Rome, September 27.

THe Pope is not yet perfectly recovered of his late fall, being troubled with great pains that hinder his Sleep. He gave this week Audience to the Cardinal *de Goss* about the Affairs of *Germany*; but the *Marguis de Caroffs*, who is come from the Duke of *Mantua*, has not yet been admitted to his Audience, but directed to discourse with Cardinal *Spada*. The Differences with the Court of *France* continue in the same state, though the French use their utmost endeavours to compose them, and conclude, that for want of the Popes Bulls there are now 54 Bishopsricks vacant in *France*; The Matter is under the Consideration of a Congregation of Cardinals, and the Pope has so far granted the Ministers of *France*, that upon their Instances, he has desired the Cardinals *Pampliatie* and *Albani* not to assist at it for the future; but as to the main this Court seems not at all inclined to depart from what has been hitherto insisted on, to wit, that the French Clergy shall by a solemn Declaration retract and annul the Propositions made in their Assembly of 1682, against the Popes Infallibility, and that all the Proceedings of the Parliament of *Paris* thereupon shall be rescinded. There has lately happened some new Disputes at *Naples* about the Inquisition, which the People there are very unwilling to submit to.

From the Confederate Camp before *Carmagnole*, Sept. 28. On the 23d Instant Major-General *Soyer* returned into our Camp between *Reuel* and *Staffarde* with 1000 Horse and 500 Foot, who had served for a Convoy to the Ammunition and Provisions that came from *Turin*; The 24th the Count *de Maffel* was sent out with 500 Horse and Dragoons towards *Carnavigi*, into which the Enemy had put a Garison; but he found they had withdrawn their Troops from thence, though the place is not far from their Camp. The same day 40 of the Enemies Foot, commanded by two Lieutenants, having posted themselves near *Ville-Franche*, were discovered by the Country People to a Party of 60 of our Men which was returning from *Turin*, upon sight of whom the French threw down their Arms, and yielded themselves Prisoners. The 25th Prince *Eugene* passed the Po with 3000 Horse, and marched towards *Carmagnole*; The Army marched soon after, and having passed that River over five Bridges, encamped at *Moreta*. The 26th Prince *Eugene* arrived near *Carmagnole*; and the Army encamped in two Lines near *Carrel-Groffe* beyond the River *Mecia*. The 27th Prince *Eugene* invested *Carmagnole*; And this day the whole Army followed, and encamped before that place; The Imperialists and Bavarians took their quarters before the Suburbs of *St. Bernard* and *St. John*, and the rest of the Army, who are separated from them by the Rivulets that come from *Ravenna* and *Caramanna*, where the Enemy have put great part of the Country under Water, reach from the Town of *St. John* to that of the *Bella-Madonna*. So soon as the Guards were placed, the Elector of *Bavaria* went to visit the several Posts, and to view the Ground, in order to the raising our Batteries, and the carrying on our Attacks against the Town, in which the French have a Garison of 6 Battalions of Foot, and 2 Squadrons of Horse, under the command of Monsieur *Du Plessis Balthere*, who gives out, that he will defend it to the last extremity.

Turin, Sept. 29. The Confederate Army passed the Po near *Cirde* on the 25th Instant, and has since formed the Siege of *Carmagnole*. Monsieur *Catinat*, upon the news of their march, endeavoured to put a Reinforcement of 2000 Men into the place, but understanding that Prince *Eugene* was advanced with a strong Detachment of Horse between them and the Town, they durst not go on, but returned to *Saluces*, where the Enemy lie still encamped. This day were sent from hence to our Camp divers Pieces of Heavy Cannon and Mortars, with great quantities of Ammunition, Bombs, Grenadoes, and other Fireworks: And great supplies of Provisions and Ammunition are likewise sent thither by the Po from the Duchy of *Alban*. Two or three days ago 200 Horse and 1500 Foot, detached from the French Troops, who are posted near *Susa*, under the command of the *Marguis de*

Latre, came and burnt 2 small Villages about 3 Leagues from hence, and then retired again, but in their retreat the Country People killed divers of their Stragglers. One of our Parties had this week a Rencounter with 60 of the Enemies Horse, of whom they killed 14 or 15, and took most of the rest Prisoners.

Milan, Oct. 7. We have an account from *Turin*, that our Army has besieged *Carmagnole*; and that 40 Pieces of Cannon, with a great quantity of Ammunition, had been sent from thence to the Camp. Monsieur *Catinat* instead of attempting the Relief of it, is retired towards *Pignerol*, having quitted *Fogor*, *Sarvilan*, and other places, and with them the Winter-Quarters the French not long since very confidently promised themselves in *Piedmont*. 'Tis said that the Confederates intend, after the taking of *Carmagnole*, to attack *Susa*, and bombard *Pignerol*.

