Cadiz, April 23.

Vice-Admiral *Papachino*, with 4 Men of War, a Pink, and a Fireship, will sail from hence this week; They take on Board here about 600 new-raised Men, and at *Malaga* two Regiments of Foot, consisting both of about 2000, which they are to carry to *Catalonia* for the Service of that Country. 'Tis said, that our Fleet for *New-Spain* will not go out till *January* next.

Madrid, May 2. The Council of State is very frequently assembled about sending of Supplies to *Flanders*, *Milan*, and *Catalonia*. The Count *de Palma* is made General of the Horse in *Catalonia*, where our Army will take the Field about the middle of this month, composed of 14 or 15000 men. The Count *de Charai* has received his Commission to be Governor and General of *Oran*, and the Coast of *Africa*. The Galeons are shortly expected at *Cadiz*.

Venice, May 12. The Senate have made choice of Signior *Gio Pezaro*, at present their Ambassador in *Spain*, to succeed Signior *Federico Venier* in the same Quality at the Court of *France*. By the last Letters from *Corfou* we have an account, that Signior *Delfino*, Captain-Extraordinary of the Ships, was sailed from thence with the Squadron under his command to cruize in the *Archipelago*; that Signior *Capello* was gone with another Squadron towards *Sapienza*; That 3 or 4 Ships were appointed to have their Station off of *Saffeno*, for the greater security of the Convoys that are sent from hence to the *Levant*; and that the Captain-General intended to sail on the 18th of the last month with the Gallies, and the rest of the Men of War, for *Napoli di Romania*. The freshest advices from *Constantinople* say, that the Grand Visier does wholly apply himself to the carrying on the Preparations for the War; That he intended to go himself again into the Field; And had confirmed *Mexomorto* in the Command of the Fleet, which was designed to set sail on *St. George's* day. And that the *Ottoman* Troops, that are to be employed against the *Morea*, had their Rendezvous near *Thebes*.

Warsaw, May 2. The Forces of this Crown are ordered to be at the General Rendezvous near *Jaslowitz* by the first of the next month; they will make 24000 men, besides those of *Lithuania*, which may be about 10000 more. The King commands them in Person, and the general discourse is, that he will march directly into *Moldavia*. They write from *Moscovy*, that the Czars had rejected all the offers made by the Turkish and French Envoys, and were resolved to prosecute the War with all their Forces, which, to that end, were ordered to march towards the Frontiers of *Tartary*.

Vienna, May 17. Prince *Louis* of *Baden* is expected here from *Bohemia* on Saturday next, and after a short stay at this Court to assist at the Consultations, to be held about the designs of the Campaign, will set out for *Hungary* to command the Imperial Army, which is to Rendezvous near *Pest*. On the 15th instant arrived here an Officer from *Esseck* with an account, that Count *Guilo* of *Scaremberg* was come thither to command the Camp that is forming on the *Drave*. That they continued to work with all possible diligence on the Fortifications of that place, and had fortified a little Island in the *Danube*, not far from it, thereby to secure the passage of the River. We have advice of the arrival of Sir *William Hufsey*, the English Ambassador, at *Mohatz*, and that he had sent to the Bassa of *Illocke* to give him notice of it, who in answer thereunto had let him know, That he would be ready to receive him, and to conduct him to *Belgrade* with all the Honour and Respect due to his Character.

Corke, May 16. On the 11th instant 150 of the Irish Army, came to *Castle Lions*, and took some Cattle from thence. Colonel *Dovep* was there with about 20 *Danes*, and 20 of the Militia Dragoons, who pursued the Enemy; a Lieutenant of the *Danes*, with 8 Danish Horse and 6 Dragoons, overtook them at *Ballyderravune*, and beat off 60 of the Rebels who had lined the Hedges there, in which Action the Lieutenant was killed. The Colonel came up with the rest of his Party, and made the Rebels run, and being reinforced with 50 men out of Colonel *Boyles*, Colonel *St. Legers*, and Captain *Barry's* Militia Troops which were posted at *Fermoy*, they continued the pursuit of them a mile and a half beyond *Kilworth*, killed above 50, whereof two were Commissioned Officers, took 40 Horses, with several Silver-hilted Swords, Cloaks, Arms, and other Accoutrements, recovered the Booty, and took about 30 Cows besides.

Kinsale, May 16. Yesterday arrived here Their Majesties Ships the *Dragon*, and the *Adwicz*, from cruizing to the Westward, and brought in with them a small Privateer, called the *Swallow*, Richard Gerard
