

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 26th OCTOBER 1895.)

(SWINE-FEVER INFECTED PLACE.)

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),—the Corporation Cattle Market in the borough of Canterbury,—which was declared by Order of the Board dated the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five to be a Place infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the thirtieth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.
