

# The London Gazette.

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Hill, June 21.

Several Merchant ships are daily passing between this and *Holland*, to the advantage of the Trade of this place. The *Success* Frigate having spent some dayes upon the Coasts near *Bridlington*, the 18th instant set sail to the southwards; having aboard severall men taken in for the service of the Fleet.

*Poismouth*, June 23. Yesterday the *Roebuck* left this Harbour, and went out to *Spitthead*, where she intends to continue till further Order. The *Francis* is come from thence into Harbour to refit. The *Royal Sovereigne* is to be suddenly put into a condition to return from hence to *Chatham*.

*Naples*, June 4. The Squadron of the Popes Gallies which lately put into this Port, having set sail in pursuance of their intended Voyage for *Candia*, were near the Isle of *Capri* rudely handled by storm, and forced to run back to *Castell o Mare di Stadia*, between this and *Sorrento*; to which place they were confined till Sunday last: before his departure from thence the Popes Nuncio having met with the News of their being there, went hence to visit the General *Don Vincenzo Respigliosi*, who gave him an extraordinary Salute from his Gallies, and after some conference dismissing him with the same Ceremony. On Sunday last arrived here a Courier Extraordinary from the Pope, with dispatches for the said General, which the Nuncio receiving, immediately sent away by a Felucca.

He is lately come into Port a Vessel laden with Masts for our Gallies and other Ships, which by Order from the Viceroy were cut down in the Mountains of *Calabria*, and are found to be little inferior to those which are usually brought from *Norway*.

This Morning returned hither from *Abruzzo* severall Companies of Spanish foot, which were sometime since commanded out to reduce the *Sardini* to Obedience; who have thought fit at the last to comply with the Viceroy, and to take such Employments as shall be allotted them.

*Warsaw*, June 8. Several of the Grandees of this Kingdom are already arrived here, where is on Tuesday next to begin a Convocation, the Vayvods of *Cracow* only intend not to appear, but rather to withdraw, to the great dissatisfaction of the rest. This day Duke *Boguslaw Ratzibill* arrived here attended with a great Train. 'Tis said the City of *Cyffaw* to be speedily fortified at the expences of several of the Nobility.

The Nobility are divided upon business of the Succession, believing His Majesty has real intentions of turning himself to a private life, and 'tis said His Majesty has already proposed four persons, out of which number he desires election might be made; but the Nobility are not satisfied with it.

Letters from *Ukrainia* confirm to us the News of the great numbers of rebels which are there got together, by which means the people in the Provinces of *Ruffie* and *Limburgh* are warmly alarmed, fearing least the Cloud which hath been so long gathering, may in the end fall with a Tempest upon them; nor are they a little concerned at some dreadful storms, which have lately fallen on them, with hail-stones of incredible bigness; which has done much hurt upon their Houses, Trees, and Fruits; and is by the more Superstitious believed to be a Preface of their future Sufferings, and some greater Calamities, which they fear may suddenly attend them.

*Rome*, June 9. Some few dayes since, Cardinal *Respigliosi*

went to take possession of the Government of the City of *Tivoli*, where himself with Cardinal *Agolino*, and some other great personages were treated with much magnificence by the Deputy Governour Monsignor *Lombardi*.

On Wednesday last in the Evening, arrived a Courier in 7 days from his most Christian Majesty, with Letters assuring us of the Ratification and Publication of the Peace between the two Crowns of *France* and *Spain*, which was the next morning communicated by the Duke de *Chaulnes* the French Ambassador to His Highness, who received it with infinite joy and satisfaction, and presently after, acquainted the Colledge of Cardinals and the Ambassadors and Ministers of foreign Princes, with the welcome Tidings, which was for three evenings successively entertained with Bonfires, Lights, and other signs of joy, and the firing of Guns from the *Castel St. Angelo*; and on Sunday after, a solemn Procession in *St. Peter's Te Deum* was solemnly sung in presence of the Pope and the whole Court.

On Tuesday last, the Cardinal de *Medici* took his solemn leave of the Pope in order to his return to *Florence*.

