e. From Warfaw they tell us, that fince the Kings arrival, it has been refelved that the General Assembly of the States in their Diet, will begin the toth of August next ensuing; in the mean while, the Nobility of great Poland are in a p sture of desence, as well to make resistance against the Tartars and Cossacks, whose incursions are much threatned and seared upon the Frontiers, as to preserve themselves against the designs of Foreign Princes, which they suspect to be on soot, to the disturbance of the peace of that King iom.

Bruges, June 12. The Spanish forces daily arrive at Oslend, but are unlike to have any employment in these parts, since the French forces are every where retired within their bounds; and 'tis said, above 40000 of them already disbanded. For the sune electrity of their late Conquests, they are making st ong Cittadels at Tourney, Lille, Actb, and other places, some of which are already much ad-

Vanced.

The 7th inflant, arrived at Tourney, Monfieur Barillon, one of the Judges in the Parliament of Paris, and Intendent of Picardy, Artois, and all the new Conquelts; upon his arrival there, he immediately lummon'd in the Deputies of Lille, Tourney, Acth, Dousy; Oudenard and Courtray; who making their appearance in the Great Hall, appointed for their affemble; he there read to them, a Commission from His Mot Chaitian Majetty, for the erecting of a Sourceign Court of Parliament in that City, with a pow-Ter to take Appeals and give final Determination in all "Caules, Civil and or minal; to which, in case of difficulty, all the subradina e Judges in the several Towns and places of his new Conquetts were to m ke their Appeals, in the tame manner as was formerly used to be done rat Methelen; nominating for Keeper of his Majesties Seal, Monsieur de Bly, Advocate of Iille; for Vice-Presidene - Montieur Bargibaut Pensioner of Tourney, and for Councellors in that Court, Moi fieur de Fiine, the Pro-Ator General; Monfieur Durant, P ni oner of Acth; Monfieur Muffart, an Advocate of Lille; Monfieur e Maire, Pensioner of Doug, with the Punsioners of Oudenard and Courseas; and for Secre ary Monfieur Sourdeau, with the Door-keeper and other Officers, to whom were admi. nistred the Oa hs usually given on the like occasions.

Aix la Chappella, June 12. The French Aimy having made some spoil in the Country about Wedde, and the places thereabouts, threatning the Spanish Gue'derland with great severhies, in case the Contribution formerly charged on them, were not timely paid in. The Deputies of that Countrey have been forced to make their Addresses to the French General, and to give them satisfaction in that point; find may in severe account into France. The City of Cologne is also freed from the leadoutes they had of the French; their differences with the Elector are not yet ended, but it believed will be suddenly composed, to the taitisfaction of

both parties.

Paris, June 16. His Majest y having taken into Consideration the Address lately made to him by the Venetian Ambassador, has ordered the sum of 100 Thousand Crowns to be expended in their Service, with permission to levie force in France for the desence of Candia.

- On Monday arrived at the Court Monsieur Colber His Majest'es Plenipo entia y at Aix la Chappelle, giving a particular Nitra ive of what passed in his Negotiation, and is making preparation for his Embassy intended into England.

From the Frontiers we are told that on the 3d instant the Marquis de Grequy disbanded near Ninove 140.0 men of the Army, which was to have been commanded by Monfieur; and that the Marquis d' Humieres wha was ordered to-have been present at their dismission, thought to more convenient to continue at Lille the possession of his Government, which he seared would have been otherwise disposed of.

Seven Prelates, amongst which are the Archbisho; s of Paris, Bourges, and Thoulouse, are lately nominated to

examine the utinels of the four difference Bishops, viz. of Primiers, Alet, Eczuviis, and Augers, in which 'tis believed may arise some difficulty.

From Breft we are told that the Peace was there proclaimed the 6th instant with much solemnity, as it has been in most of the Cities and Ports of France. That the Duke de Beaufort is still with his Fleet upon the Ceasts of Gallicia; and that a lufty Man of War was launched there about a f trnight since, and another great one lies upon the stocks near timisked, which may in few days she launched.

Lyme, June 6. The third initiant arrived a Vessel of Weymouth laden with talt from Cropsick, and this day the Greyhound of this place from Bilboa, telling us that since the Conclusion of the Peace between Spain and France, the Trade begins to revive between them, several French Merchant ships being there arrived with Salt and Linnen. On the way homewards this Vessel was thet by a Franch Man of War of between 60 and 70 Guns, enquiring after the French Fleet under the Command of the Duke de Beaufort. Let.

Plymouth, June 7. On Friday Night last arrived here the Ship Milliam and Elisabeth of London in 6 weeks from Barbado's a telling us that about a week before their departure three parts of the principal Town of that Island, called the Bridge-Town, was by an accidental fire burnt down to the ground, to the great dammage and impoverish-

ment of the Inhabitants.

Yesterday arrived a ship of 300 Tuns stom Virginia, two ships from O Porto, and one from Tangier; all of them bound for London. The Ruby and Fountain are yet here, expecting a sair wind.
