Board of Trade (Fisheries and Harbour Department), London, July 26, 1899.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 26th ultimo, from Her Majesty's Representative at Honolulu, enclosing copy of the following Notice, which was issued on the 22nd ultimo by the Board of Health at that place:—"All passengers arriving from North American ports are hereby required to report daily to the Port Physician, at his office on Beretania-street, until otherwise instructed. Any passenger failing to report to the Port Physician as directed will be placed in quarantine at the quarantine station."

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 16th instant, from Her Majesty's Representative at Sofia, intimating that the Sanitary Board have modified, in the following manner, the previous Order relating to the importation of sacks:—

1. The sacks specified in the previous Order may be imported also by way of Hebitchevo (the frontier station on the Oriental Railway).
2. In that case they must be conveyed in waggons separate from other goods, and must be unloaded at the Hebitchevo Quarantine Station for disinfection.
3. Such sacks, if they should be brought by rail into the interior of Bulgaria without having been disinfected at Hebitchevo, will be returned, together with other goods with which they may have been mingled, at the expense of the Railway Company, to be disinfected at Hebitchevo.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated 19th instant, from Her Majesty's Representative at Berlin, intimating that the Imperial Gazette of the previous night contained a Decree imposing restrictions on the importation of articles from Egypt, of which the following is a translation:—

§1. In order to prevent the introduction of the plague, the importation by sea of the following

articles from the Egyptian ports in the Mediterranean and Suez Canal is prohibited until further notice:—

Body-linen, old clothes already worn, bed-clothes that have been used, and rags and tatters of every description.

§2. The prohibition, contained in §1, does not apply to body linen, bedclothes, and articles of clothing, which travellers take with them for their own use, or which are imported by them on change of residence. Permission to import them may, however, be rendered conditional upon their undergoing a previous process of disinfection.

§3. The Chancellor of the Empire is empowered to grant exemptions from the prohibition, upon prescribing the necessary measures of precaution.

§4. The present Decree comes into force on the day of its publication.