Venice, Oct. 6. By Letters from *Napoli di Romania*, of the 26th of *August*, we understand, that the Captain-General *Mocenigo* was returned with the Fleet of this State towards the entrance of the *Dardanelli*, upon advice that the Captain *Baffa* was making Preparations to come to Sea with the Ottoman Ships and Gallies. The Gallies of *Malta* design, before they return home, to cruise some short time off of *Rhodes*. We have an account that 150 French Soldiers, newly raised, who were on board a Venetian Ship bound to the Armada, being near *Vallona*, they mutinied and killed two Officers of the Ship, wounded the Noble Venetian *Contarini*, and would have forced him and the Commander to let them ashore at *Vallona*, which is in the possession of the Turks; They gave the Mutiniers fair words, and agreed that half of them should go ashore in the Long-boat, which was afterwards to fetch the rest, they taking two Italian Officers for Hostages with them; But their had directions to leap into the Water at a convenient distance from the Ship, as they did, and care was had to take them up, then they fired from the Ship upon the Boat, and sunk it, the Frenchmen that were in it being all killed or drowned; and at the same time they seized upon those left on board, most of whom were hanged or cut in pieces, some few only being saved, who confessed that the like Treachery was designed on board some other Ships.

Vienna, Oct. 7. By an Express from the Imperial Camp in *Hungary*, we have an account, that the Army encamped on the 11th of this month within six Leagues of *Gratz-Waradin*; That the same day arrived there Count *Mirjigi* with a Chiaus from *Constantinople*, bringing Propositions of Peace, of which we do not yet know the Particulars, but they are said to be such as 'tis not doubted but a speedy Peace will follow; To which the Turks were before very much inclined, but their defeat at *Salambent* has fixed them in that Resolution; And we are told that *Ali Baffa* late Caimacan of *Constantinople*, and now Grand-Vizier upon the death of *Cuperli*, is coming himself to *Balgrade* with the English and Dutch Ambassadors, having positive Orders from the Grand Signior to conclude a Peace, which alone can give a check to the Commotions that do anew threaten that Empire. General *Peterani* writes from his Camp near *Lippa*, that being informed that *Teckelej* was come with 4000 Men to *Pipalanka*, and that he was followed by a Body of Tartars, and not knowing but their design might be upon *Transilvania*, he had detached some Troops thither under the Count *de Schrotzenbacke*; But that on the 13th he received advice, that *Teckelej* hearing of the surrender of *Lippa*, had raised his Camp, and was retired under the Cannon of *Temsvarer*, and the Tartars were gone home. We are told from *Darda*, that the Turks upon the approach of the Troops of *Croatia*, have quitted all the *Upper-Sclavonia*, and have repassed the *Sava*. The last Letters from *Poland* advise, that the Convoy of Tartars that was marching towards *Cammeec*, having advice of the Poles advancing towards them, returned back, and that *Marschal Lubomirski* was gone after them with a strong Detachment. And that the Castellan of *Chelme*, with a Party of Cossacks, had defeated a Body of Tartars near *Niemorow*, and had killed several thousands of them.

Vitna. Oct. 11. By the way of *Upper-Hungary* we have advice, that the Imperial Army under the command of Prince *Lewis of Baden* would arrive on the 9th of this Month before *Great-Waradin*, his Vanguard, consisting of several Squadrons of Horse, commanded by the Count *d' Aversberg*, being already come in sight of that place; They have with them a very great Train of Artillery, above 20 double Cannon, and 30 Mortars, 3 of which shoot Bombs of 4 and 500 weight, which is the reason their march has been so slow. General *Veterani* has passed the River *Maros*, and marches likewise towards *Waradin*. The Duke of *Croy* is ordered to advance towards the *Sava*. The Letters from *Transylvania* say, that *Tockely* had given General *Hensler* his Liberty, two Officers of his Regiment remaining Hostages for him, and had sent him to *Hermstadt*, without acquainting the Turks with it. There is a report of an Action between the Army of *Poland* and the *Tatars* in *Moldavia*, in which the latter are said to have lost 4000 Men, with all their Baggage. An Express is arrived here this Evening from Prince *Lewis's* Camp, with the Conditions of Peace proposed by the *Turks*, which are so reasonable, that every body believes it will be quickly concluded.

Frankfort, Oct. 17. The Winter quarters are settled for the Saxon Troops, who are to remain near the Rhine, that they may be ready to take the Field betimes the next year; and in consideration thereof the States of *Francia*, *Swabia*, &c. are to give them 500000 Florins. The Swedish Troops have repassed the Neckar, and are marching homeward. They write from *Strasbourg*, that the French Army was separated, and gone into their Winter Quarters, and the *Marchal de Loges* for *Paris*.

Cologne, October 19. We hear that 12000 Men of the Confederate Forces are to be quartered this Winter between *Luege* and the Country of *Eysfelt*, to wit, 3000 at *Aix la Chapelle*, 1500 at *Dueren*, and the rest at *Schleiden*, *Munster-Eysfelt*, *Monsaw*, *Cornelius Munster*, &c. The Troops of *Neubourg* are marched again towards *St. Vith*. The Letters from *Municken* of the 12th Instant, say, that an Express arrived there that day from *Piedmont*, with the news of the Surrender of *Carmagnole*.

