

county of Nottingham, and in the churchyard within twelve feet of the school or any dwelling-house; and also in the rest of the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In vaults and walled graves now existing burials may be allowed, on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In now existing earthen graves burials may be allowed of the relations of those already interred therein provided the bodies can be deposited at or below the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains.

(c.) In now existing grave spaces which are free from water-burials may be allowed provided the bodies can be deposited at or below the depth of five feet without disturbing human remains.

WHITNASH, WARWICKSHIRE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Whitnash in the county of Warwick; and also in the old churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In vaults and wholly walled graves now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In existing earthen graves burials may be allowed of the relations of those already interred therein provided the bodies can be deposited at or below the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains.
