangways, passage-ways, cages, and other apparatus used for the landing of animals from a vessel shall be so constructed that injury or unnecessary suffering shall not be caused to the animals.

(Attendance.)

(xvii.) A vessel on which animals are carried shall, in addition to the ordinary crew, carry a sufficient number of qualified attendants to properly tend the animals; and every consignment of cattle shall be in charge of a responsible foreman, who shall have under him competent assistants numbering with himself one for every twenty-five head of cattle; and proper and suitable accommodation for all these persons shall be provided.

(Injured Animals.)

(xviii.) If any animal has a limb broken or is otherwise seriously injured during the voyage, the master of the vessel shall forthwith cause that animal to be slaughtered unless he is satisfied that it can be kept alive and led away without cruelty.

(Shorn Sheep.)

(xix.) Between each first day of November and the next following thirtieth day of April (both days inclusive), shorn sheep shall not be carried on deck, except where they were last shorn more than sixty days before being so carried.

Detention.

41. Foreign animals landed from a vessel shall, on a certificate of an Inspector of the Board, certifying to the effect that the provisions of this Chapter, or any of them, have not been observed in the vessel, be detained, at the place of landing, or in lairs adjacent thereto, until the Board otherwise direct

Slaughter of Injured Animals when landed.

42. Where any maimed or injured foreign animal is landed from a vessel the owner, consignee, or other person in charge thereof shall, if directed by an Inspector of the Board, or may, if he thinks fit, slaughter that animal; but the carcase of such animal shall not be removed from the place of landing or some lair or slaughter-house adjacent thereto approved by the Board without a certificate of the Inspector of the Board certifying that it is not likely to introduce disease.

Carcases of Animals Dying on Voyage.

43.—(1.) If a vessel arriving has on board the carcase of a foreign animal, horse, ass, or mule which was taken on board for the purpose of importation, but has died on the voyage, the master of the vessel shall, immediately on arrival, report the fact to the Principal Officer of Customs at the port.

(2.) The carcase shall not be landed or discharged from the vessel without the permission in writing of the Principal Officer.

CHAPTER 10.—MISCELLANEOUS.

Power to exclude Strangers.

44.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf or of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of

a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals, is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice forbidding persons to enter therein without the permission mentioned in the notice; and thereupon any person, not having by law a right of entry or way into, on, or over that Wharf, Station, or Landing-Place, entering or going into, on, or over the same without that permission shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf or of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals, is hereby empowered to direct any person to quit that Wharf, Station, or Landing-Place, or any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion thereof; and thereupon any person, not having by law a right to remain in or on that Wharf, Station, or Landing-Place, or in or on that particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion thereof, failing to quit on direction as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Disinfection of Persons and Clothes.

45.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Wharf or of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals, is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before entering that Wharf or Station or Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes, and thereupon every person shall on being requested comply with the terms of that notice.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or the Superintendent of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals, is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before leaving that Station or Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes, and thereupon all such persons shall on being requested comply with the terms of that notice.

(3.) An Inspector of the Board is hereby empowered to affix a notice at or near the entrance of any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place for Foreign Animals to the effect that persons before leaving that particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion of the Station or Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes, and thereupon all such persons shall on being requested comply with the terms of that notice.

(4.) Any person failing on request as aforesaid to comply with the terms of any such notice shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

General Power of Detention.

46. If it appears to the Principal Officer of Customs with respect to any foreign animal, horse, ass, or mule, or with respect to any carcase, fodder, litter, dung, or other thing, brought by sea, that disease may be thereby introduced, he may seize and detain the same; and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Customs, who may give such directions as they think fit, either for the slaughter or destruction or the further detention thereof or for the restoration thereof to the owner on such conditions, if any, (including payment by the owner of expenses incurred by them in respect of detention thereof,) as they think fit.

Duties of Local Authority and Police.

47. When any provision or regulation relating to foreign animals is in operation, the Local Authority and all constables and police officers shall assist the Inspector of the Board to carry the same into effect and to enforce the same, and shall do or cause to be done all things necessary for the effectual execution of the same.

