

The Examinations are intended to supply the several Post Offices with persons resident in or near the towns in which they desire to serve. With the undermentioned exceptions Candidates will be allowed to compete only for vacancies in the town in which they apply to be examined.

The exceptions referred to above are that, for reasons of convenience, at the forthcoming Examinations:—

Candidates for Southampton will be examined at Portsmouth.

No. 127.—ITALY—GULF OF GENOA.

Savona Traverse Mole—Widening of.

THE Italian Government has given notice, dated 31st January, 1901, that the Traverse Mole, Savona, is being widened; the submerged portion of the works is marked to a certain extent by the red mooring buoys of the lighters employed in the work. Mariners are therefore warned not to approach its east side too closely, and to give its extremity a good berth in rounding it.
