situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Augus-

tine, Newland.' "And with the like consent of the said William Dalrymple Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages baptisms churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Augustine of Hippo situate as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend Joseph Malet Lambert Clerk in Holy Orders the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John Newland shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint Augustine of Hippo situate as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Joseph Malet Lambert and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said

office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing

Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Augustine

Newland being:-

"All that part of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint John Newland in the county of York and in the diocese of York which is bounded upon part of the north upon the west and upon the south-west by the parish of Cottingham; upon the south by a certain isolated portion of the parish of the Holy Trinity Kingston-upon-Hull upon the south-east by the parish of Sculcoates all which parishes are situate in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon all other sides that is to say upon the north-east and upon the remaining part of the north by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the new parish of Saint Mary Sculcoates in the county and diocese aforesaid from the parish of Sculcoates aforesaid meets the boundary which divides the said parish of Sculcoates from the new parish of Saint John Newland aforesaid at the junction of Queen's-road and the roadway leading to the Beverley-road Railway Station with Beverley-road and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lambertstreet and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named s'reet for a distance of twenty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called or known as Newlandavenue and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with Sharp-street and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to its present western end and extending thence in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to a point in the

middle of Cottingham Drain and extending thence southward along the middle of the said drain for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the line of the Hull Barnsley and West Riding Junction Railway over the said drain and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of twenty-four chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the same line of railway over Setting Dyke and extending thence westward along the middle of the said dyke for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Newland from the parish of Cottingham aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the tenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, in the words and figures following, that is to

say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eight and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the rectory and parish of Saint Mary South-ampton in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas under and by virtue of the 'Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts 1842 and 1857' being the
Acts secondly and thirdly hereinbefore mentioned
and hereinafter referred to as the Ecclesiastical
Leasing Ac's certain lands tenements and hereditaments situate within the ancient limits of the
said parish of Saint Mary Southampton and
belonging to the benefice or rectory of Saint Mary
Southampton uforesaid were by an Indenture
bearing date the twenty-sixth day of March in
the year one thousand eight hundred and ninetyfive conveyed for an estate of inheritance in fee
simple to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners
for England and our successors and assigns subject
to the ground leases affecting the same hereditaments which are particularized in the same Indenture but with the benefit of the rents in such
