

the point where the said roadway joins Hexthorpe-road aforesaid and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Crimpsall-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its present north-western end and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of twelve feet or thereabouts to the wall forming the present south-western boundary of the premises known as the Plant Works of the Great Northern Railway (but which said works are now in course of extension) and extending thence north-westward along the said wall for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its north-western end and continuing thence still north-westward and in a direct line for a distance of one and three-quarters chains or thereabouts to the boundary in the middle of the River Don which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint James Doncaster from the parish of Sprotbrough aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Balby-with-Hexthorpe which is bounded on the north-west by the parish of Sprotbrough aforesaid on the north-east and on the greater part of the south-east by the hereinbefore described portion of the new parish of Saint James Doncaster aforesaid and on the remaining part of the south-east and on the south-west by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the new parish of Balby-with-Hexthorpe aforesaid at the junction of Barnstone-street with Urban-road formerly known as Hexthorpe-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said Urban road for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with a new street to be called Gladstone-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hexthorpe-lane and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of two and a quarter chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the south-eastern end of the wall or fence dividing the house and premises known as Woodbine Cottage from the close numbered one hundred and eighty-four upon the Ordnance Survey map of the parish of Doncaster on the 2500 scale published in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two and upon the map hereunto annexed and extending thence north-westward for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to and along the last-described wall or fence and along the line of walls or fences dividing the closes numbered respectively one hundred and eighty-five, one hundred and seventy-six, one hundred and seventy-seven, and one hundred and seventy-eight, upon the said maps from the allotment gardens known as 'Laughton's Gardens' and the close numbered one hundred and seventy-three upon the said maps to the point where the wall or fence dividing the said close numbered one hundred and seventy-eight from the close numbered one hundred and seventy-three as aforesaid bends sharply towards the north-east and extending thence that is from the last-described point north-westward and in a direct line for a distance of twelve and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing a part of the said close numbered one hundred and seventy-eight and also crossing Hexthorpe Ings) to a point in the middle of the River Don aforesaid opposite the houses called Newton, the said point being at a distance of fifteen and a half chains or there-

abouts (measured along the south-east bank of the said River Don) to the north-east of Newton Ferry, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Balby-with-Hexthorpe from the parish of Sprotbrough aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Charles Thomson Ritchie, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of "The Burial Act, 1853," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parish without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, viz.:-

EAST MARDEN, SUSSEX.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of East Marden, in the county of Sussex, and also in the old part of the churchyard.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-fourth day of January next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said twenty-fourth day of January.

WHEREAS by "The Burial Act, 1855," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas an Order in Council has been made directing the discontinuance of burials in
