Rome, June 9.

Though the Courier, that was lately sent to the Court of Spain, has brought back an Answer very much in favour of *Fuherigo*, yet there are still such Obstacles in his way, that his Friends have not hitherto been able to gain for him the number of Voices that is necessary to make an Election; which has encouraged the Negotiations on behalf of *Cibo*, *Delfino*, *Capegna*, and *Visconti*; The last of these is not unacceptable to the Zealots, and is best lik'd by *Silieri*, the Head of the opposite Party, on account of his great Age, so that he seems to stand the fairest. In the meantime this long continuance of the Conclave occasions great Disorders in this City, where daily Robberies and Murders are committed, notwithstanding all the care that is taken to prevent them, and the Cardinals begin to be very uneasy because of the great Heat; Those that would have the Bulls observed concerning the strict shutting up of the Conclave, have complained of the too great liberty that is allowed for Persons to come in on divers pretences, and have made reproaches on this occasion to the Prince *de Savelli*, Hereditary Marechal of the Conclave, who, to give them some satisfaction, has ordered his Guards to go the Rounds, and to secure all persons that shall be found thereabouts after midnight. The Cardinals have held this week a Congregation, about sending the Gallies of the Ecclesiastical State to the assistance of the Venetians, and have dispatched an Officer to *Civita Vecchia* to hasten them out.

Turin, June 9. The French Army, commanded by Monsieur *Catinat*, came on the 6th instant before *Carmagnole*, and have since made two assaults upon the place, in which they were repulld with great loss; They give out, that they expect a Reinforcement of 10 or 12000 men from *Dauphine*, and that they will then attack this place; The Duke of *Savoie* has removed his Camp to *Moncalier*, where he will expect the farther Succors that are coming to him: Those from *Germany* have leave to pass through the Territories of the *Grisons* in much greater numbers than was granted the last year, and we are assured, that 7 or 8000 of them will be here before the end of this month. The Marquis *de Debrera*, late Governor of our Citadel, is by the Duke's order sent Prisoner to the Castle of *Vercul*, upon suspicion of his having Intelligence with the Enemy. The *Protons* have of late made several Excursions into *Dauphine*.

Milan, June 13. The Town of *Carmagnole* surrendered to the French on the 9th instant, and the Garrison was conducted with Arms, Bag and Baggage,

to *Turin*. Our Governor the Marquis *de Legancy* having given notice of his arrival here to the Duke of *Mantua*, a Gentleman is come from him to Compliment his Excellency, and to confer with him about the present state of Affairs in relation to that Duke, who it's believed inclines to an Accommodation. Four thousand Foot of the Troops of this State, are now on their march towards *Piedmont*.

Venice, June 15. We have had no news from the Captain-General *Mocenigo* since his departure with the Fleet from *Cosfo*, but are in daily expectation to hear of his arrival at *Napoli di Macedonia*. A Squadron of our Ships is gone in the meantime to cruise in the *Archipelago*, and to observe the motions of the Turkish Fleet, which they pretend will be much stronger this Summer than it was the last. By a Vessel come from the Coast of *Bari* we are told, that the Ships of *Tunis* and *Tripoli* were sailed for the *Levant* to joyn the *Ottoman* Fleet.

Vienna, June 17. General *Veterani*, who commands the Emperor's Forces in *Transylvania*, by his Letters of the 9th instant from *Hermanstadt*, which arrived here yesterday, gives an account, that he had by the way of *Valachia* received advice, of a great Tumult and Commotion at *Constantinople*, between the Janisaries on the one part, and the Spahis and *Asiatick* Troops that were going for *Hungary* on the other; That the latter were for setting up the late Grand Signior's Son, and the former for the present; That the Grand Vezier had done all he could to appease them, but his Endeavours for that purpose being ineffectual, and finding his own Life in danger, he was retired with the Grand Signior to *Adrianople*, whither he was quickly followed by the French Ambassador, who, in this General Disorder, thought himself not safe at *Constantinople* amidst the great Inclinations which the People there express to a Peace: But we must expect the Confirmation of this news by our next advices from *Turkey*. The General Officers, now here, are hastening away in order to open the Campaign in *Hungary*, where (we are told) Prince *Louis of Baden* will have under his command an Army of 50000 Germans, 8000 Hungarians, and 5000 Rascians, besides 12000 that remain in *Transylvania*, and 15000 in the Frontier Garrisons. The last Letters from *Essex* tell us, that a Party of Turks had shew'd themselves near that place, but that upon Count *Gude* of *Saxenburgh's* going out with a Detachment of that Garrison, they retired again; And that the Rascians of *Bukovar* had lately pass'd the *Sar*, and seized two small Turkish Forts, bringing the Commandant of one of them Prisoner to *Essex*. The Emperor has given orders for the fortifying *Essex*, *Alba Regia*, and *Szegedin*.

