

along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading towards and past the house called or known as Bryn-Dafydd and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to the point on the north of the last-named house where such road is joined by the cartway leading towards the house called or known as Pant-y-Cerig and extending thence that is to say from the last described point north-westward and in a straight line for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to the point where the footpath which leads from the last-named house to the house called or known as Bwlch-y-rhyd abuts upon the source of the stream or watercourse which flows past the western side of the last-named house into the River Cothi aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described stream or watercourse for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to the point where the same stream or watercourse joins the River Cothi aforesaid at or near to the ford called or known as Rhyd-y-Gwial upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Llanfynydd from the parish of Llanybyther aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint David's.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-seven sections six and eight duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the seventh day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven sections six and eight have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the parish of Willesden in the county of Middlesex and now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the fourth day of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six and made or expressed to be made between Dame Elizabeth Mary Salusbury of Offley Place in the county of Hertford Widow of the one part and us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the other part the lands and hereditaments described in the schedule hereto situate in the said parish of Willesden became and are now vested in us.

"And whereas the lands and hereditaments aforesaid are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but are now in possession but

some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said lands and hereditaments or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands and hereditaments or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act all or any of the said lands and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes rent-charges tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament.

"SCHEDULE.

"All those the lands and hereditaments which in the first schedule to the indenture referred to in this scheme are set forth and described as follows namely:—

"First Part.

"Ancient description.

"All those two barns with their appurtenances situate in Kilburn in the parish of Willesden in the county of Middlesex one whereof was formerly called by the name of the New Barn and was formerly in the tenure or occupation of William Whitnell his undertenants or assigns and part whereof is now taken down and the other was formerly built by John Miles deceased and all that piece of meadow ground heretofore divided into two closes containing in the whole by estimation one and a half acres situate in Kilburn aforesaid are lying near to the said barns or one of them together with all that messuage and tenement coach house stable and other erections and buildings thereupon or upon some part thereof erected and built and also all that messuage or tenement heretofore converted into four cottages situate at Kilburn aforesaid formerly in the possession of Samuel Nichollas together with the barn standing near unto the said cottages and all that piece of ground lying behind the said cottages and formerly used as an orchard therewith an
