

have advice, that the Grand Signior *Solyman* dyed on the 22d of the last month, and that his younger Brother *Achmet* succeeded him.

Paris, August 21. The design upon *Montmelian* is again miscarried; The French have quitted the Town, the taking whereof cost them 400 men, and Monsieur *de Hocquincourt*, who commanded the forces employed against that place, is retired to *Chamberi*, leaving only 3 Regiments to block up the Cattle, which he found so well provided, and the Garison so resolute, that he durst not attack it. The *Sieur de Carinat* was still encamped near the *29*, and had sent again a Detachment towards *Com*, but all they attempted was to take a way some Cattel. The Duke of *Savoys* Army is daily reinforced by the arrival of the German Succours, and when they have all joined him, we are assured he will have together above 45000 Men. Our Squadron in the *Mediterranean* has been victor *Alger* and bombarded that place, but 17 or 18 Spanish Men of War appearing from the Westward, they retired with all the haste they could, and are since returned to *Toulon*. We hear, that the Spanish Army in *Catalonia* having received a Reinforcement of 4000 Men from *Aragon*, is marching towards *Roussillon*. In the Country of *Provence* there has been lately a Meeting of 200 new Converts, of which notice being given to the Governor and some Soldiers sent to disperse them, they took 25, who were immediately hanged.

Bussels, August 22. Our Governor-General is still encamped with the Troops under his command at *Gaure* on the *Scheldt*, between *Ghent* and *Audenarde*, where they have laid Bridges over the River; and fortified the Head thereof towards *Flanders*.

From the King's Camp at Gagny, August 23. The King having given Orders for the demolishing the Walls of *Beaumont*, several Squadrons of Horse and Battalions of Foot were posted yesterday morning between our Army and the Town to prevent the Retreat of the Garison, and about two hours after His Majesty marched with the whole Army towards that place to support our Men, in case the French, who lay on the other side of the Town, should offer to give them any disturbance. About noon the Mines were sprung, which had the intended effect, the Forge in the Town was burnt, and the Garison withdrawn in the view of the Enemy, who chose rather to suffer the Affront of having one of their Garisons demolished in the face of their whole Army, than to stir out of their Camp, or make the least motion to hinder us, for fear it might have engaged them in a Battle. In the afternoon the Army returned to their Camp at *Court sur Heure*, from whence we decamped this morning and marched to *Gagny*, the Front of our right Wing towards *Gerpines*, and our left towards *Essey*, and to morrow we march again, but his not known whither. The Baron *de Fleming* did not march with us this day, but lies encamped with the Forces under his command near the *Sambre*, with his right to *Marchienne au Pont*, and his left to *Charleroy*. The French continue in their Camp near *Beaumont*, but have sent their Cannon and heavy Baggage towards *Asbauge*.

From the Camp near Nenagh, Aug. 8. We are now about 15 miles from *Limerick*, whither it's believed we shall continue our march to morrow. We have several Parties abroad, and Major *Wood* with one of them has been within 5 miles of *Limerick*, and brought back a good Prey. Deferters come in daily. The strong Cattle of *Danvers* in *Resconon* is surrendered, and the Garison come over to us, and we are in expectation of more, and of better News.

Dublin, August 12. The last Letters from our Army, which was on the 9th at *Nenagh*, tell us, that they intended to invest *Limerick* this day. That the Irish have got a Body of Men together near that place, and pretend to make a stand there, but it is not believed, because they have already retreated from some places of advantage. The Militia of the County of *Cork* made the last week an Excursion beyond *Bantry*, under the command of Colonel *Brecher*, and Lieutenant-Colonel *Moore*, who in their march to join with Lieutenant-Colonel *Percy Freck*, Lieutenant-Colonel *Roberts*, Major *Wade*, and Major *Morris*, met with a Body of 400 of the Enemy near *Skibberene*, whom they routed, killing about 60, and taking several Prisoners, and then joining with the rest of the Party, and making in all 500, they marched towards a place, where they were informed *Mac Carty Moore* and *O'Donovan* lay with their Regiments, and with great difficulty got over a Pass that might have been defended by 20 men against 2000, at which the Enemy were so surpris'd and terrified, that they ran away in great confusion; Our men got 1000 Black Cattel, 500 Garrons, as many Goats, and 1000 Sheep, besides other Booty. The Governor of the Castle of *Bophin*, in an Island of that name not far from *Galway*, has treated with Sir *Henry Bellasis* for the Surrendering of it, and we believe 'tis now in our possession. When *Slego* is surrendered, which 'twill be on the 15th in-

Their Majesties Obedience, except that part of the County of *Mayo*, where *Baldarick O'Donnell* is, who offers to come in, and has propos'd Terms for that purpose. By a Person come lately from *Limerick* we have an account, That there are great Divisions among the Irish; That a Vessel, on board of which were *St. Ruth's* Goods, attempting to get out of the *Shannon*, was taken by one of our Frigates that are cruising there, and that two other Ships, in which were *Sarsfield's* Lady, and some other Persons of Quality, seeing the misfortune of the first, returned to *Limerick*.

Plymouth, August 16. Yesterday arrived here the *Leon* of *London* in 8 weeks from *Antigua*, whence she came with 7 Sail more; but was separated from them on the 26th of the last month in bad weather.

Chester, August 17. On the 15th arrived here the *Anchor* Yacht, with 140 Irish Officers taken at the Battle of *Malplaquet*, who were brought ashore yesterday, and are now Prisoners in the Castle.

Bristol, August 17. We have Letters by Sea of the 12th instant from *Cork*, which give an account, that the *Virginia* Fleet, consisting of 70 Merchant Men, under the Command of a Men of War, arrived that day in *King's* Harbor: Fifteen Ships of this Fleet, belonging to the *Peace* and *Bridford*, arrived here two days ago. This Evening came in here the *Swift* from *Carly*, whence she parted on the 15th at 10 at night; the Captain whereof says, they had News there that *Limerick* was Surrendered; That the Earl of *Tyconnet*, with several other Persons of Quality, were gone to *Bantry Bay*, in order to get Shipping for *France*; That *Baldarick O'Donnell* was coming in with 3000 Men, and *Sarsfield* offers to do the like; And that our Frigates, which lay before the *Shannon*, had taken a French Man of War that was bound to *Limerick* with a Packet of Letters to encourage them to hold out.
