Tarmouth , June 40

N Wednelday Night laft a great thip belonging to Newcafile, but laden from Norway, san upon a land off Winterson; but the next morning getting off from thence, unfortunately ran affore near that Town; where the flit lites with little

hopes of gotting eff again. This afternoon the Succefse fet fail from this Road, neering to the Northwards, which way deveral light thips have lately palled for Sunderland and Memorafile.

- Brijtot, Juze 6. The new Man of War which is building in this Port, may within a week be ready to launch, and anosher Man of War of confiderable force, is ordered to be speedily built 3 for which the materials are providing.

This week attived here the Friends Advenuere from Marfeiles, the Olive from Rouen, and the Fidelitz with Linnen from St. Malo's ; feveral other thips being likewife come into the River. The st. Andrews finall Mait of War of London-Deery is now here ready for employment.

Rome, May 26. On F. iday 1 ft in the Evening Buily Fincento Rospigliosi, General of the Popes Gallies, departed from hence for Palo, and the next morning embasked with all his Train on the Gallies, the great Guns both from the Fleer and Fortress faluring him, and about Noon fer fail with a fair wind for Messing, where he is to j yn with the Galleys of Maltha, and astetwards to pursue his Voysge, to find out the Venetian Fleet.

On Monday last His Holinels gave in Extraordinary Audience to the French Ambassical provided a Courrier the day before from His Most Christian Majesty, communicating to the Pope the happy News of the mutual Ratifications of the Treaty of Peace with Spains and in the Asternoon had a Conference of a hours with Cardinal Rospigliofs; and is Master hath conferment to His Holines, the King his Master hath confermed that the Pillar of Ignominy erected in the late Popes time in memory of the affront offered by the Confick fouldiers to the then Ambassiadour the Duke de Crequy, shall be space y

From Maples we are told that the Viceroy being not Gtisfied what falutes are to be given to the Popes Gallies, "is believed the General will not enter into that Porce That the Governour of Gaeta having falued him as he patied with only zz M rass, willow the Cambon which ho bught to have given him, the General has finde his Complaints to the Popes Nuncio in Maples, who repreferring it is the Viceroy, the faid Governour is to be feat for home and imprisoned, and another perfort to be preferred to that Givernment in his place.

Penlee, June E. All our Correspondencies front the Levans speak high of the great preparations made by the Grand Segnior for the carrying on the War with as much vigor and resolution as ever 3 which obliges the Senate to be as diligent for the relief of the City of Candua, to enable it to defend it solf agains the Outomati Power to which end they have lately hired feveral Dutch thips which arrived here with Merchandifes to take inprovisions of Corns Bisles, Powder, Match, with foldiers and fome Cannon, and the believed they may in few dayes be in readinels to follow the other Convoy, fome dayes lince put to fea under the Command of the Proveditot Corners and Monfieur de 52. Andre Montbrun 1, which we find hath already pair by the life of Corfu with a fair wind.

Our Letters from Candia advile us that the Turks with the finall Army they have yet in the Field , continue the Siege with much obilinacy , p ying their Cannon , and endeavouring by their Mines to event the Fort of Pasigra and the Helf Moon of Moccuige, and have made fome spproaches towards the Port of St. Andrew, but find in all places fo frout refiftance, that the Vilier defpairing of fuccels, has been frequently upon the point of railing the Siege ; and being impatient that folimall a part of the fuccors defigned for him, are yet arrived for the recruits of his decayed Apsny , has often refolved to embark himfe'f for Gonfiantineple, to encourage the foldiers to the fervice a from which he has been diverted onely by his sears , leaft his ablence might projudice him in the effeem of the G and Segnior, and haften the face which frequently attends the unfuecelsibi.

Several Performs of Quality see lately arrived here from Savoy and Piedmont, partly out of a curiofity to view this Gity, but principally to complement the Marquifs Vills upon his late return from Candia.

