The Enemy have Intrenched themselves, and have cut down a great many Trees to render the Passes of the Wood, which covers their Camp, the more difficult; and at the same time have sent away their heavy Baggage to *Marientburgh*, between 2 and 3 Leagues beyond *Philspville*. The Baron de *Fleming*, with about 18000 men of the Forces of *Brandenburgh*, *Leige*, &c. is come to *Nimur*, where he expects His Majesties Orders.

*Hague*, July 27. The Armies in *Flanders* lye not above a League asunder, so that we are in great expectation of a Battel, though the French decline it, and do all they can to secure their Camp. The Troops of *Leige* have joyned with those of *Brandenburgh* under the command of the Baron de *Fleming*, and are encamped near the *Meuse*. The *Marquis de Boufflers*, who came lately into the Country of *Eyffelt* with 6000 men, and made a shew of marching towards the *Rhine*, is on the sudden returned towards the *Meuse* to strengthen, as 'tis thought, their Garisons on that side. They write from *Germany*, that the French, upon the approach of the Confederate Army commanded by the Elector of *Saxony*, have quitted *Neustadt*; and that his Electoral Highness's Great Artillery was coming up from *Hailbron*, in order to besiege some considerable place, which in all probability will be *Landau*.

From the Camp by *Aghrim*, July 15. On the 13th *Brigadier Eppinger* went with a strong Detachment to *Portunoy*, and possessed himself of it, and yesterday the Fort and Castle of *Banahar* surrendered to *Major Wood*, who was sent thither with 150 Horse; so that we have now all the Passes upon the *Shannon*, except *Limerick*, and those within 8 miles of it. We hear, that the Enemies Horse are retired between *Logirea* and *Limerick*, but that greatest part of their Foot are broke and dispersed. The account we had of *St. Ruth's* being killed by a Cannon Bullet is confirmed; of the other two French Lieutenant-Generals, one has put himself into *Limerick*, and the other into *Galloway*. The Enemies Loss appears to be greater than was at first reported, and is reckoned at 7000 men; 'tis certain that above half of their Foot Officers, and almost all their Chief Commanders, are killed or taken. We have above 100 Officers Prisoners, among whom are 2 Major-Generals, 2 Brigadiers, 8 Colonels, and 400 Private Soldiers. Our loss in this late Action was about 500 killed, and 700 wounded. To-morrow we march from hence to *Logirea*.

*Dublin*, July 18. We have an account, that *Their Majesties Forces* have possessed themselves of *Portunoy* and *Banahar*, two very considerable Passes on the *Shannon*, as well of a strong Castle called *Moore*, not far from *Banahar*. *Judge Dayle*, who was at *Galloway*, has sent the General for a Pass, which has been granted him; and we are told, that the Prisoners of the better Quality have desired leave to write to *Sarsfield*, *Luttrell*, *Skeldon*, and the rest of the Irish Officers that escaped, to advise them to submit. *Major-General Dorington* is brought hither a Prisoner this afternoon, and makes the Enemies loss to be 8000 men killed. By an Express just now come from our Camp, we have advice, that our Army was advanced yesterday to *Logirea*, within 16 miles of *Galloway*, and that they were marching directly towards that place, so that they may be by this time before it.

Lord *Galloway*, Brigadier *Barker*, Colonel *Moore*, Colonel *Bazot*, Colonel *Morgan* killed; with many more whose names we do not yet know.

*Plimouth*, July 19. On the 16th came in here the *Szare* brigat, who left our fleet on Tuesday last about 6 Leagues S. W. of *Silly*; And the same day passed by this Port to the Eastward the English and Dutch *Smyrna* Fleet, under the Convoy of several Men of War commanded by Captain *Aylmer*, being in all about 80 Sail.

*Falmouth*, July 18. Last night arrived here the Spanish *Admiral Pacquet-Boar*, who came on the 13th from the *Grayne*, and on the 15th, about 12 at night, fell in with a great Fleet, as they discovered by their Lights, about 20 Leagues to the Westward of *Ushant*, steering towards *Bele Ile*, which they took to be the French Fleet, and thereupon altered their Course; And that yesterday morning they saw another great Fleet, 10 Leagues off *Ushant*, which they believe was the English and Dutch Fleet; And that these two Fleets were about 20 Leagues distant from each other, the Wind at W.

*Draie*, July 20. The English and Dutch *Smyrna* Fleet arrived in the *Downes* yesterday in the afternoon. Captain *Aylmer* continues there with the Men of War under his command; but the Merchant Men are all gone to the River.
