HE Pope, though he is not yet perfeelly recovered of his late Indilpolition, does nor forbear giving Audiences to the Cardinals and Foreign Ministers. The Count de Piceolomini, who is newly arrived here from Vienna, had his on Monday last, and gave the Pope a full account of the late Victory in Hungary, Presenting at the same time the which is like that the King of Poland feat hither after the raising the Siege of Vienna. On Tuesday Te Deum was sung in the Chapel of the Palace, at which the College of Car-dinals was present, and at night there were Publick Rejoycings and Illuminations through the whole City. On Wednesday the Duke de Chaulnes, Ambassador of France, parted from hence for Leghorne, where he intends to Embark with the Cardinal of Bouillon, in order to their return home. Cardinal Camus is gone before, and Cardinal Bonzi will follow in few days. We hear, that the Pestilentious Distem-per that lately raged in some Provinces of the Kingdom of Naples, is now quite ceated.

Venice, Sept. 21. His Excellency Sir William Trumball, Amballador from Their Majesties of Great-Britain at the Ostoman Port, is arrived here in the Ship Asia from Corfen, where he left the Man of War that brought him from Somma, and from hence he will proceed by Lind on his return for England. On the 22th inflant the Ceneral pailed the Shannen very carry in the Morning with a ftrong Detachement of Horfe and Dragoons, to Regiments of Foot, and 14 Pieces of Cannon, the rest of the Army remaining under the Command of the Duke of Wirtemberg, for the Security of our Works on the other fide. About Noon our Troops drew up before the English Town, the Enemy playing upon them all the while from the Castle and several Towers, both with great and fmall Shot. About 4 a clock the General ordered a Detachement to attack the Fort near Thomand Bridge; The Enemy fent two great Detachements out of the Town to support thole that defended it; but our Men went on with that Courage and Vigour, that they beat the Enemy, notwithstanding this Reinforcement, out of the Fort, and purfued them over the Bridge to the Town, upon which the Governor fearing we should have enter'd it with them, caused the Bridge to be drawn up, and thereby left those that were without exposed to the fury of our Men, who killed about 600, and took 200 Primers, among whom were 3 Colonels and about 20 other Officers; we took likewife 3 Pieces of Camon, and 5 Colours; And on our fide had about 200 killed and wounded.
