

the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If any person with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order allows a head of cattle or a sheep or goat or pig to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as the STAFFORDSHIRE, DERBYSHIRE, LEICESTERSHIRE, AND WARWICKSHIRE (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1900.

SCHEDULE.

District to which this Order applies.

A District comprising the petty sessional divisions of Lichfield and Brownhills, Tamworth, Rushall, Handsworth, Wednesbury, Willenhall, Penkridge, Stafford, Rugeley, and Burton-upon-Trent (including the detached portion thereof situated in the petty sessional division of Uttoxeter), and so much of the petty sessional division of Uttoxeter as lies to the south of the parishes of Croxden and Rocester (excepting the detached portion portions thereof situated in the petty sessional division of Cheadle, but including the detached portion thereof situated in the petty sessional division of Burton-upon-Trent), and the boroughs of Lichfield and Tamworth, in the administrative county of Stafford; the petty sessional divisions of Appletree, Swadlincote, and Repton, in the administrative county of Derby; the petty sessional divisions of Ashby-de-la-Zouch and Market Bosworth, in the administrative county of Leicester; the petty sessional divisions of Atherstone, Coleshill, and Aston, and the borough of Sutton Coldfield, in the administrative county of Warwick; and also comprising the boroughs of Walsall, Wednesbury, West Bromwich, Stafford, Smethwick, and Burton-upon-Trent.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 12TH OCTOBER 1900.)

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE INFECTED AREA.)

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. Notwithstanding the existence of any foot-paths or right of way across or through any field, shed, or other place in the Infected Area declared by this Order, no person shall enter such field, shed, or other place while any cattle, sheep, or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say:—

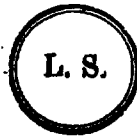
- (i.) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.
- (ii.) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of the Local Authority or of the Board of Agriculture.

3. No dog shall be allowed to be at large within the Infected Area declared by this Order.

4.—(1.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If the owner or person in charge of any dog permits such dog to be at large in contravention of this Order, such owner or person shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

SCHEDULE.

An Area in the administrative county of Stafford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at a point on the Lichfield and Burton-road near Fradley House and running in an easterly direction along the road leading therefrom past Sittles into Stockford-lane and along such lane to its junction with Park-lane, thence along Park-lane to Huddlesford Bridge, thence along the towing-path over Streethay Bridge to the Lichfield and Burton-road, and thence along such road in a north-easterly direction to the point of commencement aforesaid; the said roads and towing-path not being included in the Area.

(SWINE-FEVER INFECTED AREA.)