*Venice*, June 16. The Senate are now more than ever employing their care and diligence in making provisions of all sorts for the opposing of the Turks in their design against *Candia*. They have lately taken into pay severall Captains, to whom they have given Commissions of levie forces for that service; and besides severall Gallies which they are fitting up, one Gallie is setting out under the Command of the Noble Venetian *Marco Balbi*; several Ships will in few dayes depart from this Port with provisions and ammunition, with soldiers which are embarking for that service.

By the way of *Legorne* we have adviced that the Turks upon the Coasts of *Affrica* in obedience to the Commands laid on them by the Grand Signior, have thought fit to send the assistance of ships and provisions they are able to spare, to assist him in the taking in of *Candia*; but that which much lessens this assistance which he expects from *holland*, is the jealousy the Turks have entertained upon all the Coasts of *Barbary*, lest the Christians might have some intention of uniting their forces; to give the Grand Signior a diversion, by attempting upon some part of their African Dominions.

A Vessel lately arriving from *Durazzo* on Monday last, tells us that touching at *Raguse*, they find that City has made a considerable advance in separation of the ruins caused by the prodigious Earthquake; and are now reviving their Trade. That the Turks were drawing together about *Eufonia* and *Albania*, intending to make some incursions upon *Dalmatia*. That some small parties of them had already adventured into *Possidaria*, but returned again with little or no booty; the Country people having before-hand secured their Goods, and joyned with a considerable party of Morlachs; the News whereof hath obliged the Turks to retire themselves with much speed.

A Ship from *Raguse* having arrived on Wednesday last in the Evening at *Corfu*, tells us of a warm report of some action lately passed between our Admiral and the Turkish Fleet, in which we had gained a considerable Victory, sinking five of the Enemies Gallies, and taking 11, with two ships laden with Provisions and Artillery; of which good News we are yet in doubt, till further Confirmation.

*Ratisbonne*, June 18. The States of the Empire still continue their Assembly as formerly, but have not of late made any considerable progress into any Affairs of importance, and have of late been hindered by reason of the death

of the Cardinal of *Saltzburgh*, who presided in the Assembly in the Name and Place of the Emperour, in whose room 'tis believed will shortly be dispatched the Count d' *Avenberg*, His Imperial Majesty's Principal Minister of State; at whose arrival the Assembly may proceed with greater vigour.

His Highness the Elector of *Bavaria* still continues his Levies, which 'tis supposed may be designed for *Savoy*; where as yet the differences between that Duke and the City of *Geneva* are not fully composed.

We have here much discourse of a Treaty concluded between His Imperial Majesty and the Crown of *Sweden*, by which both parties are mutually agreed to assist each other, in case any attempts be made upon them; with some Articles relating to the Duchy of *Breme*: of the truth thereof, with the particulars, we expect a farther Account.

We are also told of another Assembly of the Neighbouring Princes of the Empire, which will be shortly held at *Cologne*; but whether in order to giving a longer time to the Alliance of the Princes of the *Rhine*, or for the future security of the Empire and the Frontiers against all Invasions, or some other subject, is yet uncertain.

*Vienna*, June 19. The peace being now settled between the two Crowns of *Spain* and *France*; 'tis believed, the Emperour will give speedy Orders for the reducing his forces to a lesser number.

His Highness, the Elector of *Saxony*, and his Duchesse, with the young Prince and Princess, are expected here about the 29th Instant; several great houses being already furnishing to receive them; the Chancellor, and several Gentlemen of their Train are before them arrived to take care for all conveniences for their entertainment, who 'tis believed may continue here till the end of *July* (the Emperour's Birth-day) to take part of the Divertissements which are preparing against that time.

The States of *Hungary* with as much earnestness as ever, are pressing His Imperial Majesty for a redress of their Grievances, from which Countrey our Letters inform us, that *Radassi* continues still his demands of 200 thousand Ducats, with interest, from the Prince *Ragotski*, which if refused, he threatens to recover by force.

