ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 10TH FEBRUARY 1899.)

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Prohibition of Conveyance of Animals by Steamship J. W. Taylor.

1. It shall not be lawful during the continuance of this Order for any person to convey or cause to be conveyed any animals to or from any port in Great Britain by the steamship J. W. Taylor, registered at the port of Sunderland, official number 95261, and now owned by Messrs. Taylor and Sanderson, and such conveyance of animals by that vessel is hereby prohibited accordingly.
