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Yarmouth, June 4.

ON Wednesday Night last a great ship belonging to Newcastle, but laden from Norway, ran upon a sand off *Winterton*; but the next morning getting off from thence, unfortunately ran ashore near that Town; where she still lies with little hopes of getting off again. This afternoon the *Success* set sail from this Road, steering to the Northwards, which way several light ships have lately passed for *Sunderland* and *Newcastle*.

Bristol, June 6. The new Man of War which is building in this Port, may within a week be ready to launch; and another Man of War of considerable force, is ordered to be speedily built; for which the materials are providing.

This week arrived here the *Friends Adventurers* from *Marseilles*, the *Olive* from *Rouen*, and the *Fidelis* with Linnen from *St. Malo's*; several other ships being likewise come into the River. The *St. Andrew* a small Man of War of *London-Derry* is now here ready for employment.

Rome, May 26. On Friday 1st in the Evening *Bully Pincenzo Rospioglio*, General of the Popes Gallies, departed from hence for *Palo*, and the next morning embarked with all his Train on the Gallies, the great Guns both from the Flier and Fortrels saluting him, and about Noon set sail with a fair wind for *Messina*, where he is to join with the Gallies of *Malta*, and afterwards to pursue his Voyage, to find out the Venetian Fleet.

On Monday last His Holiness gave an Extraordinary Audience to the French Ambassador, upon occasion of the arrival of a Courier the day before from His Most Christian Majesty, communicating to the Pope the happy News of the mutual Ratifications of the Treaty of Peace with *Spain*; and in the Afternoon had a Conference of 4 hours with Cardinal *Rospioglio*; and he said that in Complement to His Holiness's, the King his Master hath consented to the Pillar of Ignominy erected in the late Popes time in memory of the affront offered by the Corsick soldiers to the then Ambassador the Duke de *Crequy*, shall be speedily demolished.

The 20th instant *Signor Pjetro Mocenigo* returned hither from *Naples*, and the next day went hence towards *Venice*, being commanded home by the Senate, in Order (as he said) to his Employment as Ambassador from that Republick to His Majesty of Great Britain.

From *Naples* we are told that the Viceroy being not satisfied what salutes are to be given to the Popes Gallies, 'tis believed the General will not enter into that Port. That the Governour of *Gaeta* having saluted him as he passed with only 12 Mortars, without the Cannon which he ought to have given him, the General has sent his Commissaries to the Popes Nuncio in *Naples*, who representing it to the Viceroy, the said Governour is to be sent for home and imprisoned, and another person to be preferred to that Governour in his place.

Venice, June 2. All our Correspondents from the Levant speak high of the great preparations made by the Grand Signior for the carrying on the War with as much vigor and resolution as ever; which obliges the Senate to be as diligent for the relief of the City of *Candia*, to enable it to defend itself against the Ottoman Power; to which end they have lately hired several Dutch ships which arrived here with Merchandise, to take in provisions of Corn, Bisk, Powder, Match, with soldiers and some Cannon, and 'tis

believed they may in few dayes be in readines to follow the other Convoy, some dayes since put to sea under the Command of the Provost *Cornaro* and Monsieur de *St. Andre Montbrun*; which we find hath already past by the Ile of *Corfu* with a fair wind.

Our Letters from *Candia* advise us that the Turks with the small Army they have yet in the Field, continue the Siege with much obstinacy, plying their Cannon, and endeavouring by their Mines to erect the Fort of *Panigra* and the Half Moon of *Mocenigo*, and have made some approaches towards the Port of *St. Andrew*, but find in all places so stout resistance, that the Visier despairing of success, has been frequently upon the point of raising the Siege; and being impatient that so small a part of the succors designed for him, are yet arrived for the recruits of his decayed Army, has often resolved to embark himself for *Constantinople*, to encourage the soldiers to the service; from which he has been diverted onely by his fears, least his absence might prejudice him in the esteem of the G. and Signior, and hasten the fate which frequently attends the unsuccessful.

That which much increases his despair of the reduction of *Candia*, is the great backwardness of the soldiery for this Employment, besides an insurrection of some of his principal Basha's, much disgusted of late with the proceedings of the Ottoman Court; which has obliged the Sultan to employ a considerable part of the forces otherwise designed for *Candia*, to reduce them to Obedience; they having of late much endangered the Turkish Borders.

On Monday last in the Afternoon, Monsignor *Trotti* the now Nuncio from His Holiness, made his publick Entry, having been met at *Santo Spirito* by a considerable number of Senators in their Purple Robes, and attended to his House; from thence he was the next morning by the same Senators conducted to the Colledge; where he presented his Credential Letters with an elegant Oration, and was afterwards in the same state re-conducted to his Lodgings.

Marco Antonio Justiniano, having continued the time prefixed for his Embassy in *France*, is to be suddenly recalled; in whose place is elected Signior *Juanne Morosini*, as present Ambassador in *Savoy*.

Several Persons of Quality are lately arrived here from *Savoy* and *Piedmont*; partly out of a curiosity to view this City, but principally to complement the Marquis *Vills* upon his late return from *Candia*.

Some few dayes since arrived here forty Russian Slaves from the *Levanie*, who in one of the Islands of the *Archipelago* fell upon a Guard of Turks which were forcing them to sea, killing near 50 of them upon the place; and afterwards made their escape in a ship which they found ready to put to sea. Yesterday they were examined at the Colledge, and had Passports given them for their safe return homewards; and a liberal Donative distributed amongst them.

Hambourgh, June 8. From *Riga* we are told, that the Czar of *Muscovy*, being highly concern'd at the progress of the rebellious Cossaks about *Ukrania*, was raising a very great Army, which he intended to employ for the reducing them to obedience; and in the mean time was not a little pleased at the news of the defeat given by his people to those Rebels; after which, followed the call of *Biala Cierko*, a place of great strength and importance, which without the intervention of this timely success might probably have run much danger.

