THE Queen has been pleased to approve of Mr. Bruno von Schuckmann as Consul-General of Germany at Capetown; of Mr. Aurelio Bascuñan Montes as Consul-General of Chile in Great Britain; of Mr. Algérinos M. Averof as Consul of Greece at Edinburgh; of Mr. Nicolás Veloz-Goiticoa as Consul of Venezuela at Liverpool; of Mr. W. J. Gillam as Consul of Hawaii at Newcastle, New South Wales; and of Mr. Angel José Cabrejo, Mr. Hilarion Gonzalez del Castillo, and Mr. Luis Villar y Peralta, as Vice-Consul of Spain, respectively, at Montreal, Hong Kong, and Singapore.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 24th October, 1895, from Her Majesty's Consul at Trieste, enclosing the following translation of a Quarantine Notice issued by the Marine Board:—

British Consulate, Trieste.

Circular, No. 10282, of the Imperial Royal Marine Board to all the Imperial Royal Offices, and subordinate Port and Sanitary Officers.

By order of the High Imperial Royal Minister for Commerce, and issued by telegram No. 61943, of October the 22nd. Arrivals by sea from Egypt will be treated according to the rules of the International Sanitary Convention of Dresden.

In consequence thereof, with respect to the above said arrivals, those rules will be enforced referring to vessels in cases of cholera, as issued in the Circular of August 5, 1893, No. 7700.