Offences.

48.—(1.) If the slaughter of animals is not commenced at the time directed by the Board under this Order, or completed in accordance with the provisions of this Order, the person failing to cause such slaughter to be so commenced or completed shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any dung of animals, or any fodder, litter, fittings, pens, hurdles, utensils, or other thing is landed or removed in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing or other place where or from which such dung or other thing is landed or removed, and also in the case of the landing thereof, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which the same is landed, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person fails to carry out or observe any direction as regards cleansing or disinfection, which he is by this Order required to carry out or observe, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If anything is done or omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in or in respect of which,—and the owner of the gangway or passage-way, cage, or other apparatus in respect of which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the Foreign Animals Wharf or Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or Landing-Place for Foreign Animals in which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any other place or thing in respect of which,—(as the case may be,) the same is done or omitted, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If an animal or a carcase, or any manure is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal or of the carcase or of the manure, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal or carcase or manure, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(6.) If anything is done or omitted to be done with respect to any vessel or any animals thereon in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which the same is done or omitted to be done, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Revocation of Orders.

49. The Orders described in the Fourth Schedule to this Order are hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked; but this revocation shall not—

- (a.) revive any Order or part of any Order revoked by or otherwise affect the past operation of either of those Orders ;
- (b.) affect the validity or invalidity of anything done or suffered, or any licence or authority granted, or any right, title, obligation, or liability accrued thereunder, before the commencement of this Order ;
- (c.) interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against or the recovery or imposition of any penalty or forfeiture or punishment incurred under either of the Orders hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

Interpretation.

50. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires,—

- “The Board” means the Board of Agriculture ;
- “The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 ;
- “Cattle” means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves ;
- “Animals” means cattle, sheep, and goats, and all other ruminating animals, and swine ;
- “Foreign,” applied to animals, horses, asses, mules, and things, means brought to the United Kingdom from any country out of the United Kingdom ;
- “Landing-Place for Foreign Animals” means a part of a port approved of or defined by Special Order of the Board for the landing of foreign animals not subject to slaughter or quarantine ;
- “Foreign Animals Wharf” means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Board for the landing of foreign animals subject to slaughter at the port of landing ;
- “Superintendent” includes a foreman or wharfinger or other person at the time being in charge of a Foreign Animals Wharf ;
- “Reception-lair” means a lair or other proper place adjacent or near to the landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf where animals are landed, and set apart for the reception of animals immediately after landing ;
- “Lairage-men” means men specially appointed by the occupiers of a Foreign Animals Wharf for the purpose of landing animals at such Wharf and feeding and watering and tending them in a reception-lair ;
- “Disease” means cattle-plague (that is to say, rinderpest, or the disease commonly called cattle-plague), contagious pleuro-pneumonia of cattle (in this Order called pleuro-pneumonia), foot-and-mouth disease, sheep-pox, sheep-scab, or swine-fever (that is to say, the disease known as typhoid fever of swine, soldier, purple, red disease, hog cholera, or swine-plague) ;
- “Diseased” or “Suspected” means affected with disease or suspected of being diseased ;
- “Carcase” means the carcase of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, and part of a carcase, and the meat, flesh, bones, hide, skin, hoofs, horns, offal, or other part of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof ;
- “Fodder” means hay or other substance commonly used for food of animals ;
- “Litter” means straw or other substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals ;
- “Master” includes a person having the charge or command of a vessel ;
- Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Extent.

51. This Order does not extend to Ireland.

Commencement.

52. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

Short Title.

53. This Order may be cited as THE FOREIGN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1895.

THE THIRD SCHEDULE.

Rules for Foreign Animals Wharf on Detection of Disease.

[Articles 6 and 7.]

PART I.

(Rule A.—Cattle-Plague.)

(i.) If the disease is cattle-plague, the Inspector of the Board shall forthwith affix a notice at or near the entrance of the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign

Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to the effect that cattle-plague exists therein and forbidding persons to enter therein without his permission.

