Pendennis, June 1.

Everal flips a e lately put in here, outwards bound ; four or hve French flips from Diepe, bound for St. Maloes, were forced in by contrary winds, which till detains them, they have flill lome apprehentions of the Oftenders, who have not yet quitted the feas.

Lyn. Fane 3. Yesterday arrived here a small Hoy, belonging to this place from Amfierdam, passing through the Texel on Sunday morning last, he left there a squadron of 23 fail of men of War, belonging to the States, which lay there in teadines to put to sea upon the first Orders.

Hull, June 3. This laft week failed from hence, two fhips laden with Lead and Butter, bound for Rouen; one vetlel of this place and a Swedish ship with Cloth and Malt for Gettenburgh, one for Hamborough, and two for Rotterdam laden likewife with the Commodities of these parts.

laden likewife with the Commodities of thefe parts. Here are arrived in this place, three fhips f om Norway laden with Raffe, one from Rotterdam with Rhenifh Wines, another from Gottenbourgh with Pitch, Tar, and fuch like lading, and three fhips from France. From Brid-Lington we are informed of 100 fail of laden Colliers which have within two days paft by that place, bending their courfe to the Southwards.

Gadis, May 20. About four days fince arrived here the Anse ope Fregate in nine dayes from the Downs, and is fince departed for Tangier, from whence we are informed of the arrival there of Sit William Jennings with three English Fregates f om Algier. That Gayland is much frained in Arzila by Tafeleta's forces, and the Moors which are with himin the Town are ful of differents; which 'is believed will oblige him to feek fome other place of refuge.

Midril, Miy 27. The Marquifs de Liches, Eldeft Son to Don Louis de Harosis now returned from Portugal, and immediately upon h sarriva attended their Majesties, to give an account of the affairs of that Kingdome.

The 11th instant died the Bishop of *Placencia*, some time fince honoured with the Charge of President of *Castille*, which is not as yet disposed of, though several of the Grands of *Spain* are in competition for it.

Since the death of Don Louis Ponsde Leon, the Marquifs de Salines, who supplied his place in commanding the Spanish Guards du ing his absence, is by the Queen preferred to that Charge in his own name.

From Gallicia we a e told, that Don Juan had embarked and fent away a great part o his forces for Flanders, and in tended in few days to follow them. Upon the conclusion of the peace with France, 'tis believed, this Court may be induced to employ the Gallies belonging to sisily and Naples in the fervice of the Venetians.

From Barcellona we are told that Monleg-ior Borrouteo, Pa riarch of Alexandria, defigned hither as Nuncio from his Holineis in the place of the Cardinal Visconti, who may suddenly return, has lately touched at that Port in a Gs ley beto using to the Republick of Genaua, and after two dayes fixy put out again to sea, intending to land at Deniz or Alecant.

Legorn, May 29 The Fame lately arriving at this Port, in 24 days from Algier, informs us that Sir William Jenings with the Saphire, Mary-Rofe and Mermaid, having put in there, was very sivilly Treated by the Governour and Maziftrates of that place, all f them expressing their hearty r. Solution to preferve the peace formerly made with his Majesty of Great Britain: during their abode there, was brought in a Pink of Sixty Tuns, taken off the South Cape, and brought in by two Saytia's of that Port, defirted by all her men, which the Conful fulp Ating to be an English veffel, the English Captains had free liberty given them, to examine, and upon strict enquiry, the was by fome Letters aboard her, found to have been the *Two Brothers* of *Plymouth*, whole men left her, upon the approach of these Saytia's, failfly furmiled to have belonged to *Sally*; but Order is now taken to prevent the fale of the ship, and to facure her with her Cargo for the Owners. The three Fregats have feeled a right understanding allo between that place and *Tangier*, and are since put to lea, and returned for *Cadis*.

Here is also arrived, the Owen and David from England, Cadis and Alecant, well laden with Lead and woollen Manufactures, having also aboard her above 70000 Do lars in Money.

Genous, May. 30. The French Fleer, confifting of 12 men of War, as many Gallies, two Firefhips, three or four Barques, and a large vefiel with Provisions, on the 27th inftant passed by this Port to the Eastwards, and have been every day fince discovered neer us. The Gallies are now four to be put in at Porto Vino, and the men of War to be failed towards Legorn, where they expect to receive faither Orders. Two of the Gallies came up within a mile of this City, where they put their Conful on shoar, but faluted not the Town in passing, nor was any Present sent to their General, as has been formerly practifed.

Even now, three French thips appear off this Porty-but with what intentions they know not. From Turin they tell us, that fince the conclution of the Peace between the two Crowns of France and Spain, the Marquis de Piene, Governour of Pign rolle, is upon his return to Paris, having in order thereunto, taken his leave of the Duke of Savoye, and his Court; and by Order from His Molt Christian Majefty, left the Command of the Garrifon to the Care of Monfeur de Bertoniere.

The Deputies from the City of Geneva, have not as yet had any Aulience from the Dake of Savbye, and confequently, the fettlement and composite of the diff.rences between them, is of Late but little advanced.

From Milan we are told, that their Governour is now as much as f tmerly careful to promore the fervice and a trereft of the King his Mafter, by fetting the Government in fuch a pofture, as may fecure it against all attempts ; particularly, taking care of the fortifications of Missa adris, and fuch other places as lay most exposed to invalions from Predmont or Montferatt He endeavours allo to feule a good correspond.hey and right understanding with the Catholique Cantons and Grilons, and to 'atisfic them in all their pactentions ; and 'tis faid, will give them Aflignments upon Masles and Sicily, the better to engage them for their aflightnee upon a'l Emergencies.

Hamburg, June 5. The Regiment of Horle, railed for the fervice of His Most Christian Majesty, by the Count Conin fmark, is with several of the German forces said to be dismissed his service, but as yet no stop is put to the Spanish Leavies about those parts.

From Copenhagen we are adviled, that His Majefly of Denmark, with his C utt, continues fill at Fredericksbourg. the Prince of Denmark with his Lady at Colden in Jutland, where they may continue divertiling themfilves for five or fix weeks, whither also is lately gone the young Prince George intending, after 8 days flay, to embark himfelf for Hoiland ig a Galliot, which is attending for his t ansportation.
