■HE Matter about the Winter Quarters is finally accommodated with General Caraffa, by the Interpolition of the Governor of Milan; In purfiguree of which the Republick is to pay 200000 Crowns, and the German Troops are to be withdrawn our of Ovada, and all other places

belonging to this State.

The Senate resolving to Venice, Nov. 30. reinforce their Army against next Spring with leveral thousand Men, besides the Recruits for the Troops that are already on foot, have lately given out divers Committions for new Levies and are now Treating with several Officers, who undertake to raile Regiments in Germany for the Service of the Republick, and to have them compleat by the beginning of March.
They have had some Consultations likewise shout the Choice of a General to command their Land Forces in the room of the Baron de Degenfelt, who died in November last at Napolis di Romania, but we do not hear that any body i syet fixed upon for this Command. The last Advices from the Morea say, that the Captain-General had taken a review of the Troops quartered thereabouts, whom he found in a good condition; That the Garifons were well provided; and the Pass of Corinth sufficiently secured against any attempt of the Enemy. A new Convoy is preparing here for the Levant, which we are told will be ready to fail by the middle of the next month, with all forts of Provisions and Necessaries for our Forces, and feveral new-raited Troops, who are daily expe-1 cted at the Lido.

Lemberg in Poland. November 17. The Fores of this Crown and of the Dutchy of Lithua-Quarters, having fuffered extremely during this Campagne, by their long and difficult Marches, and the scarcity of Forage and Provious, infomuch that the King has lost aso Horles of his own Equipage. The whole Court is now at Fawarow, and will continue there till towards the meeting of the Dyet, which will be held at Warfam in Fanuary next. And in the mean time the Commission for set-

Vienna, December 6. Great Waradin is very closely block'd up, and the rest of the Army are retired into Winter Quarters. Great Preparations are made for the next Campagne, when the Emperor intends to have a more numerous Army in Hungary than he had this last, if a Peace be not made with the Turks this Winter, of which we have still great hopes. The Sieur Curtz, who was fent some time ago by the Emperor in the Quality of his Envoy into Mossowy, is come back, and has presented a Letter to his Imperial Majesty from the Czars, wherein they very much value the Diversion they have given the Tartars this Iast Summer, in hindering them from fending all their Forces to Hungary; promile to do the like the next; and defire they may be included in the Peace when 'tis made.