(ii.) The Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Board.

(iii.) The Inspector of the Board is hereby empowered to require and shall require every person being or having been in such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, with the diseased animals or who has in any way come in contact or been with such animals to take such means for preventing the spreading of cattle-plague, before leaving such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf, or before leaving the Foreign Animals Wharf, as the case may be, by washing and disinfecting themselves and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Board shall direct.

(Rule B.—Pleuro-Pneumonia.)

If the disease is pleuro-pneumonia, the Inspector of the Board shall cause the diseased cattle and all cattle that are then within the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to be dealt with as follows :

(a.) The diseased cattle shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(b.) The cattle not diseased may with the permission of the Inspector of the Board be taken charge of by the owners or consignees, or by their drovers or servants, and those cattle may be moved into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of such Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Board direct or permit.

(Rule C.—Foot-and-Mouth Disease.)

(i.) If the disease is foot-and-mouth disease, the Inspector of the Board shall forthwith affix a notice at or near the entrance of the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to the effect that foot-and-mouth disease exists therein and forbidding persons to enter therein without his permission.

(ii.) The Inspector of the Board shall detain all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Board.

(iii.) The Inspector of the Board is hereby empowered to require and shall require every person being or having been in such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, with the diseased animals or who has in any way come in contact or been with such animals to take such means for preventing the spreading of foot-and-mouth disease, before leaving the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf, or before leaving the Foreign Animals Wharf, as the case may be, by washing and disinfecting themselves and their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Board shall direct.

(iv.) The occupiers of the Foreign Animals Wharf shall provide proper and suitable suits of overall clothes for the use of the lairage-men and other persons entering such reception-lair, or

building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf. Such overall clothes are to be put on upon entering, taken off on leaving, and left in, the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall from time to time be properly disinfected with a solution of carbolic acid as directed by the Inspector of the Board.

(v.) The Inspector of the Board shall cause all the animals that are then within the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, to be forthwith slaughtered.

(Rule D.—Sheep-Pox.)

(i.) If the disease is sheep-pox, the Inspector of the Board shall forthwith affix a notice at or near the entrance of the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to the effect that sheep-pox exists therein and forbidding persons to enter therein without his permission.

(ii.) The Inspector of the Board shall detain all the sheep that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Board.

(iii.) The Inspector of the Board is hereby empowered to require and shall require every person being or having been in such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, with the diseased sheep, or who has in any way come in contact or been with such sheep to take such means for preventing the spreading of sheep-pox, before leaving the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf, or before leaving the Foreign Animals Wharf, as the case may be, by washing and disinfecting themselves and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise as the Inspector of the Board shall direct.

(Rule E.—Sheep-Scab.)

If the disease is sheep-scab, the Inspector of the Board shall cause the diseased sheep and all sheep then in the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, to which this Rule applies, to be dealt with as follows :

(a.) The diseased sheep shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(b.) The sheep not diseased may with the permission of the Inspector of the Board be taken charge of by the owner or consignees, or by their drovers or servants, and those sheep may be moved into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of such Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Board direct or permit.

(Rule F.—Swine-Fever.)

If the disease is swine-fever, the Inspector of the Board shall cause all the swine then in the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to be forthwith slaughtered.

PART II.

(Rule G.—Cattle-Plague and Pleuro-Pneumonia or Foot-and-Mouth Disease or Sheep-Pox or Sheep-Scab or Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are cattle-plague and any one or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) pleuro-pneumonia, (b) foot-and-mouth disease, (c) sheep-pox, (d) sheep-scab, and (e) swine-fever, the provisions of Rule A of Part I of this

Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and to all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf.

(Rule H.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Pox.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-pox, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the cattle being dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule J.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Scab.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-scab, the cattle shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the sheep shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule E, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule K.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and swine-fever, the cattle shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the swine shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule L.—Foot-and-Mouth Disease and Pleuro-Pneumonia or Sheep-Pox or Sheep-Scab or Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are foot-and-mouth disease and any one or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) pleuro-pneumonia, (b) sheep-pox, (c) sheep-scab, and (d) swine-fever, the provisions of Rule C of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and to all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf.

