Naples, May 29. On Wednesday last the Viceroy having notice of the arrival of Bayly Vincenzo with the Gallies under his Command, near this Port 5 immediately five of the Gallies belonging to this place were ordered to put out of the Port; upon the Admiral whereof embarked the Viceroy in person, with the Princes di Santo Buono, de Montemiletto, and di Belvedere, the Marquis di Fufcaldo, and the Duke di Calabritta Camp-Master-General, and near the Cape di Posilipo they met, where after the Usual Salutations passed between the Gallies of each side, as is usual on such occasions, which was answered by the Guns from all the Fortresses of this place 3 the Viceroy with the forementioned persons, went aboard the Popes Admiral Galley; where the General Vincenzo Rospigliosi Rood ready to receive them, and after many Complements and Civilities passed; conducted him to the Arlenal, where he eame on thore & the Guns from the Town as well as from the Gallies, proclaiming his welcome: at which place he was received by a great Train of the Nobility and Gentry, and in much Order attended to the Pallace ; where he was entertained during his abode with extraordinary Feasting, Comedies, and other Divertisements. On Sunday Morn-Ing following he again embarked, and was at his departure falured by all the Great Guns. During his stay he made leveral Presents to the Viceroy of considerable value, for which he made him a return, with a plentiful supply of Provisions for his Gallies. Several Gallies belonging to this place may in little time put to fea, to follow the Popes Squadron to the affistance of the Venetians, for which service we are told the Great Dukes Gallies are also fixed up and well armed at Legorne.

Rôme, June 2. Two Monks of the Sect of the Maro, hites, are lately arrived here; being sent with their Interpreter by the Patriarch of Antioch, to tender Obedience to His Holiness; who received them with extraordinary demonstrations of affection, admitting them to kille His Foot; and afterwards b stowing on each of them a Medal, with his Indulgencies and other favours, to their fails

The Pope has lately received from the Duke de Chaulnes Ambassadour from His Most Christian Majesty, a Letter from that King, written with his pwn band j giving him thanks for what he has lately done in savour to the French Church, and particularly for his Briefs delivered by his Nuncio Bartelliko. Another Letter of Complements from the same King was also delivered to Cardinal Respicios upon the same subject 3 withal declaring that in acknowledgment of the satisfaction seceived by the Popes kindness he is pleased to abolish all Orders and Decrees which have been made to the prejudice of the Sec of Rome, and particularly consenting to the demolishment of the Pyramid some years since erected in memory of the affront done by the Corses of the Popes Guard to his then Ambassadours; which was yesterday at Noon put in execution, and the Pyramid thrown down, to the great satisfaction of the Courts and generally of all the people.

On Friday and Saturday last the Pope gave his Ordinary Audience to the Ambassadours and Ministers of Foreign Princes; where he received with pleasure from the Spanish Ambassadour an account of the Honourable Roception given by the Vicetoy of Naples to his Nephew Vincenza Ro-

The faid Tartan farther adviling us, that the Garrison in Candia had lately made a vigorous fally out of the Town upon the Enemy which lay before the Port of St. Andrew, forcing them with great loss of men to quit a Redoubt which they had railed on that side, and returned with many prisoners, who being examined concerning the flate of the Turkish forcess consessed that their Army was at present reduced to a small number, not exceeding 18 00 men, and those not well commanded a most of their principal Officers, as well as Souldiers, having dyed in the fervice; but that the Visier was in daily expectation of rellefs which was abundantly promited him, both from the Sultan himself, and f om the Bassa of Mores & and in the mean while, was refolved to continue the defence only of the Posts already taken up by his forces before the Towns and not to adventure the small remainder of them upon any Affault. They also tell us, that our Garrison omits no opportunities of taking advantages upon the Enemy, and that by their Countermines and Sallies, they had blown up and ruin'd their Works which they had railed hef re the Bulwork of Mocenigo: in the mean while our Fleer divided into feveral squarrons, were diligently cruizing upon the Coasts, with a considerable number of Christian Privateers, so that the Turks find it a matter of much difficulty so

Hambourg, June 18. From Cassel we are informed, that the Count de Contressmark upon the news of t'e disbanding of his Regiment, is with all possible spe d hasted away for Paris, but his Lieutenant Collonel, the Sieur Fanck, being much concerned that he had not suissaction as yet made him, for the Moneys expended by him in the leavying of them, had a design to seile upon the horses of several of his Souldiers, to whom he had advarced Moneys, which they having notice of, got together, and stood upon their Gua ds; insomuch, that the Lieutenant was sorced for his security to put himself un'er the protection of the Citizens, who since composed t e business; the Soldiers being contented to pay, and discharged their Quarters, on condition they may keep their Horses and Arms.

Hague, June 23. Since the settlement of the peace between the two Crowns, the States General find not now any confiderable necessity of hving so great a Fleet at sea as was at first resolved on; so that his believed many of the hips which were ordered to be inted up, will be returned into their Harbors, but the re-olution still holds, of tending a considerable squadron to the Streights, the better to protect our Merchants from the Co. sairs of Barbary.

Prince Maurice of Nassau having some days since sent away his Train and Baggage, is himself departed hence for Cleves, interiding from t'ence to pass to Berlin to be present at the solemnity of a marriage, concluded on between his Electoral Highness of Brandenburg, and the Dutchels Dawager of Celles, which is intended to be held the 29th instant, and for which, they are there making great preparations.

The States having been informed that the Rivers of Rhine and Isle, are of late years much prejudiced by fand banks raifed in many places of altern, to the hindrance of Nayingation, have taken the matter into confideration, and ordered feveral of their Deputies to take a view of them, and make report accordingly, that some speedy course may be taken to cleanse them.

Bruges, June 24. The Marquis de Castel, Rodrigo has lately taken a review of his forces at another general Mufter, and publish a levere Order for the strict. Regulation of the Militia, according to a more exact Discipline & ca

has been as yet practifed amongst them.

For the better preservation of the remaining Countreys, un er the Spanish jurisdiction; the States of the second Provinces have co sidered of the best ways of maintaining a standing force. The Deputies of the States of Flanders have already agreed with the Marquis for the maintenance of 12000 men, and will undertake for their pay: The States of Brabant for 8000, and the other Provinces for their proportions; besides this, a milion of Guelders is designed to be sailed for present occasions, which tis believed, the Clergy may be induced to Leavy among themselves.
