THE Queen has been pleased to direct Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, granting the dignity of a Knight of the said United Kingdom unto William John Anderson, Esq., Chief Justice of British Honduras.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to grant unto Henry Broadley Harrison, of Tickton Grange, in the parish of St. John of Beverley, and of Welton House, in the parish of Welton-cum-Melton, both in the East Riding of the county of York, Esquire, Her Royal licence and authority that he may, in compliance with a clause in the last will and testament of his uncle, William Henry Harrison-Broadley, late of Welton House aforesaid, Esquire, Honorary Colonel Yorkshire Hussar (Princess of Wales's Own) Regiment of Yeomnury Cavalry, deceased, take and henceforth use the surname of Broadley in addition to and after that of Harrison, and that he may bear the arms of Broadley quartered with those of his own family, and that such surname and arms may in like manner be taken, borne, and used by his issue; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the College of Arms, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's said College of Arms.
