Thip of this place in 24 hours; arriving from St. Maloes, informs us, that the Trade of that place is much quickned fince the late Proclamation of the Yeace with Spsin, and that before his departure thence, came in there three French men of War from Breft of about 30 Guns a piece, having been cruiting upon the Coalts, where their Merchants now pals freely without fear or moleflation.

Deal, June 14. This morning Sir Thomas Allen, riding with his forladron in the Downs, having intelligence brought him of a Holland Merchant fhip which was firuck upon the Goodwin Sands, and in great danger to be caft away, immediately difpatcht away his Ketch and Longboat to her affiftance, by which means, the was with fome difficulty got off and preferved.

The same Morning, Sir Foremy Smith, with a Squad dron of His Maj.sties shipt, arrived in the Downs from the Buoy in the Nore, betwixt whom; and Sir Thomas Allen passed the usual falures, practised on the like occations.

Maples, May 29. On Wednesday laft the Viceroy having notice of the arrival of Bayly Vincenzo with the Gallies under his Command, near this Port 5 immediately five of the Gallies belonging to this place were ordered to put out of the Port ; upon the Admiral whereof embarked the Viseroy in perfon, with the Princes di Santo Buono, de Montemiletto, and di Belvedere, the Marquifs di Fufcaldo, and the Duke di Calabritta Camp-Mafter-General, and near the Cape di Pofilipo they met, where after the Usual Salutations passed between the Gallies of each fide, as is usual on such occasions, which was answered by the Guns from all the Fortresses of this place 3 the Viceroy with the forementioned perfons, went aboard the Popes Admiral Galley ; where the General Vincenze Respigtiof flood ready to receive them, and after many Complements and Civilities paffed ; conducted him to the Arlenal , where he came on those i the Guns from the Town as well as front the Gallies, proclaiming his welcome : at which place he was received by a great Train of the Nobility and Gentry, and in much Order attended to the Pallace 5 where he was entertained during his abode with extraordinary Feafting, Comedies, and other Divertilements. On Sunday Morn-Ing following he again embarked, and was at his departure falured by all the Great Guns. During his ftay he made leveral Prefents to the Viceroy of confiderable value, for which he made him a return, with a plentiful supply of Pro-visions for his Gallies. Several Gallies belonging to this place may in little time put to fea, to follow the Popes Squadron to the affiftance of the Venetians, for which fervice we are told the Great Dukes Gallies are also fitted up and well armed at Legorne.

Rame, June 2. Two Monks of the Sect of the Marohites, are lately arrived here; being fent with their Interpreter by the Patriarch of Antioch, to tender Obedience to His Holine(s; who received them with extraordinary demonfirations of affection, admitting them to kille His Foor 3 and afterwards b flowing on each of them a Medal, with his Indulgencies and other favours, to their failf. Ction-

The Pope has lately received from the Duke de Chauines Ambassadour from His Most Christian Majetty, a Letter from that King, written with his pwn band 3 giving him thanks for what he has lately done in favour to the French Church, and particularly for his Briefs delivered by his Nuncio Bartellino. Another Letter of Complements from the fame King was also delivered to Cardinal Rofpigliofs upon the fame fubject ; withal declaring that in acknowledgment of the fatisfaction feceived by the Popeskindnefs he is pleafed to abolifh all Orders and Decrees which have been made to the prejudice of the Sec of Rome, and particularly confekting to the demolifiment of the Pyramid lome years fince erected in memory of the affront dong by the Corfes of the Popes Guard to his then Amballadour-; which was yesterday at Noon put in execution, and the Pyramid thrown down, to the great fatisfaction of the Courts and generally of all the people.

On Friday and Saturday last the Pope gave his Ordinary Audience to the Ambasiladours and Ministers of Foreign Princes; where he received with pleasure from the Spanish Ambasiladour an account of the Honourable Reception given by the Viceroy of Naples to his Nephew Vincenza Rdspigliofi, at his arrival there with his Gallies.

Segnior Mutio Matthei Serjeant Major to the Popea forces in Gandia, who died of lome wounds received in a lably made upon the Turks, was lately by the Popes defires with much flate and folemnity enterred in the Courch of Santa Maria Maggiore, at the expences of the Apostolical Chamber, fince which the Pope has nominated Segnior Braccis it da Fabriana to command in his room, with the Tit e of Collonel.

Venice, June 9. A Tartan arriving here on Sunday laft from Carfu, informs us, that fome days before his departure from thence, patied by in view of that Ifland, the Iquadron of thips which laft went from herice for the relief of Candia, intending totall in at Zant, where they were to take aboard them fome Soldiers and Pioneers which there attended their arrival, with General Valier, who had fpen fome time and pains in Lavying and inftructing them, w hake them fit for fetvice.

The faid Tartan fatther adviling us, that the Garrison in Candia had lately made a vigorous fally out of the Town upon the Enemy which lay before the Port of St. Andrew, forcing them with great loss of men to guit a Redoubt which they had railed on that fide, and returned with many priloners, who being examined concerning the flate of the Turkish forces, confessed that their Army was at prefent reduced to a small number, not exceeding 18 00 men, and those not well commanded i most of their prin-cipal Officers, as well as Souldiers, having dyed in the fervice; but that the Visier was in daily expectation of rellefs which was abundantly promiled him, both from the Sultan himfelf, and f om the Baffa of Mores & and in the mean while, was refolved to continue the defence only of the Posts already taken up by his forces before the Towns and not to adventure the imall remainder of them upon any "Affault. They also tell us, that our Garrison omits no opportunities of taking advantages upon the Enemy, and that by their Countermines and Sallies, they had blown up and ruin'd their Works which they had railed bef re the Bulwork of Mocenigo : in the mean while our Fleer divided into feveral fquarons, were diligently cruizing upon the Coafts, with a confiderable number of Christian Privateers, to that the Turks find it a matter of much difficulty so bring relief into Gana, by which means, che Vilier is in want of all forts of necellaries for his fullenance.

A Caich arriving on Tuesday left from Dalmatia, informe, us, that Scientor Justiniane, the Proveditor of the Gulf,
