

# The London Gazette.

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Rome, November 24.

ON the 12th of this month the Pope held a Consistory, but there was little done in it besides the filling of some vacant Bishopricks; The Cardinals *d'Estree* and *Fourbin* took that occasion to represent again to the Pope the Condition of so many Churches in *France*, which, for want of his Bulls, have been a long time without Bishops. On the 13th the Pope made choice of Signior *Tanara*, at present his Nuncio in *Portugal*, to go in the same Quality to the Court at *Vienna*, the Imperial Ambassador having the day before in a private Audience declared to the Pope, that the five Persons he had proposed for that Employment were all equally acceptable to the Emperor. On the 15th was published here a General Jubilee. The 19th the Pope gave the usual Audiences, and held a Congregation about the Differences with *France*; on which Subject Cardinal *Barbin* had that Evening a long Audience of the Pope; who, as we are assured, has at last been prevailed upon, to separate the matter of the Bulls from that of the Regale, and to resolve, that the first shall be determined out of hand; And to improve this good disposition in him, the French have, it's said, formed a Project, by which the four Propositions, and whatever else was done in the Assembly of the Clergy in 1682, to the prejudice or offence of the Church of *Rome*, is to be annulled and rescinded; And besides this, they are to ask the Pope's Pardon, and to give him Assurances of their Respect and Submission for the future; In consideration whereof, He is to grant his Bulls to all the French Bishops, except 4 or 5 that have been the most obstinate in this business. This Project has, they say, been sent to *Paris* for the King's Approbation; And when that comes hither, they will in the next place proceed on the matter of the Regale. On Wednesday last the Jubilee was opened in the Church of *S. Maria P' Angeli* by the Cardinal *Chigi* and 39 other Cardinals, the first of whom celebrated Mass, (the Pope's Age and Infirmities not suffering him to be present) after which they went in Procession to *Santa Maria Maggiore*. Several Consultations have been held here upon the Advices of the Germans having taken Winter Quarters in *Genoa*, *Parma*, *Mantua*, and *Modena*; And 'tis said, that the Pope has thereupon ordered a Reinforcement of 400 men to *Ferrara*, and 400 to *Bologna*.

*Turin, Nov. 24.* The German Troops have taken their Winter Quarters in *Montferrat*, and in the Duchies of *Parma*, *Mantua*, and *Modena*. The Republick of *Genova* asks, in stead of Quarters, a Sum of Money, and we expect our next Letters from thence will tell us the matter is adapted. The Siege of *Montmelian* continues still, and though the French have hitherto made no great progress in it, and that the Garrison defend themselves very vigorously, yet we cannot but be in pain for this place, seeing the Enemy are possit of all the Passes and Avenues, so as to hinder us receiving any Relief. 'Tis said, that the Elector of *Saxony* will part from hence on Thursday next in his return to *Germany*.

*Genoa, Nov. 24.* The Great Council here having met to consider of the Message they had received from General *Caraffa* about providing Winter Quarters for part of the Emperor's forces that had served the last Summer in *Piedmont*, they resolved not to do any thing in this occasion which might prejudice the Sovereignty or Neutrality of the Republick. But News coming that 5000 Germans were already entred into *Nave* and *Quada*, places belonging to this State, and that a Party of their Horse were advanced towards *Garu*, Orders were dispatched to the Secretary *Salvado*, who had been sent several days before

to adjust this matter with General *Caraffa*, to offer a Present of 200000 Scudi for the said Quarters, and that besides the Country of *Orvada* should pay them 1400 Doppies at two Terms, which, as we hear since, General *Caraffa* has accepted of; And at the same time the French Envoy here seems satisfied with this Accommodation. Yesterday arrived here 7 Gallies of the Duke of *Turkey's* Squadron from *Barcelona* with 500 Spanish Soldiers for the Service of the *Milarecz*.

*Milan, Nov. 26.* The German Regiments of Horse of *Montecuculi* and *Bareith*, with that of Foot of *Lorraine* and part of *Steinau*, have taken their Quarters in the Duchy of *Mantua*. The Bavarian Regiments of Foot, with the Dragoons of *Savoy*, are lodged in *Modena*, and one of Cuirassiers in the Duchy of *Parma*. The rest are quartered in *Montferrat*, except those that are marched towards the State of *Genova*. But how these last will be disposed of now that the Republick has bought off the Quarters with a Sum of Money, is not yet known.

*Lojscadi in Transilvania, Novemb. 14.* On the seventh Instant the Imperial Forces, commanded by General *Peterani*, marched from *Harro*; and having passed the River *Maros*, encamped near a place called *Paz*. The same day the Baron *de Giney*, who was taken Prisoner by the Tartars near *Great Waradin*, and afterwards obtained his Liberty upon paying a Ransom, arrived in the Camp, with the Confirmation, that *Teckeley* had repassed the *Maros*, and marched towards *Temiswar*. The Weather being grown very cold, the General thought fit to separate his Troops on the 28th, and to quarter them in the Villages between *Sajvaros*, *Hadzecke*, and *Hunya*, towards the Iron Gate, in such manner: as that the greater part of them may, upon occasion, be drawn together again in few hours: And he took his Head-Quarter in this place. The 9th we had advice, that a Body of 8 or 10000 Tartars, part of those that had served in *Hungary* this last Campaign, were returning home through *Polachia*. On the 10th we were informed, that the Tartars had seized up in *Teckeley*, for having eleafed Gen. *Houffer* without the Consent of the *Port*, and on pretence that he had not done all he might for the Relief of *Great Waradin*. This News was confirmed on the 11th; and we heard farther that the Tartars had carried *Teckeley* away towards *Orsova*; but that in their March they had made a Halt, upon a Report that was spread among them, that the Grand Vizier was coming towards *Belgrade*. The 12th arrived here Colonel *Antonia*, and gave us an Account, that he had, with the *Raficians* under his Command, attacked *Kipalanka*, and cut off about 100 of the Enemy, who were posted in some of the Outworks; but that he was not able to take the Town, not having with him a sufficient number of Foot for such an Attempt. Yesterday 150 Musketeers were detached with 600 *Raficians* to Garison the Castles of *Lugos* and *Garusber*. This day are come Letters from the Commandant of *Lippa*, with a farther Confirmation of *Teckeley's* being made a Prisoner by the Tartars, and carried to *Orsova* or *Widin*; and with an account, that a Convoy of 100 Wagons and 300 Camels laden with Provisions, is lately arrived at *Temiswar*.

*Vienna, Dec. 2.* On the 30th past parted from hence Major-General *Aversberg* to command the Blockade of *Great Waradin*, where the Garrison is already reduced to such a scarcity of Provisions as gives us great confidence, that they will in a short time be forced to surrender. Preparations are making here, in order to have a great Army in *Hungary* the next Spring, though we hope there will be no use of them on that side, but that a Peace with the Turks, which is now Negotiating, will put us at liberty to employ them against the French. The Emperor has made the Count *de Thun*, and the Count *de G'uriani* Captain of his Guards of Halbardiers, Councellers of State.
