NOTICES TO MARINERS.

(Nos. 521 to 531 of the year 1893.)

[The bearings are magnetic, and those concerning the visibility of lights are given from seaward.]

No. 521.—THE KATTEGAT.

Lyseground—Additional Shoal Heads.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners No. 453 of 1898, the Danish Government has given further notice, dated 24th August, 1898, that the following additional shoal heads have been found on the Lyseground:—

a. A pinnacle rock, with a depth of $1\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms least water, lies N. 57° W., $1\frac{7}{10}$ miles distant from the light beacon.

b. A pinnacle rock, having a depth of $2\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms least water, lies N. 52° W., $1\frac{7}{10}$ miles from the light beacon.

c. A pinnacle rock, having a depth of 3 fathoms least water, lies N. 70° W., $1\frac{8}{10}$ miles distant from the light beacon.

d. A pinnacle rock, having a depth of 2 fathoms least water, lies S. 20° E., $1\frac{1}{10}$ miles distant from the light beacon.

e. A pinnacle rock, having a depth of 2 fathoms least water, lies S. 7° W., $1\frac{7}{10}$ miles distant from the light beacon.

Approximate position of light beacon, lat. $56^{\circ} 18' N.$, long. $11^{\circ} 48' E.$

No. 522.—CHINA—PE CHI LI GULF.

Sha Lui Tien Island—Decreased Depth Eastward of.

THE Chinese Government has given notice that Mr. G. B. Corner, Master of the steamship "Yung Ping," reports having, on 22nd June, 1898, obtained a depth of $2\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms at half ebb about 15 miles eastward of Sha Lui Tien Island, on the bank marked on the Admiralty Charts "7 to 9 fathoms."

A note to this effect has been placed on the Admiralty Charts.
