Diojd's and the Lord George Hamilton's Regiments, and 50 Horse of Colonel Byerle's; He divided the Foot into several Parties, in order to surprise the Rapperies in the Woods and Bogs, and kept with the Horse along the Skirts of the Bog, to hinder their Escape; by which means they killed 70 of the Rapperies, and took some of their Cattel; Major Worl advanbed with 30 Foot and 34 Horse beyond the Tigher of Milybone, and from thence sent the Cattel nomeward under a Guard or 30 men, and we returning with the faid Horse and Foot, it being then about to in the morning, when he discovered two Bodies of Men of the line Hing James's Army, computed a-boit 400 cach, marching filently between the Wood and the Mountains, but fo foon as they perceived that we espied them they beat their Drums; upon which the Major drew up the Horse and Foot in a plow'd Field, and faced them: The Enemies Granadiers came over the Hedge towards us, but feeing as frand firm they advanced no farther, their first Body all the while marching through the Wood; The Major apprehending that the 30 men, who guarded the Booty, were not yet got clear of the Wood, and might there be exposed to the Enemies numbers, wheeled off by the Skirt of the Wood to succor them, and having got the Horse and Foot over the Bog, he heard them fire very falt on the laid 30 men, who bravely opposed them under the command of Lieutenant Elin.
