FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACTS, 1878 to 1895.

WHEREAS by Section 8 (1) of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1891, it is enacted that:—

"Where the Secretary of State certifies that in his opinion any machinery or process or particular description of manual labour used in a factory or workshop (other than a domestic workshop) is dangerous or injurious to health, or dangerous to life or limb, either generally or in the case of women, children, or any other class of persons, or that the provision for the admission of fresh air is not sufficient, or that the quantity of dust generated or inhaled in any factory or workshop is dangerous or injurious to health, the Chief Inspector may serve on the occupier of the factory or workshop a notice in writing, either proposing such special measures as appear to the Chief Inspector to be reasonably practicuble and to meet the necessities of the case."

Now I, the Right Honourable Sir Matthew White Ridley, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do hereby certify that in my opinion the process of sorting wool, goat-hair, or camel-hair, and the processes incidental thereto, are dangerous or injurious to health.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Slaughter of Dog suspected of Rabies, and Compensation.

Compensation.

1. The Local Authority of the county of Buckingham shall cause to be slaughtered within fourteen days after the date of this Order a St. Bernard dog belonging to John Lewis Phipps, of Oakley Court, Bray, Windsor, which dog is now in the district of the said Local Authority and is a suspected animal within the meaning of Article 14 of the Rabies Order of 1895, and the said Local Authority shall pay as compensation for such dog the value of the dog immediately before it was slaughtered.

Application of Provisions of the Rabies Order of 1895.

2. All the provisions of the Rabies Order of 1895 shall, so far as the same are applicable, apply to the case of the dog slaughtered under

the provisions of this Order, and terms in this Order have the same meaning as in that Order.