(Rule M.—Sheep-Pox and Sheep-Scab.)

If the diseases are sheep-pox and sheep-scab, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with that Rule.

(Rule N.—Sheep-Pox and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are sheep-pox and swine-fever, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this

Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, and the swine being dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule O.—Sheep-Scab and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are sheep-scab and swine-fever, the sheep shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule E, and the swine shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule P.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Pox and Sheep-Scab.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-pox and sheep-scab, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the cattle being dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule Q.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Pox and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-pox and swine-fever, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the cattle being dealt with in accordance with Rule B, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, and the swine being dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule R.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Scab and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-scab and swine-fever, the cattle shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule B, the sheep shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule E, and the swine shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule S.—Sheep-Pox and Sheep-Scab and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are sheep-pox and sheep-scab and swine-fever, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, and the swine being dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

THE Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice, that the following Regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

Uniform System of Buoyage.

THE Netherlands Government has given notice, dated 12th February, 1895, that the following uniform system of buoyage has been adopted, and will be carried out, in the fairways of the Netherlands East Indies:—

1. The term starboard hand means that side which would be on the right hand going with the main stream of flood, or in entering a harbour, river, or estuary, from seaward; the term port hand means the left hand side, under the same circumstances.

2. Conical (nun) buoys are starboard hand buoys as thus defined, and are painted red.

3. Can (truncated) buoys are port hand buoys as thus defined, and are painted black.

4. Spherical buoys mark the ends of middle grounds, and are painted black and red in horizontal stripes. These buoys are always surmounted by top marks, other buoys only in special cases.

5. Buoys lying outside, and marking the approach to, seaward channels are of a special shape, and are painted red and black in vertical stripes.

6. The buoys marking the outer shoals remain as at present.

7. Wrecks are marked by conical or can buoys, painted green, according as the wreck lies on the starboard or port side of the fairway. Should the wreck be in mid-channel, it will be marked by a can buoy on one side, and a conical buoy on the other side, which buoys are to be treated as port or starboard hand buoys according to shape.

8. The top marks are as follows:—

A diamond marks the outer or seaward side of a bank.

A cone marks the inner side of a bank.

A ball marks the starboard side of the fairway.

A truncated cone marks the port side of the fairway.

A cross is used as a special mark, and surmounting a spherical buoy indicates that the buoy may be passed on either side.

The ball and truncated cone are also used as top marks for beacons.

The top marks are of the same colour as the buoys or beacons on which they are placed.

9. The buoys of sea channels will be numbered consecutively (beginning from seaward), and marked by the first letter of the name of the channel. The numbers and letters will be white.

This Uniform System of Buoyage will gradually be adopted, as regards the shape of the buoys and top marks, whilst the alteration in colour will only be made when all else has been changed in accordance with the new system. For this reason, it is necessary during the period of transition, that attention should be exclusively given to the

colour (as has hitherto been the case), and not to the shape of the buoys; the existing colours, black and white, remaining temporarily unaltered. During March, 1895, the above Uniform System, so far as relates to shape and top marks, will be carried out in the East and West Gats of Surabaya Strait, the outer buoys of those Gats temporarily remaining as at present.

(Alteration of Tramway in part of Trafalgar Road Greenwich about to be widened; Conversion of Single Line of Tramway into Double Line.)

East London Tramway Company (Limited) to reconstruct or relay the existing Tramway in the said portion of roadway as a double line throughout instead of a single line and in the centre of the widened roadway (or in such other situation as may be agreed between the Council the Company and the Board of Works for the Greenwich District). Tramway Bye-laws and Regulations.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor, or other duly authorized officer of the Lessees, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any), when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorized servant of the Lessees, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket, or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

11. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

12.
