HER Majesty the Queen, on Her arrival in Ireland, was presented with an Address by the Council of the Urban District of Kingstown in the following terms :—

To Her Most Gracious Majesty VICTORIA, QUEEN of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, &c., &c.

The Address of the Council of the Urban District of Kingstown.

May it please Your Majesty,

WE, the Council of the Urban District of Kingstown desire respectfully to approach Your Majesty, and to tender to You a hearty welcome on Your arrival in this country.

We avail ourselves of the opportunity afforded us by this Your auspicious visit to renew our assurances of loyalty and devotion to Your Majesty, Your Throne and Dynasty.

Our town has always, since its formation, about three-quarters of a century ago, been prominently identified with that loyalty which we this day profess towards Your Most Gracious Majesty. Originally known as Dunleary, it took its present name from the visit of His Majesty George IV, and it has ever been the proud privilege of its governing body for the time being to be the first to welcome Your Majesty and all the members of Your Royal Family on arrival in Ireland.

We sincerely trust that Your Majesty's sojourn in Ireland may be one of unalloyed pleasure, and that on Your departure from our shores You will take back with You many pleasing memories of Your reception by Your loyal Irish Subjects.

We earnestly wish You many years of health to rule over the great Empire which Providence has committed to Your care, and it is our fervent hope that You may continue to reign in the affection of Your people throughout Your vast Dominions, as we are confident that Your visit will convince Your Majesty You reign in the hearts of the People of Ireland.

We confidently expect that Your stay amongst us will prove a pleasant one, and trust that it will be of lasting benefit to Your Majesty's health; and we desire to represent that whenever it may please You to visit this portion of Your Dominions,