From *Warsaw* they tell us, that since the Kings arrival, it has been resolv'd that the General Assembly of the States in their Diet, will begin the 10th of *August* next ensuing; in the mean while, the Nobility of great *Poland* are in a posture of defence, as well to make resistance against the *Tartars* and *Cossacks*, whose incursions are much threaten'd and feared upon the Frontiers, as to preserve themselves against the designs of Foreign Princes, which they suspect to be on foot, to the disturbance of the peace of that Kingdom.

Bruges, June 11. The Spanish forces daily arrive at *Offend*, but are unlike to have any employment in those parts, since the French forces are every where retir'd within their bounds; and 'tis said, above 40000 of them already disbanded. For the sure & security of their late Conquests, they are making strong Cittadels at *Tourney*, *Lille*, *Aeth*, and other places, some of which are already much advanced.

The 7th instant, arriv'd at *Tourney*, Monsieur *Barillon*, one of the Judges in the Parliament of *Paris*, and Intendant of *Picardy*, *Artois*, and all the new Conquests; upon his arrival there, he immediately summon'd in the Deputies of *Lille*, *Tourney*, *Aeth*, *Douay*, *Oudenard* and *Courtray*; who making their appearance in the Great Hall, appointed for their Assembly; he there read to them, a Commission from His Most Christian Majesty, for the erecting of a Sovereign Court of Parliament in that City, with a power to take Appeals and give final Determination in all Causes, Civil and Criminal; to which, in case of difficulty, all the subordinate Judges in the several Towns and places of his new Conquests were to make their Appeals, in the same manner as was formerly used to be done at *Mechlin*; nominating for Keeper of his Majesties Seal, Monsieur *de Bly*, Advocate of *Lille*; for Vice-President, Monsieur *Bargibant* Pensioner of *Tourney*, and for Councillors in that Court, Monsieur *de Fine*, the Proctor General; Monsieur *Durant*, Pensioner of *Aeth*; Monsieur *Muffart*, an Advocate of *Lille*; Monsieur *le Maire*, Pensioner of *Douay*, with the Pensioners of *Oudenard* and *Courtray*; and for Secretary Monsieur *Sourleau*, with the Door-keeper and other Officers, to whom were administered the Oaths usually given on the like occasions.

Aix la Chappelle, June 12. The French Army having made some spoil in the Country about *Wedde*, and the places thereabouts, threatening the Spanish *Gue'derland* with great severities, in case the Contribution formerly charged on them, were not timely paid in. The Deputies of that Country have been forced to make their Addresses to the French General, and to give them satisfaction in that point; since which the forces begin again to retire into *Limbourg*, and may in few dayes return into *France*. The City of *Cologne* is also freed from the jealousies they had of the French; their differences with the Elector are not yet ended, but 'tis believed will be suddenly compos'd, to the satisfaction of both parties.

Paris, June 16. His Majesty having taken into Consideration the Address lately made to him by the Venetian Ambassador, has ordered the sum of 100 Thousand Crowns to be expended in their Service, with permission to levie force in *France* for the defence of *Candia*.

On Monday arriv'd at the Court Monsieur *Colber* His Majesties Plenipotentiary at *Aix la Chappelle*, giving a particular Narrative of what pass'd in his Negotiation, and is making preparation for his Embassy intended into *England*.

From the Frontiers we are told that on the 3d instant the Marquis *de Crequy* disbanded near *Ninove* 14000 men of the Army, which was to have been commanded by Monsieur; and that the Marquis *d'Humieres* who was ordered to have been present at their dismissal, thought it more convenient to continue at *Lille* the possession of his Government, which he feared would have been otherwise dispos'd of.

Seven Prelates, amongst which are the Archbishops of *Paris*, *Bourges*, and *Thoulouse*, are lately nominated to

examine the business of the four dissenting Bishops, viz. of *Bamiers*, *Alets*, *Beauvais*, and *Angers*, in which 'tis believed may arise some difficulty.

From *Brest* we are told that the Peace was there proclaimed the 6th instant with much solemnity, as it has been in most of the Cities and Ports of *France*. That the Duke *de Beaufort* is still with his Fleet upon the Coasts of *Gallicia*; and that a lusty Man of War was launched there about a fortnight since, and another great one lies upon the stocks near finish'd, which may in few dayes be launched.

Lyme, June 6. The third instant arriv'd a Vessel of *Weymouth* laden with salt from *Crossick*, and this day the *Greyhound* of this place from *Bilboa*, telling us that since the Conclusion of the Peace between *Spain* and *France*, the Trade begins to revive between them, several French Merchant ships being there arriv'd with Salt and Linnen. On the way homewards this Vessel was met by a French Man of War of between 60 and 70 Guns, enquiring after the French Fleet under the Command of the Duke *de Beaufort*.

Plymouth, June 7. On Friday Night last arriv'd here the Ship *William* and *Elizabeth* of *London* in 6 weeks from *Barbado's*, telling us that about a week before their departure three parts of the principal Town of that Island, called the *Bridge-Town*, was by an accidental fire burnt down to the ground, to the great damage and impoverishment of the Inhabitants.

Yesterday arriv'd a ship of 300 Tuns from *Virginia*, two ships from *O Porto*, and one from *Tangier*; all of them bound for *London*. The *Ruby* and *Konstant* are yet here, expecting a fair wind.

London, June 10. This day, the body of his Excellency the Count *de Dhona*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *Sweden*, was with much State and Solemnity, attended through the City to the Tower-wharf, with a great train of Coaches and six horses, where it was embark'd in one of His Majesties Yachts, which there attended for its transportation to *Hambourgh*.