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Hydelberg, June 23. The Confederate Army decamped on the 21st from *Wiffelack*, and marched to *Munheim*, where they will expect the Saxons, and in the mean time they are making two Bridges over the *Neckar*. The Elector of Saxony is still at *Hulbron*. The Imperial Regiments of Horse of *Commercy* and *Caraffa*, with that of the Elector of *Bavaria's* Lite-Guard, began their march the 18th, 19th, and 22th of this month, to follow the other Troops, which have been on their march towards *Piedmont* ever since the latter end of the last month; The Regiments of *Arco* and *Steman* are likewise in motion, and these pass all through *Hulbron*, and so through the Country of *Wuerttemberg*; The Regiment of Horse of *Sachsen*, and the Dragoons of *Soyer*, are to pass the *Neckar* the 23th at *Wimpffz* on their march likewise towards Italy.

Frankfort, June 24. Yesterday the Forces of Saxony were to join the Confederate Army on the *Rhein*, from whence all the Imperial and Bavarian Regiments, designed for the assistance of the Duke of Saxony, are now on their march towards *Piedmont*. The French Army, that has layn about *Nentz* and *Neder-Ulm*, is going to remove towards *Creutzna*, where 'tis said they will be reinforced by several Battalions that come under the command of the *Sieur de Bretsche* from *Houburg*. Upon this motion of the Enemies, the Imperial Regiments of *Frisia* and *Bibra*, that are posted near *Coblenz*, will return and join the Confederate Army, to which a strong Reinforcement is likewise coming from the Circles of *Franconia* and *Saxonia*.

Cologne, June 25. The *Nimbourg* Troops begin their march this week to the place appointed for their Rendezvous. The Elector Palatine, and his Electors, the Prince of *Tulany*, (whom he met at *Insprucke*) made their Publick Entry into the City of *Neubourg* on the 5th instant, and are shortly expected at *Duisdorf*. The last Letters from *Munichen* tell us, that the Elector of *Bavaria* had been indisposed with an Ague, of which he had had several Fits, but that his Electoral Highness was perfectly well again, and that he would set out very soon for *Piedmont*, whether all the success are now actually on their march, and part of them are, it's believed, by this time arriv'd there.

Paris, June 26. The French Men of War that were at *Batavia*, are returned to *Krist*, where 'tis said the Fleet lies now ready to put to Sea. The Ships at *Dunkirk* are still block'd up by the English and Dutch Squadron that has layn some time before that Port, which is a great disappointment to us, for the said Ships were not only order'd to join the Fleet, but should have brought them Stores and Provisions, which they very much want. From *Piedmont* they write, that *Monsieur Catinat* was gone himself with a strong Body of Horse and Dragoons by the way of *Alle Mores*, to pass a Convoy of Provisions, and some fresh Troops, into *Catal*. The Governor of *Miln* has caus'd some Crowns to be paid to the Duke of *Saxony*, and has had a Conference with his Royal Highness at *Verceil*. 'Tis reported, that the Count d' *Estree* is gone with the Squadron which he commands (in the *Mediterranean*) towards the Coasts of *Catalonia*.

From the King's Camp at Genblours, June 28. On the 25th instant, early in the morning, we decamped from *Opresnes*, and after a march of 2 Leagues and a half came to this place, the Landgrave of *Hesse*, attended by his two Troops of Guards, meeting the King on his march, by which he was very kindly received; His Troops where you had an account in our last, are not yet come up with us, but expected here this evening. 'Tis not yet known how long we shall stay here, waiting for a Train of Battering Pieces from *Munich*, which we hear are already there, and as soon as they come, 'tis believed that we shall besiege some Town. The Duke of *Luxemburg* decamp'd yesterday at one in the morning, and marching 3 Leagues that day, encamp'd at *Binche*, about a League on this side *Mons*; And we hear, that the Marquis de *Borghese* has thrown the Infantry he had with him into *Perwez*, *Charlemont*, and *Dinant*. The Troops of *Hesse* have just now join'd us.

Brigit, June 29. The Letters from *Flanders* give an account, that the King encamp'd the 26th at *Genblours*, and that 'twas believ'd His Majesty would besiege some place, for which purpose a Train of Battering Artillery was sent for from *Munich*. The Duke of *Luxemburg* encamp'd the 27th at *Binche*, and is, they say, drawing what Troops he can out of the French Garisons to reinforce his Army. The Letters from *Vienna* are all full of the news of a great Commotion at *Constantinople*.

From the Camp at Ballymore, June 16. The Prince of *Wuerttemberg*, with the Forces under his command, came

on the 14th of this month to *Sreams-Town*, and to morrow 8 o'clock will be off in the way to *Arlone*, whither we are to march. The Irish draw what Troops they can together to guard the *Shannon*, but we hear from all parts that they are in an ill condition, and that their French General is already grown very weary of his new Employment.

Dublin, June 19. The Tin-boats or Pontoons that came from *Highlake* were landed the 16th, and the rest that were sent away to the Army, which decamp'd yesterday from *Ballymore*; The Lord *Lisborne* was gone with a strong Detachment towards *Lanesborough*; Our main Body took the straight Road to *Arlone*, and are this day upon the Banks of the *Shannon*; We hope our Tin-boats will be all upon that River by Tuesday next.
