Rome, April 28.

The several Factions in the Conclave cannot yet unite in the Choice of a new Pope; Those that appear for *Altieri* and *Barberigo* are the most considerable, and neither of them will give way to the other; The *Italians* made another attempt on the 23d part in favour of the latter, but without success, and were even opposed by the Spanish Cardinals; Since that 'tis said, *Barberigo* has desired his Friends to lose no more time in endeavouring his Promotion; And *Conti*, *Marsicotti*, *Acciajoli*, and *Pignatelli*, are again much spoken of. This week died here Cardinal *Capraccchi*, in the 76th year of his Age.

*Leghorn*, May 1. The *Swallow* Frigate is arrived here in 5 days from *Cagliari* in *Sardinia*, where she left the English and Dutch Convoy, with the *Turkey* Ships that fled from hence, on the 8th part, having been joynd before they put in there by the English and Dutch Men of War under the command of Captain *Aylmer*, who has obtained the Peace with the Government of *Argiers*, and has sent one of the Ships of his Squadron to do the like at *Tripoli*.

*Nice*, May 4. The last advices from *Corfu* say, that the Captain-General was on his departure from thence with the Fleet of this State for the *Levant*. They write from *Florence*, that all things are finally Adjusted concerning the Marriage of the Elector Palatine with the Princess of *Tulany*, and that the Ceremony thereof will be performed on Sunday next.

*Viana*, May 6. The Imperial Troops continue their march towards *Hungary*; and Prince *Louis* is expected here in few days; the Emperor having made him Lieutenant-General of his Forces to be employed against the *Turks*. The Letters from *Constantinople* of a fresh date give an account, of the great Familiarity between the Grand *Vizier* and the French Ambassador; and confirm what we heard some time ago, of the Jealousies and Differences between the *Turks* and the *Tartars*; The same Letters add, that *Teckeley* is in some disgrace with the Grand *Vizier*, but supported by the French Ambassador.

*Hildberg*, May 12. The Imperial Troops that have had their Winter Quarters in the *Black Forest* and in *Francia*, are in motion; Part of them take their march towards *Eppingen*, not far from *Hailbron*, to joyn the Saxon and other Confederate Forces, and the rest go to *Effenzen* on the Frontiers of *Susabia*, whither 10 or 12000 *Bavarians* are likewise marching.

*Strasbourg*, May 13. The Forces of *Saxony* are actually on their march towards the *Rhine*, and are expected at *Hailbron* about the 20th of this month. The Great Master of the *Teutonic* Order is arrived here from *Mentz*.

*Paris*, May 11. The Duke of *Luxemburg* is not yet gone for *Flanders*, having put off his Journey till Monday next; about which time the Duke of *Chartres*, the Duke of *Bourbon*, the Prince de *Conti*, and the Chevalier de *Beaufort*, will likewise part from hence, some for *Germany*, and others for *Flanders*. And 'tis said, the Dauphin will set out on the 20th to command the French Army on the *Rhine*. They write from *Saxony*, that Monsieur *Catin* was come to *Susa*, and was drawing his Troops together near that place, but that the want of Provisions, and other Necessaries for the Army, did hinder him from executing the Campaigne so soon as was intended. We hear from *Rouen*, that a French Man of War, called the *Revenez*, being a new Ship of 62 Guns, was lately lost in the River of *Charente*, and that they were endeavouring to recover her Guns.

*Brussels*, May 16. Prince *Waldick* arrived here yesterday, and went presently after to Court, where he had a Conference with our Governor-General, and the Prince de *Conti*, concerning the Preparations for the Campaigne, and the march of the Forces, which are advancing towards the Peace of their Rendezvous; And this morning Prince *Waldick* returned to his Head Quarter at *Duffel*.

and the Prince de *Vaudemont* is gone to wait upon His Majesty of *Great Britain* at the *Hague*. The French are forming a Camp between *Courtray* and *Veuzeliam*, and 'tis said, the Duke of *Luxemburg* is expected there in few days.

