Rome , June 9.

In the mean time this long continuance of the Conclave occasions great diforders in this City, where daily Robberies and Murders are committed, notwithstanding all the cire that is taken to prevent them, and the Cardials begin to be very uneasy because of the great Heats; Those that would have the Bulls observed concerning the strict shutting up of the Conclave, have complained of the too great liberty that is alloved for Persons to come in on divers pretences, and have made reproaches on this occasion to the Prince de Savelli, Hereditary Mareschal of the Conclare, who, to give them fome fatisfaction, has ordared his Guards to go the Rounds, and to fecirc all perfons that shall be found thereabouts attermidnight. The Cardinals have held this week a Congregation, about fending the Galleys of the Eccletialtical State to the affiltance of the Venetions, and have dispatched an Officer to Civila Veccan to haften them out.

Trin, Time 9. The French Army, commanded by Monfieur Catinat, came on the 6th ini'ant befor Cormignols, and have fince made two affaults non the piace, in which they were repulfed with great loss; They give out, that they expect a Reinforcement of 10 or 12000 men from Daughine, and that they will then attack this place; The Duke ti Sau y has removed his Camp to Moncailer, where he will expect the farther Succors that are coming to him : Those from Germany have leave to pas through the Territories of the Grifons in much greater numbers than was granted the last year, and we are affored, that 7 or 8000 of them wil be here before the end of this month. Venice, June 15. We have had no news from the Caption General Macanigo fince his departure with the Fleet from Corfon, but are in daily expe-Chation to hear of his arrival at Napo's di Marvafla. A Squadron of our Ships is gone in the mean time to cruize in the Archipelago, and to observe the motions of the Turkith Fleet, which they pretend will be much stronger this Summer than it was the laft. By a Veilel come from the Coast of Bara bary we are told, that the Saips of Tunn and Tripoli were failed for the Levant to joyn the Ottoman Fleet.

Vienna, June 17. General Veterani, who com-mands the Emperor's Forces in Transilvania, by his Letters of the 9th instant from Hermanstadt, which arrived here yesterday, gives an account, that he had by the way of Valachia received advice, of a great Tunuit and Commotion at Conflancinople, between the Janifaries on the one part, and the Spahi's and Affatick Troops that were going for Hung my on the other; That the latter were for fetting up the late Grand Signion's Son, and the tomer for the prefent; That the Grand Viller had done all he could to appeare them, but his Ender-vours for that purpose being ineffectual, and finding his own Life in danger, he was retired with the Grand Signior to Adrianople, whither he was quickly followed by the French Ambaffador, who, in this General Diforder, thought himfelf not lafe at Conflanti rople amidft the great Inclinations which the People there express to a Peace: But we must expect the Confirmation of this news by our next advices Lon Tarkey.