*Hague*, June 26. Several persons belonging to the young Prince of *Denmark*, are lately arrived here, and himself in few dayes expected; for whose Reception and Entertainment, Prince *Maurice* had designed his own House, but the young Prince intending only to be treated incognito, 'tis believed he has made choice of some other Lodgings.

The Heer *Carifus*, Envoy Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Denmark*, has lately pressed hard for the payment of several summs, which he pretends to be due upon promise to the King his Master, particularly, 400000 Rix-Dollars from the States of *Holland*, and 14000 from those of *Amsterdam*; the justness of which pretensions has been the subject of many conferences and debates, and for the determination of the business between both parties, they have agreed to submit it to the Arbitration of the Most Christian King.

Prince *Maurice* is this day set forwards on his journey for *Berlin*; to whom, before his departure the States were pleased to give 25 thousand *Liures* in consideration of his Expenses in making preparation for his Embassy, which was formerly intended for *Vienna*.

The Commissioner *Breuckel*, having been committed upon suspicion of having employed to his private use, Goods belonging to the Publick, of considerable value, lately made his escape from prison; whereupon, the States by their Proclamation, have promised 2000 *Liures* to any person that shall give notice of him for his apprehension, promising besides the said reward to pardon any of his accomplices, who shall be instrumental in his discovery, and forbidding all persons whatsoever, to entertain or conceal him under the penalty of being proceeded against as persons guilty of the same Crime, several of his Relations are already taken and committed.

*Hambourg*, June 23. Several of the Soldiers belonging to the Regiment of Count *Conzmark*, which were some time since raised in and about this Town, are lately arrived here, little satisfied with their noble Reformation, having not marched farther towards the service, for which they were designed, then *Cassel*, where they were discharged, several of the Officers being also disgusted, that they have not as yet any satisfaction made them for the Moneys disbursed by them towards the raising of that Regiment.

The Commissioners impowred for the examination of the pretensions of the Duke d' *Holstein Plun* to the County of *Oldenburg*, have had several conferences, but as yet no judgement can be made for their resolution upon that subject.

The Constable *Wrangle*, is within few dayes expected here; at whose arrival, the Swedish forces hope to know their doom, as to their future employment, or disbanded.

From *Wesphalia* we are told, that the Bishop of *Munster* begins now to dismiss some Companies of the Army lately raised by him, which much lessens the jealousies and apprehensions of the Neighbourhood.

We have lately a current report, that some few days since there has been a smart encounter about *Heilige-Land*, between two Privateers of *Ostend*, and a French man of War of 40 Guns, with a ship under his Convoy, laden with brass Guns from *Gluckstadt*; that after a long dispute, the French man of War was forced with much damage to quit the engagement, leaving the *Ostende* in pursuit after the other ship, of which we are in expectation of a farther confirmation with more particulars.

From *Varmstadt* we are told, that the Lorainers begin again to put their Neighbours upon the Guards, having lately appeared with more than usual strength upon the frontiers of *Germany*, but with what design is as yet unknown. However, the Countrey people near the *Rhine*, begin to secure themselves and the rest of their Goods; and his Highness, the Prince Elector Palatine has put himself in a posture of defence, in case any thing should be attempted to his prejudice. Several of the stragling Lorainers have been taken and sent prisoners to the Fort of *Manheim*. The French have on all parts within drawn their forces, leaving the Countreys on the borders in peace, and have taken down the Bridge of Boats, which they were building near *Philipsbourg*.

*Whitehall*, June 24. On Monday last His Majesty accompanied by his Royal Highness, and His Highness Prince *Rupert*, and attended by several of the Eminent Persons of the Court, went down in his Yacht to *Sheerness*, to take a View of the Fortifications which are there raising and much advanced.

From about the *Monmouth* in the *Downs*, June 23. This day His Majesty and Royal Highness came into the *Downs* to take a view of the Fleet which is riding there, going aboard Sir *Thomas Allen* and Sir *Jeremy Smith*, and afterwards set sail again towards *London*.

Yesternight came into the *Downs*, the *St. David*, and this day the *Success*; the Merchants ships, which lay here outward bound, sailed yesterday to the *ward*.