*Hague*, May 18. The States-General, and those of this Province, have by their Deputies Congratulated His Majesty upon his late Arrival here. The Prince de *Vaudemont* came hither on the 16th from *Flanders*. His Majesty went this morning for *Loos*, where he intends to stay 2 or 4 days, and to go from thence directly to *Flanders* to Head the Confederate Army. The Prince de *Vaudemont* is returned thither. We hear from *Helvoet sluyts*, that 8 Dutch Men of War, fitted out by the Admiralty of *Rotterdam*, lye ready there to sail for *England* with the first fair Wind.

*Dublin*, May 7. We have an account, of a very considerable Action that was performed on the 5th instant by a small Party of our Troops near *Mountmellick*; On the 4th, at 9 at night, Major *Wood* marched from *Mountmellick* to *Castle-Cuff* with 300 Foot, being Detachements of Colonel *Lloyd's* and the Lord *George Hamilton's* Regiments, and 50 Horse of Colonel *Byerby's*; He divided the Foot into several Parties, in order to surprize the Rapperies in the Woods and Bogs, and kept with the Horse along the Skirts of the Bog, to hinder their Escape; by which means they killed 70 of the Rapperies; and took some of their Cattel; Major *Wood* advanced with 30 Foot and 34 Horse beyond the *Tigher* of *Millymore*, and from thence sent the Cattel homeward under a Guard of 30 men, and was returning with the said Horse and Foot, it being then about 10 in the morning, when he discovered two Bodies of Men of the late King *James's* Army, computed about 400 each, marching silently between the Wood and the Mountains, but so soon as they perceived that we espied them they beat their Drums; upon which the Major drew up the Horse and Foot in a plow'd Field, and faced them. The Enemies Grenadiers came over the Hedge towards us, but seeing us stand firm they advanced no farther, their first Body all the while marching through the Wood; The Major apprehending that the 30 men, who guarded the Booty, were not yet got clear of the Wood, and might there be exposed to the Enemies numbers, wheeled off by the Skirt of the Wood, to succor them, and having got the Horse and Foot over the Bog, he heard them fire very fast on the said 30 men, who bravely opposed them under the command of Lieutenant *Ellis*. This firing brought in 20 of our men more, who had been laid to watch the Rapperies. Major *Wood* thereupon ordered the Foot to march in two Parties on each side the River, and he with the Horse marched between them both; Being come in sight of the Enemy, and thinking the Horse might do most service in taking a compass about and falling upon the Enemies Rear, he galloped round with intention to come behind them; The Enemy perceiving this, and being at the same time pressed very hard by the Foot, began to make an orderly Retreat, which Major *Wood* seeing, fell immediately on their Flank with the Horse, wheeling them into great disorder, and soon after to a perfect flight. The Horse and Foot pursued them through the Wood down to the Bog, and killed

led above 150 of the Enemy, among whom was Captain Chales, and 2 Lieutenants; and took Prisoners, Major John Fitzpatrick who commanded them, and 5 Captains, 9 Lieutenants, and 2 Ensigns, (belonging to the several Regiments of Colonel Butler of Ballyraggatts, Colonel Robert Grace, Colonel Charles Moore, Sir Maurice Eustace, and Colonel Simon Luttrell's Dragoons,) and 105 Private Soldiers, among which were 6 Sergeants, 17 Corporals, an Adjutant, a Chirurgion, and 3 Drums; we took likewise above 150 Musquets. And all this was done by 110 of our Foot, and 34 Horse. With the Foot were Major Rider, Captain Nenny, Captain Dixy, Lieutenant Barton, and Ensign Russel; With the Horse, Cornet Jossin, Cornet Haslington, Adjutant Robinson, Quarter-master Davis, and Quarter-master Cadford, who all, both Horse and Foot, behaved themselves extremely well, and with the loss only of one Corporal killed, and Adjutant Robinson, with 2 Foot Soldiers, and one Trooper, wounded.