Paris, Oct. 17. On the 14th Instant we had an account by an Express from *Piedmont*, that the Confederate Army had besieged *Carmagnole*, before which they set down the 28th of the last Month, the Elector of *Bavaria* taking his quarters near the Suburb of *St. Bernard*, the Duke of *Savoy* before that of *Mongur*, and the *Marquis de Legnuez*, Governor of *Alix*, before *la Madonna*; That on the 30th their Cannon began to play upon the Town, and that the 3d at night they opened their Trenches; That *Monieur Gatinat* had quieted *Fojan*, *Savilian*, and *Salutes*, not being in a condition to maintain those places, and was retired with the French Army under the Cannon of *Pignacrol*. We hear from *Breg*, that the greatest part of the Squadron, which *Monieur de Chateau-Renaud* was to have commanded, are disarmed and laid up, the rest being designed to cruise this Winter. The Duke of *Luxemburg* is expected here about the end of this Month, and the *Marquis de Bufflers* is to have the command of the French Troops in *Flanders* during his absence. The *Marschal de Loges* is likewise very suddenly expected at Court from *Germany*. On Thursday last some Words happened between the Prince *de Comtegray*, and *Monieur de la Langaton*, upon which they drew their Swords near the Queens Apartment at *Fountainbleau*; They are both put under Arrest, and the Grand Prevost is to take Information of the Fact.

Brussels, Oct. 21. The Prince *de Vaudemont* parted from hence the 12th Instant to wait upon the King at the *Hague*, and to receive His Majesty's Orders. The 14th Prince *Waldeck* went likewise towards the *Hague*, leaving the Confederate Army at *Ninove* under the command of the Prince of *Nassau Sarbruck*, *Marschal de Camp* General. On the 19th the Army separated, and the Regiments are now marching to the Quarters assigned them. The Garrison of this City has been reinforced with two Walloon Regiments, and when all the other Troops that are ordered hither are arrived, we shall have in this City a Garrison of 15000 Men, to hinder the Enemies Incursions into the Country hereabouts, for which purpose likewise we have cast up some Works near the Suburb of *Anderlecht*. The *Marquis de Boufflers* was by our last advice encamped with 14 or 15000 Men near *Madans* and the *Muse*; and the Confederate Forces under the command of General *Fleming* not far from *Liege*. They write from *Paris*, that the French Court is extremely alarmed at the great disposition which the *Turks* shew to a Peace, and that they are sending a new Ambassador to the *Port* to hinder the conclusion of it. Our Governor-General has received advice of the taking of *Carmagnole* in *Piedmont*. The Letters from *Madrid* of the 3d of *October* confirm the Queens perfect Recovery.

Hague, Oct. 23. The State of the War for the year ending is settled by His Majesty and the Council of State, and will be declared so soon as the several Provinces have given their Consent to it.

Our advices from *Vitna* give an account, that Count *Marsigli* was arrived in Prince *Lewis's* Camp, with a principal Chiefs, who brings Proposals of Peace from the *Os-*

man-Port, which are so reasonable, that we do not doubt but to hear in a very short time that a Peace is concluded between the two Empires.

Prince *Waldeck* and the Prince *de Vaudemont* are come from *Flanders* to wait upon His Majesty; The former brought with him 4 Standards taken from the French in the late Action near *Leul*; which are ordered to be hung up in the great Hall here; two of them belonged to the Troops of the Household. Don *Colonna*, the Spanish Envoy, had yesterday morning his Audience of Leave of the States, in order to his Voyage for *England*, where he is to reside as Ambassador from that Crown. The Heer *van Heckeren* is named by the States to go as their Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of *Saxony* to make their Compliments upon the Death of the late Elector, and the Succession of the present. The Heer *van Amerongen*, Envoy Extraordinary from this State in *Denmark*, and Father to the Baron *de Ginckle*, General of Their Majesty's Forces in *Ireland*, died lately at that Court.

We have advice as well by the way of *Germany* as *France*, that the Garrison of *Carmagnole* Capitulated the 8th, and marched out the 9th of this Month; and that *Monieur Gatinat* was retired into *Dauphine* with more haste than becomes an orderly march.

The King intends to embark with the first fair Wind for *England*.

His Majesty was pleased on Sunday last to Confer the Honour of Knighthood upon Mr. *Henry Furnace* in His Bed-Chamber.

Plymouth, Oct. 12. This day a Dutch Caper brought in here a French Snaw (being an Advice-Boat) with 35 Men in her.

Lime, Oct. 14. Yesterday Sir *Ralph Delavall*, with the Squadron under his Command, passed by this place to the Westward, the Wind at S. S. W.
