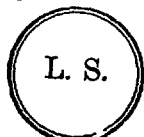
"That the said David George Fee Smith or other the second minister for the time being of the said church of Saint Paul in Liverpool shall immediately on the said intended consolidation of benefices taking effect become and be the minister or incumbent of the consolidated benefice of Saint Paul in Liverpool aforesaid without any nomination presentation licence institution or induction or other process whatever subject nevertheless to all engagements and liabilities affecting the benefices so consolidated and the incumbents respectively thereof at the time of such consolidation and particularly to the pension or annuity hereinafter provided for the said John Lloyd.

"That there shall be paid out of the income of the said intended consolidated benefice to the said John Lloyd by way of pension the annuity or sum of sixty pounds a year for the term of his life if he shall so long continue in Holy Orders of the Church of England and be entitled to enjoy the privileges and advantages attached to the office of a minister in the Church of England and that the said pension shall be payable in quarterly instalments and shall be apportionable up to day of death.

"That the advowson or right of nomination or presentation of a minister or incumbent to the said church of Saint Paul in Liverpool when the said intended consolidation of benefices shall have been made shall (subject as hereinbefore expressed and provided) be vested in the said Howard Douglas Horsfall, Charles Lindley Viscount Halifax, Walter George Frank Phillimore, Robert Ernest Horsfall and Walter Digby Thurnam or the survivors or survivor of them their or his heirs and assigns.

"In witness whereof I the said John Charles Bishop of Liverpool have hereunto set my hand and Episcopal Seal this thirtieth day of November one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the

London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the registrar of the said diocese of Liverpool.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws "concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be further postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz. :—

In the Parish Churchyard of Kirk Hammerton, in the county of York, until the twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

In the Churchyard of Saint Sampson, Cricklade, in the county of Wilts, until the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.