From Corke we have these farther Particulars, of the Recounter between a Party of our Men and the Enemy near Balinagooly. On the 29th past, a Detachment of 110 Foot, commanded by Captain Clayton, was sent from Corke to relieve our Garrison at Balinagooly; in their march they espied a great Party of the Rebels Horse, which our Men, being all Foot, did not think fit to attack, nor did the Enemy give them any disturbance. In the Evening they arrived at Balinagooly, and about 12 at night those that were relieved marched out, commanded by Captain Thornecroft and Lieutenant Hayes; At break of day they discovered above 300 of the Rebels Horse and Dragoons, besides a great number of Rapperies who had waylaid them, and thereupon for their better defence drew into an old Pound, having a Wall about it breast high; The Rebels advanced Party coming up, offered them Quarter, which our Men answered with a Volley of Shot; By this time the rest of the Enemies Troops advanced and made several attacks, which our Men sustained for about 3 hours, during which time they killed and wounded divers, which their Party carried off, and at last the Rebels, who were commanded by Brigadier Carrol and Sir James O'Ser, being discouraged with the loss they had sustained, drew off and marched away, leaving behind them 3 Captains and 10 Men slain, and Major Slingsby desperately wounded, which they thought were too near our Shot to be carried off; Their whole loss is computed at between 40 and 50 killed and wounded, and on our side we lost 10 Men, and 5 wounded. Major Slingsby was brought a Prisoner to Corke.

From Mullingar they tell us, that the Earl of Meath's and the Lord Lisburne's Regiments arrived there the 27th past, and encamped without the Town. That the same day one Walter Browne, formerly High-Constable of the Barony of Delwin, was hanged there for a Spy; That on the 28th, Colonel Brewer Governor of that place, and Lieutenant Colonel Hamilton, with 600 Foot and 20 Horse, marched into the Enemies Quarters beyond the Cattle of Downe, between which place and Kilbeggan about 2000 of the Rapperies had for some time sheltered themselves in Huts; The Rebels at first drew up on the Hills in several Bodies of Horse and Foot, but upon our approach retired to the Bogs and Woods; Our Men pursued them, killed about 50, and burnt a great many of their Huts and Cattle, and on the 29th returned to their Quarters; And about the same time came thither 14 Deserters from the Irish Army, as several others do daily.

From Birr we hear, that Captain Pallasor, upon some information that was given him of the Rapperies, went out about the 24th of the last month with 40 Fire-locks of the Army and 20 of the Militia, but by the Treachery of one Terence Magrath, was drawn into an Ambush of two of the Enemies Regiments of Foot and some Horse; Our Men got into the Ruins of an old Castle, and defended themselves till their Ammunition was spent, and then were forced to take Quarter, and were carried Prisoners to Nazagh.

On the 27th of the last month 530 Men of the Militia of the City and County of Dublin marched from hence to the Town of Kildare, where they joined the Regiment of Horse commanded by Colonel Piper, and we hear since of their having done very good Service in clearing the County of the Rapperies. This day arrived here the Ships with the Artillery and Ordnance Stores from England.

Edinburgh, May 5. Their Majesties Privy-Council have emitted two Proclamations, one for Adjourning the Parliament of this Kingdom to the 16th of September next; and the other, forbidding all Persons to go out of this Kingdom without a Pass from a Privy-Councillor if within 50 miles where the Persons reside, and if not, from two

of the Commissioners of Supply (qualified by Law) that shall come into this Kingdom, at their Entry, to present themselves with Passes, or give a Rational Account of themselves and their business, and whence they came, upon Oath, in case of Suspicion, to the next County Justice of Peace, Magistrate, or Officer of the Army; and that such as fail therein, shall be Apprehended and imprisoned; And forbidding all Skippers to Transport any Passengers to or from Scotland without Passes, and requiring them to give in Lists upon Oath of the said Passengers before they go to Sea, or suffer any to go aboard.

Deal, May 12. On the 10th instant arrived in the Downs 4 Dutch Men of War, who are gone to the Fleet; With these, 23 Capital Dutch Ships have arrived, and 8 more are hourly expected, which we understand by a Vessel that came from the Maese on Thursday last, lay then at Helvoetsluys with their Topmasts loose, ready to sail. Sir Ralph Delaval came with his Squadron to the Downs the 10th in the Evening, and yesterday Captain Churchill set sail with a Squadron of 11 his Majesty's Ships under his command for the Coast of France. Sir Ralph Delaval being gone to his Station in Their Majesties Fleet.

Whitehall, May 7. This day the Right Honourable John Earl of Bridgewater was Sworn one of Their Majesties most Honourable Privy-Council, and accordingly took his Place at the Board.