Some few dayes tince artived here forty Ruffian Slaves from the Levance, who in one of the Illands of the Archipelage fell upon a Guard of Turks which were forcing them to Sea₀ killing near 50 of shem upon the place; and afterwards mule their efcape in a flip which they found ready to put to fea. Yefterday they were examiled at the Colledge, and had Paísports given them for their fofs return homewards \leq and a liberal Donative diffributed among it -them

Hambourgh, June 8. From Rigs we are told, that the Czar of Massiv, being highly concern'd as the progress of the rebellious Cost oks ubout Mhranis, was tailing a vesty great Army, which he intended to imploy for the reducing them to obedience, and in the mean time was not a little plasfed at the hews of the defeat given by his people to zhole. Robels a stics which, followed the calles of Bials Cierko, a place of great through and impo isnees, which without the intervention of this timely success mights probably have run much danget. • From Warfaw they tell us, that fince the Kings arrival, it has been ref. lved that the General Affembly of the States in their Diet, will begin the toth of August next enfuing; in the mean while, the Nobility of great Poland are in a p flure of defence, as well to make refultance against the Tartars and Coffacks, whose incursions are much threatned and feared upon the Frontiers, as to preferve themfelves a sinft the defigns of Foreign Princes, which they fuspect to be on foot, to the diffurbance of the peace of that King iom.

Bruges, Fune 12. The Spanish forces daily arrive at Offend, but are unlike to have any employment in these parts, fince the French forces are every where retired withia their bounds; and its faid, above 40000 of them already disbanded. For the futu e incurity of their late Conquefts, they are making ft ong Cittadels at Tourney, Lille, Acto, and other places, fome of which are already much advanced.

. Aix la Chappella, June 12. The French Aimy having made some spoil in the Country about Wedde, and the places thereabours, threatning the Spanish Gue'derland with great seventies, in cale the Contribution formerly charged on them, were not timely paid in. The Deputies of that Countrey have been forced to make their Address to the French General, an it to give them satisfaction in that point 3 fince which the forces begin again to retire into Limbourg, and may in few dayes return into France. From the Frontiers we are told that on the 3d inftant the Marquis de Grequy disbanded near Ninove 140.0 men of the Army, which was to have been commanded by Monfieur; and that the Marquils d'Humieres wha was ordered to-have been prefent at their difinition, thought it more convenient to continue at Lille the possibility of his Government, which he feared would have been otherwise disposed of.

Seven Prelates, amongst which are the Archbisho; s of Paris, Bourges, and Theuloufe, are lately nominated to examine the pulsinels of the four differing Bishops, wiz. of *Plamiers*, Alet, *Beauvais*, and Augers, in which 'tis believed may arife fome difficulty.

From Breft we are told that the Peace was there proclaimed the 6th inftant with much folemnity, as it has been in most of the Cities and Ports of France. That the Duke de Beaufort is still with his Fleet upon the Cratis of Gallicia's and that a lufty Man of War was launched there about a f traight fince, and another great one lies upon the flocks near thaiked, which may in few days be launched.

Lyme, fune 6. The third initiant arrived a Veffel of Weymousb laden with talt from Groyfick, and this day the Greyfiound of this place from Bilboa, telling us that fince the Conclution of the Peace between Spain and France, the Trade begins to revive between them, feveral French Merchant thips being there arrived with Salt and Linnen. On the way homewards this Veffel was met by a French Man of War of between 60 and 70 Guns, enquiring after the French Fleet under the Command of the Duke de Beanfort. t,

Plymouth, June v. On Filday Night last arrived here the Ship Hilliam and Elifabeth of London in 6 weeks from Barbado's, telling us that about a week before their departure three parts of the principal Town of that Island, called the Bridge-Town, was by an accidental fire burnt down to the ground, to the great dammage and impoverisitiment of the Inhabitants.

Yesterday arrived a ship of 300 Tuns from Virginia, two ships from O Porto, and one from Tangier 3 all of them bound for London. The Ruby and Fountain are yet here, expecting a fair wind.
