## PARCEL POST.

AUSTRALIA, &c.

IN pursuance of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General hereby gives notice that a Warrant, dated the 13th day of September, 1900, has been made, on his representation by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Post Office Acts, ordering, directing, and declaring that, on and from the 22nd day of September, 1900, Parcels may, subject to the provisions of the said Warrant, and at the rates of postage therein specified, and in accordance with the Regulations therein referred to, be transmitted by post to Australia (including British New Guinea), the Republic of Honduras, Morocco (Gibraltar Post Office Agencies), and Dutch Guiana (Paramaribo and Nieuw Nickerie).

And the Postmaster-General further gives notice that copies of the said Warrant may be purchased, either directly or through any bookseller, from Eyre and Spottiswoode, East Harding-street, Fleet-street, E.C.; or John Menzies and Co., 12, Hanover-street, Edinburgh, and 90, West Nile-street, Glasgow; or Hodges, Figgis, and Co. No. 598.—NOVA SCOTIA—SOUTH COAST.

*Woods Harbour—Light Established.*

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada has given notice, that on 1st September, 1900, a light would be established on Big Ledge, Woods Harbour.

Woods Harbour Light is a dioptric red fixed light of the 7th order, elevated 27 feet above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of 8 miles.

The lighthouse is a square wooden building with sloping sides, 28 feet high, painted white, with red lantern; it stands on a concrete pier on the highest part of the ledge, which is covered at high water.

A hand fog-horn at the lighthouse will be sounded in answer to signals from vessels.

Approximate position, lat. 43° 30' 55" N., long. 65° 44' 45" W.
